EGG MARKET AT PORTLAND QUOTED WEAK

PORTLAND, March 1. (AP)—Trading in the butter market was just holding its own with a slight surplus and there, despite talk of a clean-up with southern demand. The latter talk was simply to aid storage holders retain the market as long as possible.

Weakness dominated the egg market here with lack of proper grading regulations by the state department of agriculture. Shaded prices were shown on every side and there were many grades of extras at different prices.

There was practically no change in price on country killed meats for the day, even though top values appeared as already reached for the time being, with some indications of recessions if receipts become heavy.

POTATO MARKET BETTER IN SOUTH

According to the shipping report, 724 cars of potatoes were loaded in the United States Wednesday, Oregon supplied 11, Washington 8 and Idaho 100. Maines shipped 309 cars and Minnesota 103.

Demand at Prosser, Idaho was a little slower, but the market held steady, with No. 1 Green Mountains quoted at \$1.95 to \$2.03 a hundred in carloads, f. o. b. shipping point.

Idaho f. o. b. markets were slightly stronger. Demand was good with No. 1 Russets quoted at \$1.25 a hundred, sacked, in carloads, f. o. b. cash track.

At Yakima and nearby points, demand was light and the market dull. No. 1 Russets brought around \$2.5 a ton, in carloads, f. o. b. cash track.

The terminal market at Chicago was stronger this morning, with demand and trading good. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought mostly \$2.10 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outright.

Supplies of Russets at Los Angeles were light but the demand was limited and the market steady. A weaker tendency was noted on other varieties.

No. 1 Idaho Russets brought mostly \$1.75 a hundred, sacked, brokers sales.

At San Francisco a better feeling was prevailing today, but there was little change in prices. No. 1 Oregon Gems from the Deschutes district sold at \$1.40 to \$1.50 a hundred, sacked, and from the Klamath district at \$1.75 to \$1.80.
