

ROAD PROBLEMS DISCUSSED BY COUNTY COURT

The county court at Thursday's session decided to appoint a board of viewers to determine damages to owners of right-of-way on the road between Crescent and the Willamette highway. Thursday was the day set for the hearing of protests on this route.

William Brock, one of the owners of the right-of-way involved, appeared before the board to discuss the situation. On the advice of District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters, the board decided to proceed with a plan calling for viewers.

Purchase Asked.

County Engineer Joseph Jensen reported that the state highway commission had asked the county to purchase 3.69 acres on one piece of property near Midland in connection with the Weed highway right-of-way purchases. All needed for right-of-way proper is six-tenths of an acre, Jensen said, and the county has acquired that amount. The remainder, he said, was wanted for a borrow pit, and he said it was his understanding the county does not have to furnish material in the case of state highway construction. The district attorney agreed to this interpretation and the highway commission will be informed of the county attitude on this matter.

A. Hughey, proprietor of the Crescent lake resort, appeared before the court to urge the early construction of a stub road from Crescent lake to the Willamette highway. Preliminary surveys have been made on this road and Hughey was assured the county will proceed as soon as possible, perhaps in the early spring. Hughey pointed out that this is one of the heaviest tax-paying districts in the county.

Engineer Jensen said that the new county road to be built from Greensprings highway to the new Weyerhaeuser camp will be wide enough for two-way travel. The lumber company is to provide the right-of-way and clear it.

RAILROAD, K. I. D. MEETING CALLED

With the application already approved by the secretary of the Interior, the Oregon California and Eastern railway officials will appear before the Klamath Irrigation district board Friday to ask for exclusion of the railway property from the boundaries of the district.

The Southern Pacific sometime ago made a similar application. The case was carried to the supreme court where the railroad's position was sustained. In connection with its attempt to obtain exclusion from the district, the O. C. and E. has paid all the construction charges on the property involved, and 20 per cent to cover additional charges. The exclusion in effect will relieve the railroad from operation and maintenance charges.

Because of the precedent of the Southern Pacific case, it is believed whatever action the K. I. D. board may take on the application will largely be a matter of formality.

Veterans Consider Coming Elections

The semi-monthly meeting of the Veterans Political League was held Tuesday night in the circuit court room and was the largest attended, veterans showing great enthusiasm in the coming primary and in congressional action insofar as veteran legislation is concerned.

The next meeting will be held March 13 at 8:00 p. m. in the circuit court room at which time a committee will be appointed to investigate all candidates for public office, county, state and national. It was said.

"The president of the Veterans Political League wishes to impress on all veterans and military organizations that their attendance, influence and membership is desired and that there are no dues or fees in connection therewith," it was announced.

Petitions Filed With County Clerk

Completed petitions for D. E. Fletcher's candidacy for circuit judge have been filed with the county clerk for checking. Fletcher thus far is the only announced candidate for this job, but several others are expected to enter the field. Klamath county comprises the thirteenth judicial district of Oregon.

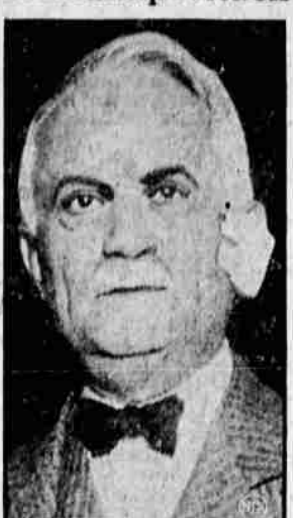

CCC WORKERS AD FOREST FIRE PROGRAM

SALEM, Ore., March 1 (U.P.)—Work of CCC recruits on state and private forest land has accomplished much toward aiding fire prevention, State Forester Lynn Cronemiller said today, but considerable more remains to be done before protection will be adequate.

Eight camps during the first period and six during the second on state and private lands will complete a year's work, April 15, Cronemiller said.

During the year the recruits have constructed 212 miles of telephone line, 41 miles of fire breaks, 19 miles of roadside clearing for fire prevention, 101 miles of truck trails, 21 miles of horse trails, 26 bridges, 3 lookout houses and 3 lookout towers. They covered 500 acres in fire hazard reduction, cleared 11 acres for camp grounds, made classification surveys of 46,005 acres, spent 19,901 man-days fighting forest fires.

A survey, completed by the forestry department shows the following necessary additional requirements, Cronemiller said: 723 miles telephone lines, 60 miles fire breaks, 1,156 miles roadside clearing, 101 miles trailside clearing, 38 lookout houses, 30 lookout towers, 6,100 acres general cleanup, 1,243 miles truck trails, 755 miles horse trails, 91 bridges, 49 acres clearing for camp grounds, 20 camp ground waste disposal plants, 10 miles fences, 39 water systems, 186 miscellaneous buildings.

MARCH'S DEBUT LAMB-LIKE ONE

March came samboing into Klamath Falls like a lamb Thursday, thinking nothing of recent dour predictions of the groundhog, another famous animal weather prophet.

Maximum temperatures for the first day of the first month of spring ranged well over 50, and the low mark for the day was only slightly below freezing.

Several Klamathites lost out on birthdays this year, and were in a quandry whether to celebrate on February 28 or March 1. Among those in such a quandry were "Red" Bud Witte, of 2110 Garden street, and Armand and Roland Ulrich, twin sons of Mr. and Mrs. George Ulrich of Conger avenue. Of course, women whose birthdays fall on February 29, have no problem and are lucky, for they may remain the same age for four years, virtually defying Old Father Time.

The month of February just past was the warmest enjoyed by Klamath county residents for the past 27 years, according to reports at the U. S. weather bureau. The mean temperature for the month was 40.5 degrees, while the normal temperature for the period is 33.1. In 1907 the mean temperature was recorded at 42.5, an all time record.

Precipitation for the month totaled .09 of an inch, nearly half an inch under the normal expectancy of 1.33 inches.

The mean maximum temperature was 51.4 degrees, and the mean minimum 29.6. The highest temperature for the month was recorded at 61 on February 1, and the minimum at 18 on February 9.

There was 7 clear days, 14 partly cloudy and 7 cloudy. Elevation of Upper Klamath lake was recorded at 4142.17 feet on March 1, 1934, against 4141.45 feet on March 1, 1933.

Ewauna Mill Will Open on March 5

The Ewauna Box company mill expects to open for the season's activities on March 5, according to information received from the management Thursday. Only former employees will be placed on the payroll.

The woods camp at Quartz mountain is at work already. Approximately 75 men will be employed at the mill, and 60 are working at the camp.
