

Chiloquin, "School of Champions"

County High School Again Proves Ability by Winning Tournament for Second Time in Row. Difficult Schedule Overcome. Vinson of Bonanza Captures High Scoring Honors With Statist of Malin Second.

Chiloquin high school, frequently described as the school of champions, proved definitely Friday and Saturday that the assertion was no mistake. The Chiloquin basketball won its second successive county "B" title and probably will defend its southern Oregon championship at the Southern Oregon Normal school tournament within the next few weeks.

Chiloquin had the most difficult schedule of the tournament. It played the three strongest rivals and came out victor in each contest.

Chiloquin opened against Bonanza, runner up to the title last season, and then downed Malin, the favorite team to win this year's championship. The Chiloquin boys had little difficulty in smothering the Klamath Wildcats in the final game.

Klamath went into the finals after it had beaten Merrill in the opening round and then drawn a bye in the second round.

The following individual scores, taken from the official scorebook, give Vinson of Bonanza a clear lead in the individual honors. Vinson was one of the outstanding players in the tournament of a year ago.

He scored 26 points against Bonanza and led his team's attack throughout the tournament.

Statist of Malin was second. He scored 23 points in the opening game against Henley and then was held by two by Chiloquin.

A glance at the individual scores, while it will show that Chiloquin had no really outstanding star, reveals that the team was wonderfully well-balanced with nearly every player contributing equally to the victories.

Kansas Runner Avenges Loss

NEW YORK, Feb. 26, (AP)—Four world indoor records fell in Madison Square Garden Saturday as America's outstanding track and field athletes continued their onslaught on time and distance in the National A. A. U. championships before a capacity crowd of 16,000.

Of the record breakers, Glenn Cunningham, Kansas University distance runner ace, stood out as he sprinted to victory in the 1500-meter run, avenging the defeat handed him last week in the Baxter mile by Bill Bonthron, Princeton's barrel-chested ace.

Trojans Win Hoop Honors in California

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 26, (AP)—Basketball Trojans of the University of Southern California today held the Southern Division, Pacific Coast conference, championship and the right to meet the University of Washington in the conference title series.

The Trojans closed their grip on the southern crown by coasting through a slow final contest at Los Angeles Saturday night to defeat U. C. L. Bruins 32 to 23.

California's Bears, runners up in the title race, finished the season with a 43 to 15 win over Stanford at Stanford. It was revenge for the upset 34 to 20 Stanford victory at Berkeley Friday night which pulled the Bears from their first place tie with the Trojans.

JOHN M'GRAW DIES SUNDAY

Fiery Former Leader of New York Giants Passes on.

NEW YORK, Feb. 26, (AP)—John Joseph McGraw is dead after 61 full years of living, and today, wherever baseball is loved and its heroes known, his passing is mourned.

Critically ill for seven days with uremic poisoning and a cancer of the prostate gland, the fiery former leader of the New York Giants died in Ned Rochelle hospital yesterday at 11:50 a. m., while a group of friends prayed in the corridor outside.

Funeral Wednesday

By his side, holding his hand, was his wife, and Charles A. Stoneham, president of the Giants.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday at 10 a. m. from St. Patrick's cathedral, the great gray stone church on Fifth avenue. Final plans for the services have not been completed. The body will be taken to Baltimore immediately following the services and placed in a vault of Cathedral cemetery for later interment.

The body was taken to the big 16-room brick and stucco house in suburban Albany, Minn., where he had hoped to spend many more happy days, while expressions of regret and condolences came from the ends of the earth, from cabinet members and Polo Ground workers, associates of the days with the Baltimore Orioles and baseball players he had developed, from George M. Cohan and newspaper friends, from high and low, rich and poor—baseball fans all.

Guards at Home

There it will remain until just before the services. Pending final decision by Mrs. McGraw who, near collapse, was given a sedative and put to bed, there will be no public viewing of the body.

His associates of the Giants—Stoneman, Leo Bondy, treasurer; Eddie Brannick, assistant secretary—took charge of arrangements and received friends who fought their way through a blinding snow storm to pay their respects in person.

A police guard was placed on the house and a snow plow struggled through the icy streets nearby to keep them clear of drifts.

Enjoyed Retirement

After a life devoted to baseball—He played his first professional game on his 17th birthday April 7, 1890, with Olean, N. Y., team—McGraw retired June 3, 1932, as manager of the New York Giants because of failing health.

"It's taken me 42 years to find out how pleasant it is to live," he said shortly afterward.

He was a great third baseman with Baltimore, St. Louis and then Baltimore again before taking charge of the Maryland team in 1901. The next year, in mid-season, he left to become manager of the Giants, and lived out his baseball days with that team.

Success Unusual

During his 30 years as the roaring, fighting leader of the most consistently great teams in baseball, he won ten National league pennants and three world championships. His greatest success was from 1920-'24, when he won the pennant four times in a row and the world title twice.

The 1924 team was his last leader, however, and the Giants were in last place when he retired eight years later and turned the control over to William H. Terry, whom he had developed.

He retained his interest in the Giants, remained a vice president, went regularly to his office and up to the last conscious moment of his life looked forward to his annual trip to the Giants' training camp.

What baseball meant to him can best be told in his own words:

"There's something about baseball, for a young fellow, that gets in his blood, keeps him going on, overcoming bad beginnings and if the opportunity is there for him, struggling up finally to make the grade. That makes a man of him."

The Badgers clinched the championship by winning 40 to 30 from Linfield college here Saturday night, but had Willamette university to thank for handing Whitman its first defeat of the season. Pacific plays a return game with Linfield.

A full schedule was not played by all the conference teams this season so the title will not be official, but that detracts little from it and the attendant rejoicing.

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HUSKY'S FIVE INVADES SOUTH

Northern Champions Seek Coast Title; O. S. C. Meets Oregon.

SEATTLE, Feb. 26, (AP)—Aiming at the 1931 record of the University of Washington basketball team, which took the northern division title with 14 games won and two lost, and then went on to take the coast conference title, the 1934 five began to "tune up" today for an invasion of the Southland.

This year's team has also won 14 and lost two, through its closing game of the season in beating Washington State here Saturday night, 39 to 23, and its high-powered ace, Bobby (Goose) Galer, has a new conference record of 176 points. He tossed in 14 points in the last game to beat the previous mark of 173.

Northern Titles Few

In 1931, however, when the Huskies won their only coast basketball title, they did it by taking two out of three games here from California. This year, they will meet Southern California at Los Angeles, on March 9, 10 and the 12th if necessary, barring a possible advancing of the dates forward this week end.

Only two other northern teams have ever taken the coast title, Idaho in 1924 and Oregon State last year. The Beavers won last year by beating Southern California, at Corvallis, on their home floor.

Rallies Near Close

Galer's feat Saturday night kept 5,000 fans on edge. Able to score only four points in the first half, he needed 12 in all to beat the 173-mark set last year by Ed Lewis, big Oregon State center.

With seven minutes to go, however, he tossed in the 12th point and then added another basket for good measure, as the crowd raised the roof.

Rex Scott, Cougar guard, stayed with him like a leech most of the time.

The win also kept clear Washington's record of not having lost to Washington State on a Seattle floor in the past 14 years, and equalled the best previous northern record of games won, set by Washington in 1931.

Oregon vs. O. S. C.

The season is over for the Huskies, but Oregon and Oregon State will meet Friday and Saturday nights, at Eugene and Corvallis, in a series which may decide second place, as they are both now tied with seven wins and seven losses.

Idaho meets Washington State at Pullman Friday night and the two meet at Moscow Saturday night, and the season ends.

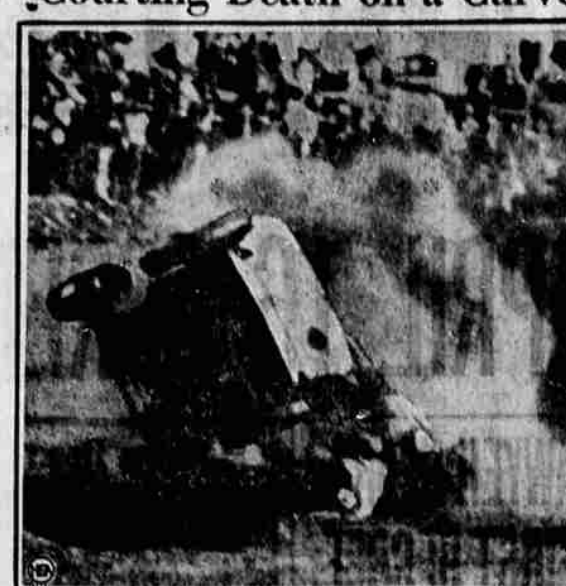
Movie Comedian Bitten by Lion

Loughran, Carnera Dispute Provoked By Sports Writers

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 26, (AP)—A controversy over foot work—not the usual duff pedal manipulation of the prize ring—has arisen just in time to add a final ballyhoo blare to the 15-round heavyweight championship duel of Primo Carnera and Tommy Loughran in the Madison Square Garden stadium here Wednesday night.

This time it's the angry charge of the Philadelphia Sports Writers' association, carried formally to Louis K. MacReynolds, chairman, that the 265-pound champion intends to step on Loughran's foot sometime Wednesday night with intent to cripple, maim or otherwise inconvenience the sprightly challenger.

Partner's Foot Broken

The background of the protest is as follows:

About a week ago George Manley, a good light heavyweight from Denver, was boxing with Carnera and punching him up quite a bit. Somehow Carnera trod with all his weight upon Manley's right foot and the sparing partner limped out of there. His foot is now in a plaster cast, a bone broken.

Yesterday, while Loughran held the spotlight with his final workout in the stadium ring, Carnera boxed with Buck Everett, another light heavyweight from Gary, Ind., and again he stepped down heavily. This time Everett

limped away and the doctors believe his foot too is broken.

Workout Brilliant

Remembering that Loughran frequently has had trouble in the past with a bone that dislocated easily in his right foot, the Philadelphia writers charged indignantly upon the commission again. Unknown to them, Loughran was at the moment practicing upon Eddie Hogan, one of his young sparring partners, one of the cutest tricks he has picked up in fifteen years of ring war. He was treading neatly upon Hogan's toes at every opportunity, to the complete bafflement of the youngster.

Loughran's brilliant workout yesterday, his first outside his regular training camp at West Palm Beach, added to the growing conviction that Tommy has a much better chance of winning the title than the two and a half to one against him indicate.

The Philadelphia phantom, at 136, is in the finest condition of his career and is superbly confident.

Carnera, on the other hand, has not been impressive. He seems worried.

A majority of experts, however, still can't believe that Loughran, for all his skill and speed, can give away 50 pounds at his age, 31, and still win over fifteen rounds. The rising doubt, however, is beginning to attract customers, and prospects are for a gate of close to \$100,000.
