National and Local Markets

EXTRAS DROP HALF A CENT AT PORTLAND

PORTLAND, March 13, (P)—Once again the price on extras was attacked during the produce exchange session, with a resulting loss of 1/2 cent per lb., which brings this quotation to 23 1/2 per lb., exactly the same as standards and prime firsts. Firsts are unchanged at 22 1/2. Butterfat was unchanged generally.

Poor eggs were finding all sorts of prices on the local market. Rejects from storage were chiefly offered at the moment on the bartray counter, inasmuch as real quality was finding bids higher than resale value.

Salmon Shortage Noted

Without lowering the resale price on such offerings, live hen values were generally down to 16c to 11c per lb., the former being paid by cash buyers for direct shipments and the cent additional to speculators.

Extreme shortage of Alaska salmon was reported here with the selling price advanced to 24c per lb with head on. There was no fresh Columbia river chinook offering, but frozen was quoted at 15c per lb.

Price on fresh halibut was showing reasonable and almost daily decline here. Best medium quality were today listed at 22c with chicken 20c per lb. generally. Crabs were plentiful.

Potato Market Quiet

Easy prices were suggested for country killed spring lambs as a result of slashing values on live stuff. Nominal price now is 25c per lb. for best country killed. Old lambs and mutton show steady to strong tone.

With a small run shown for the week to date, the market for country killed calves was cleaned up. Hogs were steady with beef in fair demand, and bulls firm.

Asparagus was firmer with cool weather in the south.

Spinach was weaker to lower, with more local stuff offered.

Potato market remained quiet, inactive in the country.

Onion demand was fairly active at the source, slow here.

New potatoes were generally steady.

TRADING LIMITED IN SAN FRANCISCO

Carlot shipments of potato yesterday totaled 733. One shipped 17, Washington 17; Idaho 130, Minnesota loaded 1 cars and Maine 173. The total of the carlot shipments of potatoes for the season to date amounting to 166,300 cars, \$4,400 more than the load on the corresponding date last year.

Demand was slow at Portland this morning and the market dull. No. 1 Green Mounts were quoted at \$1.63 to \$1.71 hundred, sacked, in carloads o. b. shipping point.

Idaho markets were slightly weaker, with No. 1 Russet bringing \$1.10 to \$1.15 a bush, sacked, in carloads o. b. cash track.

At Yakima and nearby points a weaker situation developed. There was practically no trading, but an occasional car of 1 Russets was quoted at \$22.50 a ton, sacked, in carloads o. b. cash track.

The terminal market at Chicago was dull. Supplies of stock were liberal but demand and trading were slow. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$1.19 a hundred, sacked, in carloads o. b. shipping point.

At San Francisco demand for light and trading limited. Market was about steady. No. 1 Klamath Gems quoted at \$1.50 to \$1.55 and No. 1 Idaho Gems at around \$1.40 hundred, sacked.
