

FIRST NAMES PLACED UPON RECALL PAPERS

First signatures to recall petitions for the three members of the county court and the district attorney were obtained following a mass meeting at the circuit court room in the court house last night.

New criticisms were flung at the county officials by John Irwin, president of the Taxpayers' League, sponsor of the recall movement, following his opening statement that "the league has been organized for two years and must do something or cease to function."

Many Undecided
"This is our last stand and we'll see it through," he told an audience of approximately 300 people.

Nearly one-third of those present signified they had not attended a previous mass meeting and were not yet decided as to what action to take concerning the recall.

Irwin announced petition circulators would start the drive to obtain signatures this morning. He then explained the recall charges against County Judge George Grizzle, Commissioners W. F. B. Chase and C. R. Williams and District Attorney T. H. Gillenwaters.

The Tax League president alleged Judge Grizzle had built a potato cellar on his farm in the Mt. Laki district from discarded bridge timbers taken from a rebuilt bridge at Bly. He charged Judge Grizzle with moving approximately 10,000 feet of the timbers from Bly to his farm with county trucks. He also alleged that the judge had obtained a road scraper from the county machine shops to do work on his farm and that members of the Tax League had found this scraper at the Grizzle farm several months later.

Expenses Attacked
The now well-known "adding machine story" was reviewed. Expense accounts of the county court, published this week, were attacked.

"Two of the largest labor expense accounts for the past six months went to relatives of members of the county court," Irwin declared. He referred to one for \$403.21 to A. J. Mahoney, a son-in-law of Commissioner Chase and one for \$564.50 to Rimer Tinsling, a nephew of Judge Grizzle.

The postage expense account for the district attorney's office was attacked; also the traveling expense account of Gillenwaters. "Judge Grizzle told me he would continue doing in the future as he has in the past," Irwin said. "He will sign anything in the interest of harmony. There is too much harmony in the court house now—it's all harmony."

Irwin charged that Gillenwaters admitted incompetency when he sent for a criminologist to investigate the Horan death case. "The expert was paid more than \$100 per day to do the work," Irwin alleged.

A Mr. Nichols, Klamath property owner who said he had been connected with the county court in previous administrations, gave a short talk on incompetency and urged the Tax League's movement be supported if the charges printed on petitions were true.

Several attending the meeting left during the session to register as voters in the county clerk's office.

Irwin announced the first signer of the petitions was Herbert Layton, president of the Relief Workers' Protective Order. From remarks made during the meeting a large number of the audience was apparently receiving relief and working on CWA projects.

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State Liquor Regulation In Effect Today

PORTLAND, March 1, (UP)—Regulation No. 13 requiring that all liquor dispensaries in the state of Oregon close shop on liquor sales between the hours of 1 a. m. and 7 a. m. goes into effect March 1.

Reiteration of the regulation was made after it was learned 22 liquor dispensaries in Oregon City were confused over when the regulation will become effective.

The regulation is in section 8 of the Knox Liquor act. It was posted Feb. 21 and goes into effect six days after posting. It was further said the state liquor commission would recognize city licenses held by dealers until March 31. Dealers must have on file in Salem, however, their application, with bond, by March 10, for a state license.

A new airport, to cost \$20,000, is being planned in Provo, Utah, which has pending an application to secure money from the government.

Hillsboro Man Charged With Intent to Kill

HILLSBORO, Ore., March 1, (UP)—William H. Pointer was in jail today after contention of

an attempt to poison his neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Geiger of Tigard, by putting strychnine in their coffee and flour.

He was specifically charged with assault with intent to kill. According to officers, Pointer

put strychnine in the Geiger coffee and flour while the couple was in church, February 18.

Later Mrs. Geiger made some dumplings using the flour and some coffee containing the deadly poison. She complained the

taste was so bitter she didn't eat any of the poisoned food, but her husband consumed enough to become violently ill.

A physician was called immediately, suspected poison and saved Geiger's life.
