REVENUE BILL OVERCOMES REPUBLICAN OPPOSITION

HOUSE VOTES 258 MILLION TAX MEASURE

Republicans Beaten In Attempt To Reduce Postage Rate.

ACTION AGAINST EVASIONS TAKEN

Small Incomes Believed Benefitted By Work of Lawmakers.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21, (AP)—The \$255,000,000 revenue bill was passed today by the house after a republican move to reduce the 3-cent first class postage rate to 2 cents was defeated 272 to 132.

By a revision of the income rate structure, persons of small incomes are benefitted, and those in the higher brackets are levied on more heavily than at present.
