# HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS TO TAKE OFFICES

Klamath Union high school civic students will take over all county offices sometime during the first week in April. This announcement was made by Everett Vanderpool, instructor, to the five senior civic classes including about 146 members.

A committee composed of Jack Buchanan, Lena Glath, Melvin Yaden, Bill Stamper and Anna Thrasher held a meeting Tuesday and chose "Independent" and "Progressive" for the two party names.

Whole School to Vote.  
The entire school will be allowed to register and vote at the primary and general elections to be held by the civic groups, March 12 is the primary election day and March 29 general election day. Anna Thrasher has been selected to serve as clerk in charge of the primary registrations. The final registration days have been set for March 9 and 20.

Several meetings will be held to allow nominations and speeches.

Talks were given during activity period today to acquaint the student body with the political plans and to explain the 32 elective and appointive offices to be filled.

Campaign Planned.  
All students will have an opportunity to serve in either major or minor positions. About 30 posters will be placed about the building advertising the election. When Vanderpool taught in Klamath Falls previously, his civic students served as city officers.

"Those who really become active in this work will realize that it is an opportunity of a lifetime," Vanderpool said.

SALEM, March 1. (AP)—Col. Carl Abrams of Salem, state representative from Marion county at the last legislature, today announced his candidacy for the republican nomination as secretary of state at the May primary election.

In a detailed statement outlining his own policies on the conduct of state affairs, Abrams declared he intended, if elected, "to be on the job, to attend all meetings of the board of control and to see that the business of the board is conducted in public, for the public good."

"I arrived at this decision after conducting a statewide survey," Abrams stated. "I secured such gratifying assurances of support as seem to well justify my candidacy. I am assured the people desire a candidate of mature judgment, in the prime of life, and a man who will give his entire time and ability to state business."

Abrams has been engaged in newspaper work in Salem for 30 years, except during the World War when he served as an army officer, and during such times as he has held state positions. He has been employed with the state on the industrial accident commission, as budget officer and as secretary of the board of control. He was a member of the ways and means committee in the last legislature.

# Tax Collections Ahead of 1933

Klamath county 1934 tax collections are still virtually 60 days ahead of last year, according to County Treasurer George P. Taylor.

Taylor received a turnover of \$10,222.89 from the sheriff's office late Thursday. This brings 1934 collections to \$89,767.33, as of February 28. On April 1 last year, the total collection was \$90,523.29.
