

Eight Teams Qualify for Tournament

Pelicans Begin Examining Competition for State Championships. Many District Titles Still Unsettled. San Francisco Writer Records Street's Praise for Klamath Falls Hurler.

The Klamath Pelicans, supreme basketball combination of Southern and Central Oregon, will offer a considerable challenge to the rest of the state when it enters the Salem championships next week. This is the third of Dwight French's title-winning teams, and apparently it is the best.

High school teams all over Oregon are fighting for a place in the tournament, and the size and shape of opposition from many sections will not be known until the end of this week. The Pelicans, defeating Redmond Friday and Saturday, are one of eight teams already deciding their district championships.

Dick Godfrey, sport writer from the Oregonian, has completed the list of winners thus far along in the regional elimination. Here is a glance at some of the foes the Pelicans may meet at Salem:

Salem, of course, goes into the tournament automatically as the host city school. Salem, too, will be the defending champion from the 1933 tourney.

Columbia University preps of Portland have won the title in District 16. Columbia was recently admitted to the association, and this will be its first year in the championship play.

The Dalles, Astoria, La Grande, Silverton and Pendleton, all veterans of tournament competition, have succeeded in shoving aside their district rivals to win their respective titles.

The opportunity to dwell upon the progress of some Klamath county rookies at a coast league training camp is limited. Not many of the youths from sandlots in these parts manage to get that far. Johnny Rohr, protégé of Red Saunders, has come to the front pretty rapidly with the Mission Reds.

Here is what Curley Grieve, sports writer for the San Francisco Examiner, says about the Klamath youth:

"After breakfast this morning and before practice, Manager Charles 'Gabby' Street, the old sarge, glanced at the hotel register.

"Any new ones" he inquired.

"Yeh, Kid named Johnny Rohr came in. From a C. C. C. camp at Butte Falls, Ore. Home is Manteno, Ill., near Kankakee."

"Lots of youngsters come and go. No reason to expect much from this boy, recommended Catcher John Fitz by Red Saunders, former hurler and scout."

"Out on the ball field a little later, Street yelled for Rohr. He ambled over to the sidelines. Big framed, 216 pounds and 6 feet 3 inches tall, he gazed down into the leather face of 'Gabby'."

"Can you whip 'em in there?" inquired Street.

"A little," was the reply.

"Well, let's see you."

"The youngster warmed up with Fitzpatrick. Fitz called for a sponge. The kid went to the mound for batting practice. He was awkward, clumsy. He didn't know the first thing about putting weight behind the ball or even standing on the rubber."

"But suddenly he cut loose—and a little while he rolled up to the batting plate. Street almost jumped from the dugout. The kid cut loose again. It happened and Fitz couldn't stop it—too fast. By this time Manager Charles 'Gabby' Street was behind the cage, eyes popping out of his head. Another Walter Johnson."

"Batters complained the ball wasn't big enough—and catchers complained about their hands. But 'Gabby' was rubbing his maulers with glee.

"Now that," he commented, "is what I call a fast ball pitcher. And he doesn't even know how to throw."

"Before the afternoon had gone far, Street had Rohr, bashful and amazed at the sudden interest on the side lines for instruction. The Mission pilot wasted no time.

"He started showing the 22-year-old over-night sensation how to pitch—and stand and throw."

"Fitzpatrick says he's faster than any pitcher on the club. Street said he's just a shade slower than Johnson, and faster than many so-called speed-ball hurlers."

"Shortly after his return to the hotel his name was attached to a contract, and the 'new find' was the word that went out from all players."

"Rohr is just a green youngster who happened to be seen pitching in Klamath Falls last year."

"He has had little experience. His control is surprising good and his fast one—well 'Gabby' has visions already, and the old sarge has been around long enough not to become enthusiastic about every kid who clutters up a ball field."

"You'll hear from this boy in two years," he said. He doesn't know anything about pitching, and so should develop quickly."

"Street likes his prospects green and pliable, young and receptive."

"Yeh, that boy's a comer."

SKI JUMPERS SET FOR MEET

Impressive Sport Event Scheduled Sunday At Crater Lake.

Providing southern Oregon with its first major snow meet, the second annual Crater Lake Winter Sports carnival next Sunday at Government camp will present the most impressive gathering of ski artists ever seen in this section. Carnival officials have received assurance representatives will be present from several northwest and California clubs, including the Mt. Shasta Snowmen, the Cascade club of Portland and the Bend Skyliners. A number of practice jumps were made Sunday by Crater Lake Ski club members from the natural ski jump now being completed near Government camp. Good distances were made and speeds exceeded 90 miles per hour. Magnus Hansen, Klamath Falls, made numerous leaps and declared the jump has some of the best possibilities he had seen on the coast. Hansen is adept with the skis and formerly took part in winter tournaments in Norway, where he made many leaps of nearly 300 feet in length.

Ostmo On Jumps
Alf Ostmo, well known in Klamath county, made several jumps and is looking forward to next Sunday when the new take-off will have been completed. J. W. Robertson from Chilopqua also performed well on the jump.

Pete Yancy of Klamath Falls took his first work-out since an injury at the jump last week, as well as Ostmo and Hansen, have taken part in past tournaments at Fort Klamath on Washington's birthday.

Included among the jumpers expected next Sunday from Mt. Shasta are Robert Hyam, brother of Hjalmar Hyam, who will represent the Cascade club. The former will jump as well as race. Others from Mt. Shasta are: Pete Peterson, Larry Evanson, Mark Olsen, Pank Lambert and Jarnis Carberg. J. W. Schuler of Mt. Shasta will act as one of the judges.

Kid jump judges with Chris Koster of Bend, trainer for the northwest association of judges. The third judge will be selected from Klamath Falls or Medford.

Record Leaps Likely
Alfred Ohn, former national ski jump champion, Ironwood, Mich., who will take part in Sunday's events believes leaps of nearly 300 feet will be made. He has already made long leaps since arriving in the park a few days ago. John Elvrum, Cascade club, holder of the national amateur title, will find some of his keenest competition in Ohn's performance.

For the racing events are steadily going ahead and will again present a number of Klamath county favorites. Pete Hansen, winner of last year's 23-mile Crater Lake and return race, has been practicing for some time on long distance runs and will enter the eight-mile race of the afternoon's program. The course brings the contestants past the spectators several times. O. K. Puckett, Keno, who missed the national 11-mile championship by two minutes in 1932, will enter the contest, as well as Hyam, who beat Puckett by those two minutes. There will also be entrants from Bend and Mt. Shasta.

Parking Available
Ample parking space is being provided by the National Park service for hundreds of machines expected to bring a record breaking crowd. In addition to the feature events, the carnival, sponsored by the Crater Lake Ski club, Bend Skyliners, Rogue Snowmen and the chamber of commerce of Klamath Falls and Medford, will provide a program of numerous special events for all classes of competition, women, boys and girls and novices. A four-mile ski race is open to class B contestants, bringing racers from all parts of the state, in addition to quite a number of shorter races.

Southern State Demands Leader
SACRAMENTO, Cal., March 12. (UP)—Californiaans are demanding a forceful leader to help pull the state out of its financial troubles and devise a program for alleviation of depression. The State Treasurer, Charles G. Johnson said Saturday upon his return from one of many speaking tours he has made.

"The man in the street is not interested in politics," Johnson said. "He is looking for real accomplishment, and when he goes to the polls this year, he will have more than party interests in mind. He will demand a leader. Voters generally are taking more active interest in government officers. This was shown definitely at the last general election when the people of the nation forgot about party lines, and voted instead for a man."

SANTA ROSA, Cal., March 12. (UP)—Three Indian youths were held under heavy guard in the county jail Saturday as precaution against possible threats of lynching after one of the Indians confessed to the brutal fire water" slaying of P. D. Echman, contractor.

He called us drunken Indians and swore at us," Sheriff Mike Flohr said Eddie Billy, 18-year-old Digger Indian, confessed as the motive for the crime.

Enraged because Echman refused to drink with the Indians, Billy bashed Echman's skull with a heavy willow club and threw his body into a shallow creek, the sheriff said the youth confessed.

Billy, with two Indian companions, Byron Tillotson, 26, and Herbert Elliott, 17, had been sitting on the creek bank drinking two gallons of wine.

Oregon to Blend Its Own Liquor
PORTLAND, March 12. (UP)—State of Oregon will blend its own liquors within three months, it was admitted Saturday by George L. Sammis, Knox law administrator.

"We plan a liquor rectifying plant which will enable us to sell blended alcoholic beverages at a price considerably less than that asked for finished products," he said.

The state has a federal permit to import liquor and proposes to obtain Scotch malts and other liquors and wines, Sammis said. The commission already has applied for a rectifying permit.

Klamath Wins Final Contest From Redmond
The Klamath Pelicans cinched a district basketball championship title and a chance to play in the state high school tournament at Salem when it opens March 20 by defeating Redmond 41 to 20 in the northern city Saturday night.

The game was the second in the district championship. Klamath defeated Redmond Friday night 45 to 28 and had both games well in hand throughout, according to Coach Dwight French.

At the half-time period Klamath led 19 to 6.

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HUSKIES EVEN TROY SERIES

U. S. C., Washington Meet Tonight in Coast Title Game.

LOS ANGELES, March 12. (AP)—Two of the most evenly matched basketball quintets ever to battle for the Pacific Coast conference title—Washington and Southern California—will meet tonight in the third and deciding game of the 1934 championship series.

Staking a gallant finish Saturday night after it seemed their best efforts were in vain, the Huskies, Northern division representatives, defeated Southern California 43 to 41 in a wild, rough over-time contest, the Trojans had taken the first contest 37 to 25 Friday night.

The opposing teams faced conflicting problems in the final contest with such marked success. Edmundson's five quite definitely must stop Lee Gutierrez, rangy Trojan, who chalked up 36 points in the first two struggles. He scored 19 points Saturday night.

Coach Sam Barry's tossers had a problem of speed to solve, for the Huskies rushed the Trojans off their feet in wild scoring spurts in both games, after it appeared that Southern California certain to win.

Lee, Galer Star
The clever floor work of Captain Hal Lee, a guard, and Bob Galer, forward, had much to do with this as they dribbled and passed through and around Troy's defense in the second contest with such marked success that it was considered probable they would continue with this style of play in the deciding game.

Fouls Costly
The Trojans led most of the way through Saturday night's contest, just as they did in the initial game of the playoff, but the Huskies forced in front with five minutes to play and only a sensational shot by Harold Foster center in the last few seconds of play, which tied the count for S. C. at 37-all, was able to prolong the contest.

Personal fouls cost Troy the game in the five minute extra period, for four of Washington's points came on free throws along with one field goal, which Southern California collected but two points on charity tosses. The Trojan star, Gutierrez, was out of the contest on personals when the Galer, Huskie star, went out of the picture by the same route in the final minute of play.

Seattle Indians Win From Stars

Athletics Show Promise Despite Green Material
FORT MYERS, Fla., March 12. (AP)—The impression that a flock of earnest young athletes named "Joe" are trying to plug the big gaps in the varsity lineup of the Athletics this year is rapidly being dispelled.

Clustered around the tall, spare and gray-haired figure of baseball's patriarch, Connie Mack, are a ransy, hard hitting group of players headed by the great Jimmie Fox and a youthful pitching staff that includes some real possibilities despite a notable lack of big league experience.

For Mack it's another great adventure in reconstruction. The burly figure of the home run king, Fox, in camp today for his first time after ending his holdout siege, is the only other real reminder of the last of the tall tutor's championship teams. Conspicuously absent for the first time in a decade are the broad-shouldered aggressive Mick-

ey Cochran, now the pilot of the Detroit Tigers, and the pitching "big three," Walberg, Earnshaw and Grove.

"Grove and Cochran are the men we will miss most," says Mack. "The others were no longer any real help to us. I've got some real promising young pitchers but it's impossible to predict how they will come through. Our catching, too, is uncertain now with Mickey gone but otherwise I think we have a strong club."

"We will get some real hitting and we have some fine young players in both the infield and outfield. I think we will be in the race this year because there's a better balance of power among the clubs in the American League than we have had for several seasons. The Senators are very good but teams like the Tigers and Red Sox are so much stronger that it will not be easy for any club to stay on top. I would not be surprised to see Cochran's Tigers win the pennant."
