

Carnera's Victory Applauded

Man Mountain Given Praise for Easy Win Over Tommy Loughran. Champion Overweight and Off Edge for Fight, Max Baer Scoffs at Big Fellow's Power.

The post mortem accounts of the Carnera-Loughran fight, surprisingly enough, give an abundance of credit to the towering giant from Italy.

"Although all but hog fat, with more than 10 pounds of excess weight, the ease with which he trounced Tommy Loughran stamped him as a man who may not be beaten for many years," wrote Stuart Cameron, sporting editor of the United Press Association.

None of the present day top flight heavyweights will be as good as even money against the huge Italian, Max Baer, of course, is the man with the brightest chance, but few of those who saw the Carnera of Wednesday would bet much against him.

Not that he was at his best. The two days of loafing caused partly by the postponement, and the fact he didn't train too diligently throughout, sent Primo into the ring with enough extra poundage to slow him down. And yet, even so skilful a boxer as Loughran could get nowhere with him, and only Tommy's masterful defense and countering prevented a knockout. Carnera is a much better champion than the general public believes.

Financially the fight was the biggest flop the heavyweight division has known in recent years. Official paid attendance totaled only 624. The gross receipts were \$44,559 and the net, \$33,311.60. Carnera was supposed to get 40 per cent of the net or just under \$16,000 and Loughran 10 per cent or just under \$4,000. Carnera was the only one to show any profit. Loughran and the Madison Square Garden corporation, promoters of the fight, just about covered expenses. Carnera's share has to be divided among his managers.

The small gate is the headache of James Joy Johnston, boxing boss of the Garden corporation. Rumors which couldn't be confirmed were that Johnston would be eased out unless the bout went over in a big way. It didn't, and the Garden board of directors probably will want to know why.

Loughran took his defeat in good nature.

"I still think I can beat him," he said today, "but I'd have to have a referee who would make him break cleaner. My foot was badly bruised when Carnera jumped on it and this bothered me a lot. I'm going to keep on fighting for five years anyway."

Carnera plans to loaf here for several days before taking part in a Stirling benefit show in Georgia. His plans are indefinite after that. He may go to south America for a bout with Paulino.

"I admire Loughran more now I have met him," Primo said, "but I can beat him every time we meet so I hope we meet again."

What does Baer think of all the compliments spread through the press for Carnera?

The arrogant young challenger, watching the fight returns come into the office of the San Francisco Chronicle, said:

"Primo Carnera ought to go and get a reputation for himself if he wants to fight me!"

Quoting Harry B. Smith, sports editor of the Chronicle, here are a few of Baer's remarks:

"The idea of letting a man who was fully 75 pounds lighter go 15 rounds was ridiculous to me and to anyone else who has an idea of what the fight was all about."

"Why, as a matter of fact, it would be about the same as if I should sign for a fight with Billy Petrolle, the welterweight."

"I figured that Carnera should have stopped Loughran before the fight had gone many rounds. As a matter of fact, an hour before the fight was staged I was all 'hot' and ready I couldn't be at the ringside."

"But as I stood in the composing room picking off the fight by rounds that were so slow and draggy as to be exceedingly tiresome, I said to myself that I was enjoying myself more by talking to newspapermen than by being at the ringside."

The boastful youngster wound up his conversation by saying, "If Carnera wants to fight me let him take the challenge and I'll take the champion's end of the purse. That ought to be fair, because I'll draw the money into the gate."

Former Yale Coach Heads N.Y.U. Staff

NEW YORK, March 3. (AP)—New York University has turned to Dr. Marvin A. (Mal) Stevens to lead the Violets out of the football wilderness.

The 34-year-old veteran of ten years' coaching experience at Yale was named head football coach at N. Y. U. by the board of athletic control last night. He signed a one-year contract calling for a salary believed to be around \$7,500.

Stevens' appointment came as a big surprise for it had been thought that Arthur H. (Archie) Roberts, present freshman coach, held the inside track for the job made vacant by the resignation of February 1 of Howard (Jake) Cann.

Head coach at Yale from 1925 through 1932, Stevens now is an instructor in orthopedic surgery and gynecology at Yale medical school of which he is a graduate, and also is a member of the staff of New Haven hospital.

Ambergris Lump Believed Found

SAN RAFAEL, Calif., March 3. (U.P.)—Gold rush days of '49 were recalled today when hundreds of Marin county residents hurried to Sausalito beach to search for "ambergris."

The stampede started when Sam Bourne, 17, found 75 pounds of a gray, smelly, oily substance that he believed to be ambergris, worth \$39,000 at the present market price of \$38 an ounce.

San Francisco chemists however refused to hold out much hope that the find was ambergris, a rare substance disgorged by whales and invaluable in the manufacture of perfume. New York experts were to be asked to test the substance.

Drunken Juryman Brings Mis-Trial

SEATTLE, March 3. (U.P.)—A mis-trial was ordered in the government's case against three men charged with operating a still when it was learned one of the jurors was intoxicated during a previous session.

The juror, J. B. Smith, of Everett, was cited to show cause why he shouldn't be held for contempt of court.

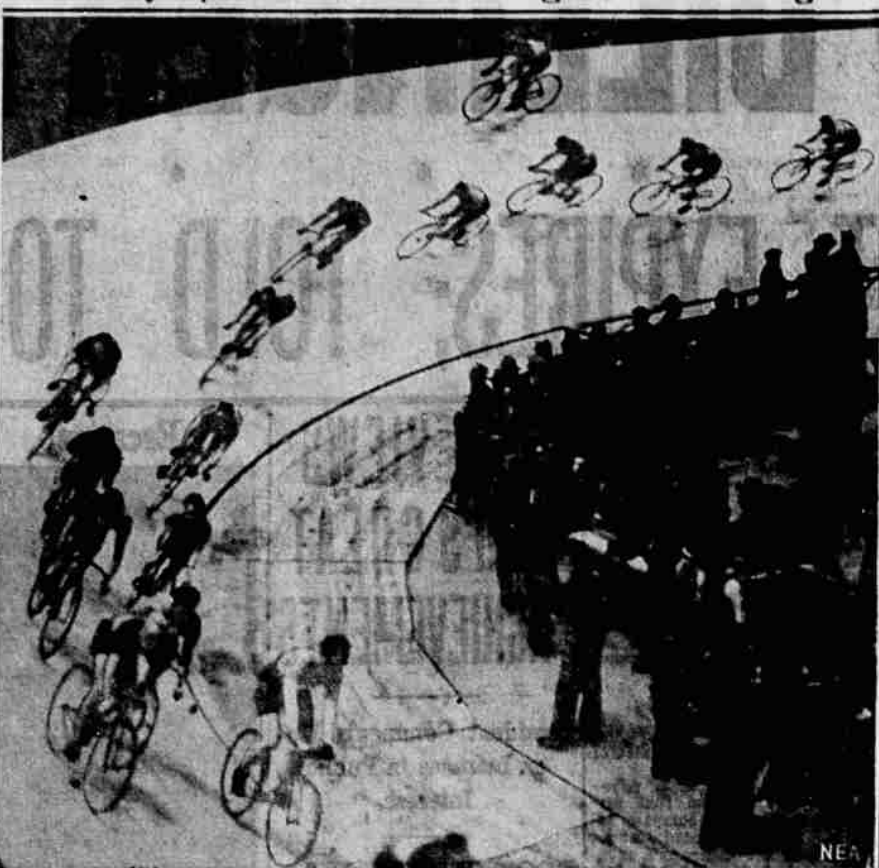

A husky 200 pounder, Schmidt stepped into the Ohio State coaching job which has caused two other men extreme discomfort during the last five years.

At 45 Schmidt feels that he has attained his first great opportunity in football coaching. This opportunity has been mainly on his own making, through his impressive record as football and basketball coach at Texas Christian. His teams won two championships in each sport since 1929.
