## KLAMATH TEAM IN 3RD ROUND

Chiloquin Five Defeats St. Mary's, 31-11 in Opener.

Medford, Ore., March 9. (AP)—Central Point, Chiloquin, Madras, Lakeview and Smith River each had scored double victories in the seventh annual Intentional Southern Oregon basketball meet at Ashland, under the auspices of the Southern Oregon Normal school.

This morning's scores: Chiloquin 35, Reedport 19. Prospect 35, Gold Hill 17. Eagle Point 14, Phoenix 19. Drain 28, Talent 21.

ASHLAND, Ore., March 9.—(Special)—A fast Chiloquin high school team won Klamath county Thursday afternoon smothered St. Mary's academy of Medford, 31 to 11.

The victory sent Chiloquin, champions of the Klamath "B" league, into the second round.

The Klamath combination, winner of the Southern Oregon Normal school tournament last season appeared one of the strongest contenders for this season's championship. Chiloquin was never headed by St. Mary's, and established a large score without any particular effort.

Several hundred persons witnessed the contest. The Chiloquin-St. Mary's contest was one of the best of the day.

Twenty-five teams from all sections of Southern Oregon have entered the contests.

## Portland Team in Finals for Hoop Pennant

SEATTLE, March 9. (AP)—On the expected arrival today of Ed Lewis, former Oregon State all-American center returning from a "wild goose" trip back toward Kansas City, the Portland team today counted much in their battle for the Pacific northwest independent basketball title. Lewis was en route here last night by train from Denver, where he had gone to join a Los Angeles team headed for the national A. U. tournament at Kansas City. Declared ineligible to play with the Los Angeles team after playing all season at Portland, he turned back.

His expected arrival to rejoin the Ollers in their title clash tonight with the Gilmore Ollers, of Seattle, cheered his mates, who had a hard fight on their hands last night to win from the Chelalis American Legion five, 24 to 16.

Johnny Fuller, former Washington player, was the individual star and high scorer in last night's game, counting 13 of his team's 13 points in Gilmore's win over Yakima. The night before he had 16 points.

The Gilmore team, if it wins tonight, will leave within an hour for Kansas City for the national tournament.

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## Ex-Champion Will Enter Ski Carnival

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Ore., March 9. (Special)—A recent holder of the national ski jumping championship and winner of 44 prizes, including 19 loving cups, Alfred W. Orha, Ironwood, Mich., will take part in the second annual Crater Lake Winter Sports Carnival at Government Camp, March 19.

He arrived in Klamath Falls this week and is now in the park training for the carnival, sponsored by the Crater Lake Ski club, Bend Skyliners, the Rogue Snowmen and the chambers of commerce of Medford and Klamath Falls.

Orha won the national championship in 1925 as a representative of the Chicago Forest Preservers club and began his championship record as a youngster when he took national honors in the boys' class for 1909, 1910 and 1911. He entered the ranks of the professional jumpers in 1915 and followed this by calling for six years, after which he sought to regain his amateur standing to enter the Olympic games in Europe. He qualified but was unable to take part due to excessive expenses.

Three years ago he decided to forsake the sport and has followed this until arriving in southern Oregon when the old urge returned. He is now 36 years old and anxious to repeat his official record jump of 197 feet. This distance can be easily made on the Government Camp ski jump now under construction.

Last year Orha received prominent mention by Ripley in Believe It Or Not for a feat hard to believe. He jumped from South Dakota into Iowa, the state line cutting across the jump which was located in both states. Other features of the carnival program are rapidly going ahead, providing an afternoon filled with action.

## Naval Academy Boxer Displays Much Promise

ANNAPOLIS, Md., March 9. (AP)—Slade D. Cutter, 215-pound heavyweight boxer of the Naval Academy, has all the potential ability necessary to become the world's champion, in the opinion of H. M. (Spike) Webb, navy's veteran coach.

Cutter, fighting his third year at the academy, has not lost a bout during that time although he was held to a draw in a fight last year.

Webb, who handled Gene Tunney during the World war before he rose to championship heights, declared Cutter is a better prospect than Tunney when he was fighting in the marines.

"Tunney became champion," Webb said. "When I handled him in 1918 he didn't have half as much on the ball as Cutter." "Cutter is thirty-five pounds heavier, he punches harder with both hands and he can take punishment, potentially he has everything that's needed."

"Do you think Cutter could beat Carnarva?" Webb was asked. "Sure," the navy mentor replied with a smile. "He could do that now."

## Bridge Tournament Contrary to Laws

HARROGATE, Yorkshire, Eng., March 9. (AP)—The chief constable of this health resort has decided that bridge—even tournament bridge—is gaming and, consequently, contrary to law.

As a result the British world bridge congress today cancelled its plan to meet here.

The chief constable warned the management of the hotel that it would be liable to prosecution for allowing gaming on the premises if it accommodated the tournament.

## HUSKIES PLAY TROY TONIGHT

Northern, Southern Fives Meet for Championship at L. A.

LOS ANGELES, March 9. (AP)—Washington's fast moving basketball team, seeking the Pacific coast championship, will attempt to prove at the expense of Southern California here tonight that the best defense is a good offense.

Winners of the northern division title with 14 victories out of 14 starts, the Huskies hope to do what the southern division opponents of the Trojans failed to accomplish consistently, and that is, crash through Southern California's stubborn man-for-man defense.

Coach Sam Barry's five won the southern division crown and the right to meet Washington in the playoff by the simple method of getting possession of the ball and retaining it as long as possible or until it had scored. As a result the Trojans won nine games and lost three, a record hardly as impressive as that of the team coach Hec Edmundson will turn loose at the Olympic auditorium tonight.

Not only will the series determine the champion, but it will go a long way toward deciding who is the top scorer of the coast group since the division leaders, Bob Galer of the north and Lee Guttoro, of the south, will be flung together in a goal shooting duel. The team to win two games takes the title, with the second contest scheduled for tomorrow night.

Galer, in 16 games, collected 176 points with 68 field goals and 40 gift tosses. Guttoro's total was 140 in an even dozen contests, including 60 field goals and 30 free throws.

## LEGION HALL HEAVIES CLASH

Al Karasick, Charley Hansen Ask Meeting With Cox.

Al Karasick and Charley Hansen, disaster dealing heavyweights, meet tonight at the Legion hall in an elimination contest. The goal for the winner will be an opportunity to match strength, skill and toughness against "King Kong" Cox, the giant 220-pounder who has been upsetting all competition in the Northwest.

Hansen, a newcomer as far as personal appearances are concerned, but a wrestler whose reputation has preceded him, will hold a strong weight advantage over the Russian Lion from Portland. The Seattle grappler has been listed in the vicinity of 210, with Karasick to enter the ring near his customary 195.

Both wrestlers look forward to a meeting with Cox, and this ambition should go a long way toward stirring up a rugged encounter tonight. If Karasick gets by Hansen, his record in the Legion hall will be unblemished. The Lion is the only regularly appearing main eventer who has withstood the challenges of more than a dozen opponents.

NEW YORK, March 9. (AP)—The man who hopes to be the second German to hold the world's heavyweight championship, and the daftest boxer the division has ever known, are to square off in Madison Square Garden tonight, each hoping a victory will lead towards a title shot.

The principals are Walter Neusel, the rugged blonde from the Westphalian coal fields, and Harry Krakow, known to the trade as King Levinsky.

For all of the Kingfish's loudly shouted tributes to the grandeur of his fists prowess, the heavyweight title layout would be altered not one bit by a victory over Neusel. Primo Carnera, who will have at least a word in the matter, has indicated he has not the slightest interest in another fight with the Kingfish from whom he has already won two decisions.
