National and Local Markets

EGG MARKET CONFUSED BY "EXTRAS"

PORTLAND, Mar. 6, (AP)—The descriptive word "extras" meant but little in the egg trade here today as a wide range of eggs under this title was being distributed. There was a great difference between the so-called "extras" being offered for sale generally and those that were being paid for in the country.

In some quarters here today sales of reputed "extra eggs" were being made at retail down to 15 cents a dozen, although wholesalers were paying up to 16 cents for supplies of top grade. General steadiness was suggested in the market for cube and for print butter locally with no change during the late session of the produce exchange or on the open market. Butterfat was firm and scarce.

Prices were being held firm all through the market for live poultry here with continued shortage of offerings in practically all lines.

Demand for turkeys was continued here to a surprising degree and prices were being held generally intact. Quality was badly mixed but some rather good stuff was still available.

Despite the efforts of various interests to secure money for dressed hogs, trade was about able to hold prices received just prior to the increasing of the government processing tax.

Further cutting of asparagus prices became almost general here for California during the day with still lower values being named at the source. Few sales were beyond 7-8c lb. for long-green.

As a result of the fact that California - Arizona grapefruit selling somewhat below orange prices, sales here of the former were increasing. Entire citrus fruit price list was steady for the day.

General trading in Sandy river smelt was around \$1.25 box of 50 lbs. which is a low price considering the state tax, the price to fishermen and hauling expense.

Some spring lambs were due within a day or so, demand was keen.

Country killed veal and lambs were steady.

Potatoes and onions were slow locally.

New potato market was weaker with some price shading.

CATTLE MARKET HIGHER MONDAY

SO. SAN FRANCISCO, March 6, (AP)—Hogs, 1550, including 1150 direct, very slow. Most bids and few sales now 6-10c lower than Friday; early top \$5.30 on double deck 214 lb. California butchers; well sorted \$4.80; most other bids \$5.30 down, with sorts.

Cattle: 1200, including 90 direct, active, steers mostly steady; cows strong to 25c higher; general quality desirable; not many loads available to sell under \$5.50; about 11 cars fairly good and good \$5.40-\$5.45 lb. fed steers and yearlings \$5.75-\$5.85, few \$5.50; top \$6 on some 865 lb. New Mexicos; load 865 lb. fed steers; few loads medium 1050 lb. down \$5.35-\$5.50; car good to choice 1464 lb. Colorado and load 1218 lb. \$5.75. Good range cows eligible \$4 or above; few lots very medium \$3-\$3.50; few dairy type \$3.50 down.

Calves: 125, including 75 direct, steady; package around 125 lb. California vealers \$7.40 straight.

Sheep: 2200, including 500 direct, run largely fed woolled lambs; demands wide. Partial clearance lamb July 15-25c or more higher, considering quality. BOSTON WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, March 6, (AP)—(U. S. D. A.)—A scattered demand was received on Ohio and similar fleeces. Fine Ohio delaine wool was sold in small quantities at 35c to 36c grease basis. French combing staple out of similar lines realized 30c to 31c in the grease. Strictly combings 48s, 50s, 1-blood Ohio wool sold at 40c in the grease compared with a sale a few weeks ago at 41c. Some houses continued to hold firmly at 41c to 42c for their 1-blood Ohio wool.

"Torture Bandit" Sentenced to Hang

LOS ANGELES, March 6, (AP)—The first death sentence under California's new anti-kidnaping law was meted out today to William Tanner, convicted "torture bandit," who was doomed to hang at Folsom penitentiary May 11.

Superior Judge Charles Fricke, who presided at the trial of Tanner and Harry Brooks, denied Tanner's plea for a new trial.

Tanner's counsel contended the law was so stringent that "it makes almost any robbery also a kidnapping." Judge Fricke, however, upheld the statute as sound legislation.

OREGON POTATO SHIPMENTS 13

Carlott shipments of potatoes amounted to 333 cars. Oregon supplied 13, Washington 31 and Idaho 211. Main shipped 175 cars. Total loadings for the season to date, amounting to 161,300 cars, are about 25,500 more than were shipped during the corresponding period last year. Shipments of new potatoes this spring amount to almost 50 cars, or 350 more than were shipped at this time last year.

The Presque Isle f. o. b. market was very dull with wire inquiry light and the demand very slow. There were practically no haulings on account of the condition of the roads. Sales were too few to establish prices.

At Idaho Falls the market was slightly weaker, with demand and trading light. A few sales of No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$2.20 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. cash track.

In the Twin Falls-Burley district, demand and trading were light and the market slightly weaker. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$1.25 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. cash track.

At Yakima demand for No. 1 Russets was slower and the market unsettled and showed a weaker tendency. No. 2 Russets, however, were selling on a steady market. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$23 a ton, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. cash track.

No. 2 Russets were \$18 a ton, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. cash track. No. 1 Idaho Russets in closed mug packs brought \$2.05 to \$2.10 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outright.

The Los Angeles market was dull, with supplies liberal and demand and trading slow. Two few sales were reported to quote.

At San Francisco the market was about steady, with supplies moderate and demand and trading light. No. 1 Deschutes Gem of fair quality brought \$1.40 to \$1.50 a hundred, sacked, sales to jobbers. No. 1 Klamath Gems \$1.50 to \$1.80 a hundred, depending upon quality, while No. 1 Yakima Russets were mostly \$1.50.

Sheep, receipts, 5500; market active; fed steers and yearlings strong to 15c higher; \$7.50 paid for yearlings; lower grade steers and yearlings strong; bulls steady with Monday's decline; vealers,
