

LEWIS OFFERS STATEMENT TO LOCAL VOTERS

L. Alva Lewis announced his candidacy for the post of county assessor at the May primaries. Lewis will run on the republican ticket.

His announcement statement follows: "In announcing my candidacy for the office of county assessor on the republican ticket, I feel I am no stranger to the voters of Klamath county.

"I have lived practically all my life in Klamath county. Have had experience in three branches of merchandising, and in nearly every branch of farming. I, at present, own and operate a poultry farm and chick hatchery. I have served two terms as treasurer of Klamath county.

"If the voters see fit to honor me with the opportunity of giving this public service, I will at once proceed to reorganize our system of tax valuations and make every effort to place the assessor's office on an efficient and economical basis.

"Every home, every parcel of land and every business enterprise should be handled as a public asset and valuations should be fixed on the beneficial income productive capacity of such property. To ignore this fundamental base of valuations in assessments is a destructive and unfair policy and one largely responsible for our nearly fifty per cent tax delinquency. The very fact that half of the taxpayers cannot pay their taxes, is in itself a sufficient proof that our taxes are not equaled and so distributed that all might have an equal chance to pay.

"We should keep in mind that if government is to endure the common man must have an opportunity to survive and together with the man of capital, should not bear an unjust tax burden.

"I have had experience in farming during the depression with the result that the assessor's salary would come in quite handy to pay back taxes, water taxes, dog taxes, chicken taxes, hatchery taxes, stamp taxes, real estate taxes, auto taxes, gas taxes, irrigation taxes, public school taxes, high school taxes, light taxes, bank check taxes, personal property taxes, sewer taxes, paving taxes, cosmetic taxes, theatre ticket taxes, telephone taxes, highway taxes, hog taxes, wheat taxes, milk taxes, NRA, CWA, PWA, FDB, and XYZ taxes, relief taxes, (so called because it is a relief to get them paid) luxury taxes, college taxes, state taxes, and to cap all we may soon be paying a sales tax which covers everything already taxed.

"I even have to pay a tax on asperin when I take a dose to ease my pain, after paying my proportionate and sometimes disproportionate share of Copco's taxes, railroad taxes, telephone taxes and other utilities taxes.

"The only taxes which do not bother me are income taxes and inheritance taxes.

"To come down to brass tax I am going to pay a candidate's tax even if the voters tell me I will have to go way back and sit on a carpet tax.

"In my effort to pay my taxes I have shamefully neglected my other financial obligations until I am afraid to go down town for fear of meeting an irate creditor. If all my creditors will vote for me in hopes of getting paid from my salary I will go over big. (There I hope I haven't violated the corrupt practice act by bribing voters.)

"I am going to ask every voter in Klamath to vote for me in the primaries. If you are a democrat write my name on the ballot and mark an X before it. Even if I don't get the democratic nomination a goodly number of democratic votes will make me feel good. (I haven't felt good since the depression.) Then you might elect me in the primaries by giving me the nomination of both parties. (This would make me feel better.) I will repay the voters by making every effort to reduce their taxes (in hopes of getting mine reduced), and do my best to hunt out and clean out any rat nests which might be found in the court house."

TRANSIENT BUREAU REGISTRATION HIGH

Since January 5, 1934 individuals have been registered at the Klamath Falls transient bureau, according to a report completed Monday.

Average new registrations per day has been 21. In February, the bureau served 7613 meals. The number of individual days of care given in January was 2470.

Families living in town but not established residents who received relief through the bureau in February totaled 57. There are 217 individuals in such families. Forty-four individuals were returned to legal residences or jobs in February. Twenty-five were transferred to camps at Talent or Millard.

Bowman of Richmond, Virginia, stepped into the presidency of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs at the biennial convention in Richmond in July, 1931, the world's largest national organization of business women acquired a leader of a new stamp.

In the 13 years of its existence, the federation's presidents have been varied in type, including women with shrewd legal minds; women with wide social, cultural and philanthropic backgrounds; women with pronouncedly domestic tastes, women whose entire flair was apparently along business lines.

Mrs. Bowman is the first president who seems a composite of all these qualities. She combines languorous southern charm with shrewd Yankee business proficiency. Trained for social life, she has all the social graces, yet she thinks with amazing clarity on economic problems. And she achieves that astounding proficiency which so amazes foreigners when they first contact with the 20th century phenomenon—the American business woman—

the ability to run a big business, supervise the details of a home, be a real companion to her children and keep an active contact with philanthropic and welfare activities — without losing one whit of her femininity, or exhibiting a trace of frazzled nerves.

If you should ask Mrs. Bowman how she manages it, her answer would probably be given without hesitation, even with a trace of wonderment that you should think her range of accomplishments at all surprising—"Why, because of the children, of course."

For this newest leader of the nation's largest business organization is frank in saying that she thinks children are not only a woman's primary obligation, but also her greatest inspiration and impetus.

Whatever her opinion of the right of the mother with young children to go into business, Mrs. Bowman is the ardent champion of the single woman's privilege to carve out her own career, and of the married woman's justification in holding down a job—even in the present emergency—
