LA GRANDE, Ore., Feb. 20. (AP)—The westbound army airmail plane landed at the airport here this morning because of a low ceiling over the Blue mountains. After a couple of hours, conditions improved sufficiently so that he resumed his flight to the west. The plane left here at approximately 11 o'clock.

HOOVER MENTIONED.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 20. (AP)—Circumstances surrounding the drawing of the nation's airmail map again drew the attention of senate investigators today after they heard that former President Hoover had taken a hand in one contract case.

Walter F. Brown, Mr. Hoover's postmaster general, was on the stand for the second consecutive day, and the hearing consisted largely of debate—sometimes quite heated—between Brown and Senator Black (D. Ala.), chairman of the committee investigating air and ocean mail contracts let by the last administration.

Black introduced correspondence purporting to show that Mr. Hoover personally requested a bid submitted by the aviation company for a middle-transcontinental route which later went to a transcontinental and western air.

lated that the Masonic lodge, for its equity of land 110 feet wide, fronting on High street, and that the property will later be improved by the construction of a lodge building. The lodge also agrees to grant public access over and across its land for an entrance into the park.

The city of Klamath Falls will assume control and maintenance of the proposed park, and the lodge will in turn give the property of the county school unit to be used in various school plants when needed.

The county school unit holds a mortgage on the property, which was purchased by the Masonic lodge some years ago. This mortgage will be released, and the lodge will in turn give the unit a quitclaim to all the property save the 110-foot strip.

The CWA application will be made by the county school unit through Fred Peterson, and all work done, if the grant is made, will be done under the supervision of City Engineer Thomas and the city park board.

The county school unit and the high school unit No. 2 will sign quitclaim deeds to the property, turning it over to the city, and the city will, in turn, exchange other properties to the high school unit, subject to the approval of the city council.

Deeds have been taken on the old high school property. Necessary work preliminary to the presentation of the CWA application, and several changes in the original agreement have been approved, as follows: That the Masons agree to landscape lots retained by them until their new lodge building is erected; and that they agree not to sell the property retained by them nor put it to any use other than for lodge purposes without the consent of the city council.

from 64 to 94, all widows, daughters or cousins of Civil War veterans, had no opportunity to flee from their hospital beds as the first started about the middle of the building and swept through the corridors.

The bodies, some burned almost beyond recognition, were found huddled in the ruins.

MEDFORD EXTENDS CITY INVITATION

Klamath Falls and Klamath county were extended a cordial invitation today by A. H. Banwell, secretary of the Medford Chamber of Commerce, to attend and participate in Oregon's Diamond Jubilee celebration in Medford, June 3 to 9. Banwell was a member of the good will delegation from Medford, including the Glee-men who are presenting a concert here tonight.

Plans and preparations are rapidly progressing for the celebration, observing Oregon's 75th anniversary of statehood. The festivities have received the official endorsement of the state legislature and of Governor Julius Meier and are expected to draw thousands of people to southern Oregon, many of whom will also be visiting Klamath county.

Faithfully reviewing historical incidents of Oregon leading to statehood, a pageant, planned to have over 400 people in its cast, will be one of the features of the jubilee. The pageant is being especially prepared by a well known Oregon writer and when staged will include numerous new and original settings, unusual lighting effects and carefully planned dramatization.

Other attractions will include dog races, historical parades, industrial exhibits, golf tournaments, aviation show, historical exhibits and numerous others.

Governors of four western states and of British Columbia have expressed plans to be in attendance, as well as numerous other well known governmental dignitaries. Indications point toward the probability that the Mason, world's largest airship, will also be in Medford during the celebration.

Manning's Case Goes Before Jury Early Wednesday

talited with two shots that struck and killed his ex-partner. When charges were filed against Manning, District Attorney Gillenwaters said the state was "not satisfied" with Manning's version of the shooting.

Among the physical evidences of the shooting on which it is known the investigators have directed considerable attention are the following:

The 17.5 Johnson .38 caliber, handed officers by Manning after the shooting.

One Smith & Weston .38 calibre fire pistol, found in Horan's left hand as he lay on the floor in front of Manning's desk.

Four bullets, one found in a book-case behind Manning's chair; one found in the bottom of the book-case; one found under Horan's collar bone after it had been deflected from his upper arm; one found on floor after it had struck the chair in which Horan supposedly sat during the death interview.

The high-backed leather chair in which Manning supposedly sat. There is a bullet hole through the back of this chair.

The straight, oak chair in which Horan supposedly sat, with a bullet bruise on the back of the chair.

Other state "exhibits" it is understood, include pieces of glass picked up on the street before the Manning window, diagrams of the room showing the position of Horan's body on the floor, and pictures taken by Deputy Sheriff Rex McMillan the night of the shooting and later.

It is presumed the state has been attempting to determine from which guns the bullets were fired, and similar matters which might make possible a reconstruction of the gunplay.

time searching for information to add to the taxpayer's despair. "Because the public now realizes that some of the county offices exceeded their budgets by hundreds of dollars, Mr. Williams attempts to defend himself by laying the blame in the office of the county clerk. Mr. Williams' chief line of defense seems to be 'passing the buck.'"

When the posting machine deal became public he made a feeble attempt to exonerate himself by laying the whole transaction at the feet of his son, when he himself engineered the deal.

"In a former newspaper article, Mr. Williams declared that he did not know that the machine was in the clerk's office was the same as the one purchased by the Klamath Glass Company from the Chiloquin State Bank. The first month I was in office, Mr. Williams came to me and stated he knew of a good machine that could be bought for \$450.00 and further stated that he would like to see it in the clerk's office right away as he didn't know how he was going to get along with the new members of the county court and that he might resign within a short time.

"The machine was placed in my office at the request of Mr. Williams by the Oregon Equipment Company. At that time I had enough faith in Mr. Williams' integrity to believe that the machine would be as he represented. I immediately placed Mr. Williams in the treasurer's office. A short time later, I discovered in the files of the circuit court that this same machine was sold by the Chiloquin Bank in liquidation to the Klamath Glass Company for \$450.00. I immediately placed Mr. Williams, manager of the Oregon Equipment Company, to my office. Mr. Williams stated to me, in the presence of a witness, that his company had paid Williams \$450.00 for the machine. He asked me equal to the machine. He made it right with me.

"In answer to Mr. Williams' remarks about the employees giving out information as to expenses will state again that my office and all the records are for public inspection. Perhaps Mr. Williams would be surprised to know how many taxpayers—many of them prominent business men—who have looked over the books and records and always found them in such shape that they could easily see for themselves how and how county money has been spent. We have nothing in our office to hide nor do we intend to hide anything for anyone else. We are working for the taxpayers—not alone for the county court.

"Mr. Williams have been given to the county court each and every time they have been requested, and the court knew—long before November that certain officers had already exceeded their budgets. If Mr. Williams put the book of records on county affairs as far as the clerk's office is concerned. Any information requested by a taxpayer will be gladly given, and those who are conversant with the manner in which my office is conducted know that routine is not being neglected, but is kept regularly up to date."

NAZI LEADERS SEND DEMAND TO DOLFUSS

rising of Nazis in Austria by Feb. 28 unless they were admitted into the Austrian government.

The little entente—Yugoslavia, Czechoslovakia and Rumania—are said to have urged the French to act quickly to halt the threat of another civil war in Austria, but a government spokesman said it was unlikely that the French will move in the matter until Dolfuss has filed an official complaint with the League of Nations, a complaint which he gave notice of filing last month.

BITLER DISPLEASED

BERLIN, Feb. 20. (AP)—Indications that Chancellor Adolf Hitler was none too pleased with a defiant Austrian Nazi ultimatum issued last night by Thodor Hahlich, exiled Austrian, to Chancellor Dolfuss of Austria were seen today.

The German press ignored the speech, after a broad hint from higher up.

RIOTING REPORTED

INNSBRUCK, Austria, Feb. 20. (AP)—Bombers, police believed to be embittered socialists beginning a last ditch fight against political extinction, created havoc here during the night.

A bomb explosion wrecked the

library of the city hall, injuring three persons. Another bomb crumbled one of the masts of the Innsbruck radio station. Others damaged the school electric sub-station.
