day, but wore a lounging robe.

Attorneys Silent

Other than the brief formal statement handed out in written form, Vandenberg and Roberts maintained a close silence about the case. It is generally understood that the two lawyers will claim self-defense for their client, who, at the time of his arrest, told officers he shot Horan after the latter fired a gun at him.

In the second floor of the Underwood building, prosecution forces continued their efforts to gather together information and evidence that would break down a self-defense plea for Manning. E. O. Heinrich, the Berkeley criminologist called in by the state, said he was about 80 per cent through with his investigation, and that when it was completed he believed the state's case would be clean-cut. Heinrich continued to work in Manning's law office, the scene of the shooting.

Expert Confident

"This is an extremely interesting case," said Heinrich. "Our investigations are proceeding toward definite conclusions, as indicated in the filing of charges by Mr. Gillenwaters. The case, when we have finished, will be clean-cut." Heinrich's remarks recalled a statement of Gillenwaters, when charges were filed, that the state was proceeding on the theory that Manning fired all four shots in the law office tragedy Monday night, while the defendant had indicated Horan fired twice.

Heinrich said he will remain here until his investigations are concluded. Gillenwaters said the question of his remuneration is a matter yet to be decided.

Statements Collected

While Heinrich pursues his studies in Manning's office, Gillenwaters, Deputy District Attorney D. E. Van Vactor and Sheriff Lloyd Low continue to take statements from persons thought to be able to throw any light on the circumstances of the shooting. Heinrich at this time is paying no attention to the "outside" investigation, but it is expected later he will get together with the officers to go over the whole mass of information gathered.

Roberts came to Klamath Falls from Medford Friday morning. He visited Manning at the county jail in the morning, and then went to Vandenberg's office. Later, he and Vandenberg walked to the Underwood building and held a brief conference with Gillenwaters. It was after that conference announcement was made that the arraignment and preliminary hearing will be deferred until next week.

Considerable speculation is underway with regard to the possible trial of the case. It is not known how soon there will be a meeting of the grand jury, to which the case will probably be presented. The jury is subject to call of the circuit judge. If there is a trial in the next three months, it will be in the present form of court. If it is not held until June, the jurors will be chosen from a new jury list.

Secrecy Prevails

The part Manning, a prominent criminal lawyer, might play in his own defense, is the cause of a stir of interest in anticipation of the trial.

Stray ends of the investigation continue to leak out, but for the most part it has now developed into a closed matter on the part of the defense and prosecution.

Considerable interest centers around a persistent report that an object, possibly a bottle, was seen to fly from a window on the seventh street side of the Underwood building shortly before the shooting Monday night. Officers Tuesday morning gathered up pieces of glass from the street. District Attorney Gillenwaters said there had been nothing of significance discovered in connection with this glass.

A first degree murder charge permits no bond. Death sentence is mandatory on conviction unless there is a jury recommendation otherwise.

Cartoonist Under Federal Guard

DES MOINES, Feb. 15, (U.P.)—J. N. (Ding) Darling, the cartoonist, was reported tonight to be under the guard of federal agents after a threat allegedly was made to kidnap him.

Federal agents, it was said, learned about the threat against Darling while they were working on the Edward G. Bremer kidnapping case.

Both the United States district attorney's office and Park A. Findley, chief of the state investigation bureau, refused either to confirm or deny that Darling was being guarded or had received threats.

clared upon filing the club was making the move because it opposed the state going into the liquor business; protested censorship of liquor advertising, high fees paid by restaurants compared to low fees required of beer gardens, the one dollar permit fee after the federal government had made buying legal and the judicial authority given the state liquor control commission.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 15, (U.P.)—Objections to the Knox Liquor Control law appeared on two more fronts today with filing of two petitions proposing repeal of the measure.

The American Brotherhood, Inc., of Portland, filed preliminary petitions with the state department today asking repeal. No substitute measure was offered.

Astoria Objects

Late this afternoon a second repeal move was launched by the Knox repeal club of Astoria. Its proposal was identical except for sponsorship.

The Portland measure was filed by Claude H. Gordon and Joseph L. Ladwidge. L. M. Kietzing, secretary of the Astoria organization, filed the other.

Kietzing declared his club was opposed to the state entering the saloon business, objected to state censorship of liquor advertising and opposed the permit system as a prerequisite to the purchase of liquor.

Both petitions have been presented to the attorney general's department for ballot titles preliminary to their circulation for signatures. Should either or both of the petitions secure 25,000 registered voters' signatures, they will be placed on the state ballot next November.

Two initiative petitions believed to have been instituted on behalf of merchants and druggists, were filed last week. They proposed a system of license by cities and counties and sale of liquor in packages through private establishments.

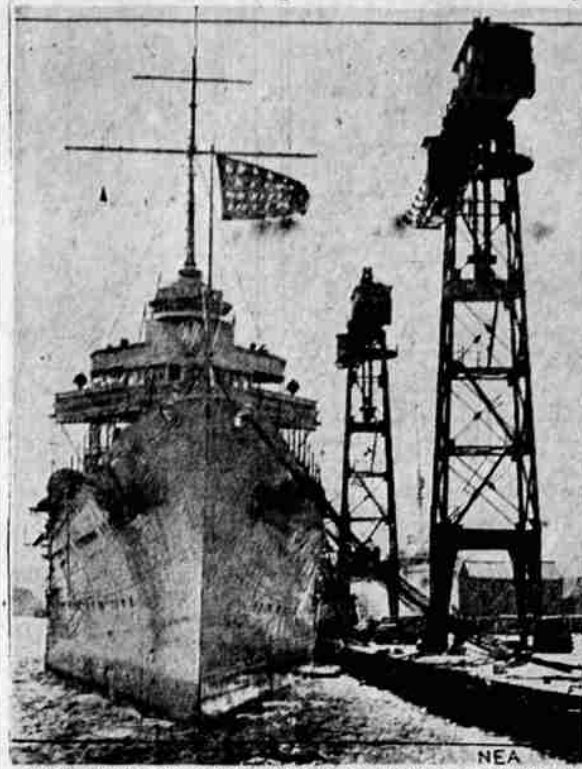

(Copyright 1934 by United Press) LONDON, Feb. 15, (U.P.)—Austria sought today to draw Great Britain into a proposed tripartite guarantee of her independence. Britain's attitude on the project, which would serve in lieu of League of Nations intervention against Nazi attempts to unite Austria and Germany, was conjectural. France and Italy are believed warmly inclined toward some agreement.

The plea for British cooperation was carried to the foreign office by the Austrian minister, Baron George Frankenstein. He pointed out to Sir John Simon, foreign secretary, that the latter already had stated that the British government favored an independent Austria and urged that Britain join with France and Italy in a move to prevent interference from other powers in Austria's domestic affairs.

Simon recently let it be known that the government was prepared to send representations to Germany should the Nazis there take active part in the Austrian Nazi movement, banned by Chancellor Engelbert Dollfuss. However, the events this week have caused somewhat of a revulsion of feeling against Dollfuss in public opinion here.

Furthermore the British government is not inclined to become

embroiled in political affairs on the continent at this dangerous period.

Italy and France on the other hand are eager to prevent combination of Austria with Germany.

The United Press understood that a proposal for three power action, originating in Rome, would be placed before the British government before the week end.

Dollfuss has full authority to appeal to the League of Nations, but is inclined now to work directly with the former Allied powers, who, paradoxically enough, 15 years ago were his enemies in the World War.
