

COUNCIL HEARS CITY TRAFFIC LAW DISCUSSED

The police department's downtown traffic campaign came in for major attention at Monday night's council meeting, highlights being:

1. A protest from one group of merchants against limiting double parking to the block on Main street between Eighth and Ninth streets, and a statement by Chief Shaw that motorists who stop in front of any store to get their packages will not be "tagged."

2. A proposal by Chief Shaw that 30-minute parking be imposed on all side streets from Fifth to Tenth, inclusive, between Pine street and Klamath avenue.

Similar Privileges Asked

Walter Weisendanger appeared before the council. He cited a newspaper report that double parking on a restricted basis was to be permitted between Eighth and Ninth streets on Main, and said he represented a group of merchants between Eighth and Eleventh streets, asking that the same privilege be granted in front of their stores.

Police Chief Shaw stated that the traffic campaign is at present in the experimental stage, and that there was no intention to discriminate against other merchants in announcing the Eighth-Ninth street regulation. That block, he said, is the most congested business street in town, due to the fact there is no alley in the rear of stores there, and presence there of a large number of grocery and business houses.

Mayor Mahoney said that the intention is to be fair with all the merchants and to avoid discrimination of any kind.

Chief Shaw said that there will be no tagging of motorists who stop in front of any store to get their packages. He said that he is convinced enforcement of 30-minute parking will permit curbside parking on the streets where there are only one or two grocery stores in a block.

The chief proposed the council amend the city parking ordinance to include the side streets from Fifth to Tenth, inclusive, in the 30-minute zone. No action was taken, the council expecting to hold a special session later in the week on this matter.

Sergeant Leigh Ackerman of the police department said the volume of traffic downtown is about double what it was a year ago. He said that on last Saturday between 2:30 and 4 p. m. 64 automobiles were parked overtime on Main street between Seventh and Ninth streets.

The police department representatives reported efforts are being made to set aside vacant lots in the business district for the use of professional and business people who need to park all day. By enforcing 30-minute parking on the main streets, he said, these will be kept open for the moving traffic.

New Signs Proposed

Policeman Arnold said that signs on the streets are inadequate, and the council gave the finance and street committees power to act on a request from the police chief that signs totaling about \$25 in cost be prepared for use.

A spokesman for the Relief Workers Protective association appeared before the council and asked for an "answer to the immediate demands presented to you last Monday night."

Councilman J. J. Keller said there had been no opportunity to meet with the county relief committee as decided upon a week ago, and no report was to be made. The relief spokesman said that an open hearing is to be held at the courthouse Wednesday night to which the mayor and council are invited, and suggested that a report on the demands be made at that time. One of those demands is that the city provide supplemental relief.

Mayor Mahoney said the council would have to transact business in the council chambers. The relief group spokesman said that the county relief committee, Nelson Reed of the federal relief employment office, and W. H. Bailee, had been invited to the circuit court room meeting.

C. D. Withers appeared to ask the council to take action on applications sent by log-haulers to the state public utilities commissioner for permission to haul logs over city streets. After considerable discussion, including an explanation of the truck and law by District Attorney T. R. Gillenwaters, the council voted to approve all filed applications subject to local ordinances.

Hearing Wanted

It was announced that local hotel men want a hearing before the council adopts a proposed new ordinance changing the license rates for such establishments. There was some discussion as to the whereabouts of a scheduled rates which had been drawn up, and finally Mayor Mahoney announced he had found the schedule in his "file." He drew a slip of paper from his pocket and read the schedule as follows:

Hotel—First 10 rooms, 25 cents; second 10 rooms, 15 cents; all rooms above 20, 10 cents.

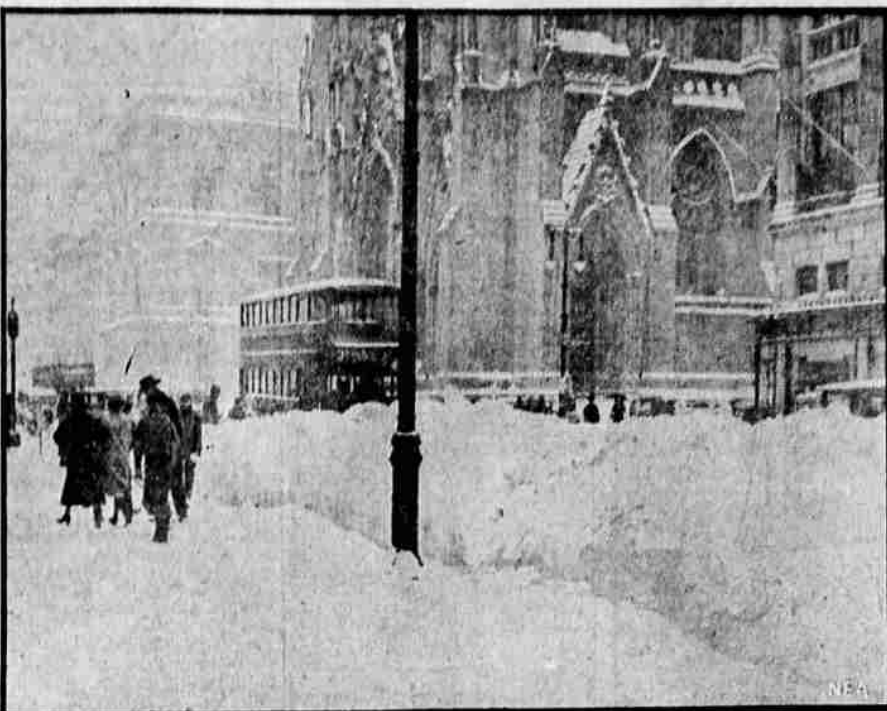
Apartment house—Three apartments, \$1.50; each additional apartment, 25 cents.

The council received a communication from Dr. G. A. Massey stating that unpleasant odors from the city's sewage disposal plant below Lake Ewauna should be removed. The matter was referred to the health committee.

Tax Matters Up

District Attorney Gillenwaters called the council's attention to the petition filed by the California Oregon Power company asking a refund of taxes allegedly unlawfully collected. He said

The county court had set March 15 for a hearing on the matter. Mayor Mahoney said the city intended to fight Copec's request, and City Attorney Leavitt said that he expects to submit a demurrer to the petition which will fully sustain the city's position.

Fred O. Small, chairman of the board of the Community Congregational church, asked permission to move a small building from Wantland and Division streets to the church property on Garden and Martin streets. He said Chilcote and Smith had given the building to be used for Girl Scout purposes, and that R. B. Hadley would move it free of charge. The matter was referred to the street committee.

Police Chief Shaw reported 75 arrests in February, and total collections of fines and forfeited bonds of \$544.60.

Fire Report

Fire Chief Bardell reported February fires caused a total loss of \$326.35. Property at risk was valued at \$38,000.

William Humphrey demanded that the city do something about nails, cans and other rubbish he alleged had been removed from a burned church to Plum street, where they constitute a tire hazard. Unless action is taken, he said, he will have to bring suit.

Engineer Thomas said he would look into the matter.

Several business applications were passed upon or referred. One application asked was for the Cascade Distributing company, operating as wholesale distributors of 14 percent alcoholic content.

To the police committee was referred an application by Bertha Duke for permit to operate a taxi stand with two cars. It was stated Police Chief Shaw had said three cars are operated.

CAR DELIVERIES SHOWING INCREASE

DETROIT, March 6—Retail delivery of 4,646 Plymouth cars last week exceeded the deliveries of the previous week by 24.5 per cent and a gain of 178 per cent over the same comparable week of last year. H. G. Moeck, general sales manager of the Plymouth Motor corporation, announced here today. This established another all-time Plymouth sales record, compared with the same week of other years, Moeck said.

Shipments of 7558 Plymouths for the week as against 1955 shipped during the same period last year, is an increase of 286.6 per cent.

Unfilled orders on hand to February 23 totaled 68,609, as compared with 11,934 last year, an increase of 391.5 per cent. Orders received for this month and March now total \$2,566, against 18,248 orders last year, a 1934 increase of 352.5 per cent. Shipments to date this month total 23,907 units, Moeck said, and establishes another Plymouth record over the same period of all previous years.

"Our retail deliveries already have reached the May 6 volume of last year," Moeck said, "placing us approximately two months ahead of the 1933 business. This is a particularly healthy outlook in view of the fact that the so-called automobile 'buying season' has not yet been reached. It is indicative of a restoration of public confidence and a gradual return to conditions that more nearly approach normal than at any time in the past three years."

NOVEL ORCHESTRA HERE ON SATURDAY

The Royal Bell Ringers, appearing at the Willard hotel, Saturday and Sunday under the auspices of the American Legion auxiliary, will present a new and novel entertainment for people of Klamath Falls and vicinity. It has been several years since an orchestra of bell ringers has been presented in this city or southern Oregon.

In addition to the bell orchestra there will be a generous number of selections on the glass-o-phone (tumblers) and selections by the male quartet.

The group of five men comprising the orchestra are experts in the art of bell ringing. Each bell of the 206 used is tuned and arranged chromatically so that it represents a keyboard, and each hand of the five men represents one of the 10 fingers of a pianist. This permits the rendering of selections which would be impossible in the old method of bell ringing.

THREE STUDENTS SEEKING OFFICE

Three students have announced their candidacy for the office of county judge for the high school primary election on the "Independent" party. Other office-seekers have signed up and are getting campaign work under way.

Bob Napier, graduate of Ashland junior high school, football star, and honor student at K. U. H. S., was one of the first to announce his candidacy. Bob Richards, also a football player, has been in the high school four years and has taken part in debate, glee club, dramatics and has been a member of the boys quartet all four years. Perry Hawkins, the third candidate on the "Independent" ticket, came to Klamath Falls from Washington. He has been active in declamation, debate, and has been an honor student.

The primary election will be held on March 12 under the direction of the senior civics students. The final election will be held on March 29. The winners will take charge of the county offices for the day of April 3 instead of April 5 as first announced.

Klamath Liquor Dispensary Has Good Business

A total of \$1,443.45 from liquor sales and permits was taken in by the state liquor store in Klamath Falls during its first week of business, according to figures released Monday afternoon.

Three hundred and twenty-nine permits were sold during the week, and on Saturday, March 3, the store transacted the greatest volume of business. On that day 82 permits were sold, and \$381.90 taken in for liquor sales.

On the opening day, February 26, the proceeds from sales of liquor amounted to \$174.95, and 71 permits were issued. Next to Saturday's sales, this was the best day recorded by the store.

Since the opening of the state establishment, everything has been perfectly orderly, according to the clerical force, and it has not been necessary to refuse the sale of a permit. Neither permits nor liquor are sold to intoxicated persons or minors.

The store opens at 11 o'clock each week day morning and remains open until 8 o'clock at

INDIANS HEAR NEW PROGRAM FROM COLLIER

RAPID CITY, S. D., March 6. (AP)—Delegates to the four-day conference of plains Indians here carried details of Commissioner John Collier's proposed new program back to the reservations in five states today.

Uncommitted on the Howard-Wheeler bill Collier is sponsoring, some unconvinced of its merits, but all hopeful it may improve their status, the representatives of 18 tribes in North and South Dakota, Nebraska, Montana and Wyoming adjourned harmoniously last night.

Commissioner Collier, christened "Spotted Eagle" by a Black-foot group which adopted him into their tribe with full ceremony yesterday, headed for Gallup, N. M., with part of his staff for a Navajo conference March 12 and 13. Another group, including William Zimmerman, assistant commissioner, goes to Salem, Ore. for a council Thursday and Friday.

The Indian delegates took no official action on the pending bill which would provide a new land policy, optional self-government in chartered communities, special educational facilities and Indian courts. Instead they are taking the question to their tribes for a final decision.

Advantages Pointed

Collier made it clear in his final address that tribes which want to be excluded from operation of the proposed law, can do so.

"But use care in reaching a decision," he added, "I believe most of you will want the bill when you understand it thoroughly. It takes nothing from you, but adds a great deal you want."

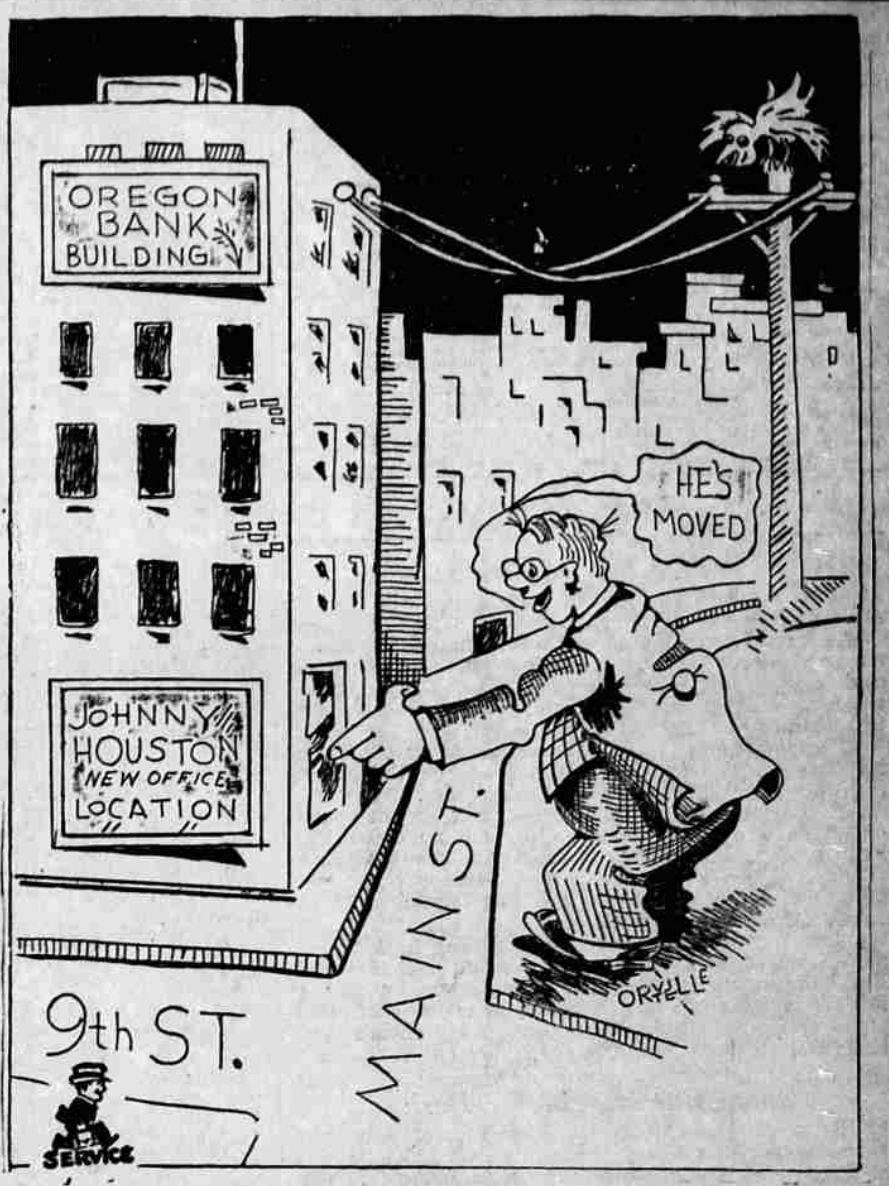
Saying there are "cattlemen, lessees and bankers who don't want you to hold your land," Collier told the Indians not to "follow us or anyone else blindly" in deciding on the bill.

BELLINGHAM, March 6. (AP)—With the majority opposed to the new self government proposal of the government, representa-

tives of northwest Indian tribes will leave Wednesday for Chemawa, Oregon to attend a conference on a bill before the United States senate which would carry

out this proposal. Don McDowell, of Blanchard, president of the northwest federation of American Indians, will head the delegation from What-

com and Skagit counties. The delegation will include representatives of the Lummi, Nooksack, Swinomish and upper Skagit tribes.
