20-30 Club Officials Pre-

pare Plans For

Modoc Meet.

The unprecedented run of spring weather has turned the attention of the Klamath Falls 20-30 club to the third annual Southern Oregon-Northern California track and field. The event will be held on Modoc field in May.

Although no Saturday has been definitely selected for the meet, it probably will be scheduled two weeks in advance of the state competition at either the University of Oregon or Oregon State College. The date will be one Saturday ahead of the annual district meet at Grants Pass.

Committee to Organize
Committees of the 20-30 club, sponsor of the meet, will be organized in the near future, according to Joe Knudson, chairman of the event for the last two seasons. Sam Ritchey will direct the organization work this spring.

A number of Klamath high school athletes already have taken advantage of the spring weather to prepare for the track season. The first formal call for candidates, however, will not be issued by Dwight French, coach, until after the close of the basketball schedule late this month.

Pelicans Hold Title
The Pelican team will be the defending champion of the two previous meets.

Civil works employees have been reconditioning Modoc field and it is expected the track will be faster than in other years. It is possible, too, a much needed pole will be constructed on the inside.

The first two meets were run off under unfavorable weather conditions, but, despite this, excellent records were established. The promise of continued warm and clear weather this season probably will contribute to the increased success of the carnival.

Exhibitions Are Tentative
Invitations probably will be sent to all schools competing last season in addition to possible new entrants. While Oregon has entered the largest number of athletes, the club officers predict an increase in the number of participants from northern California schools.

Stars from Bill Hayward's University of Oregon have presented exhibitions in the past, and an effort will be made to maintain the tradition this year.

SANTA BARBARA, March 14. (AP)—The Seattle Indians added Ernie Kelly, Omaha club fielder, to their roster after Manager George Burns had lopped off three rookies. WOODLAND, Calif., March 14. (AP)—Pitcher Ervin Brame arrived at the Mission Reds' camp from his home in Hopkinsville, Ky. He was long overdue, and Manager "Gaby" Street, who relies upon him to bolster the pitching staff, had worried over the delay. Brame played with the Pittsburgh Pirates, and was at the Pirates' Toronto farm last year. The Reds will have a day of rest Wednesday. This week the regulars will play the Seals at Stockton and the reserves will meet the Woodland Valley leaguers here.

FORT MYERS, Fla., March 14. (AP)—The world champion New York Giants wound up their five game exhibition series with the Philadelphia Athletics by beating the A's 1 to 0. This gave the Giants four wins against one defeat.

George Davis dropped a single hitting second base to score Hughie Critz in the sixth with the lone run of the game.

AVALON, Catalina Island, Cal., March 14. (AP)—Lon Warneke, second most effective pitcher in the National league last year, and Roy Jolner, rookie southpaw who won 22 games for Oakland in 1933, were named today to hurl for the Chicago Cubs Thursday when they open their exhibition season against the Los Angeles Angels.

Four Brawny Wrestling Stars

Prepared for Legion Clashes

Science, brawn and brutality will rule the heavyweight clash at the Legion hall this week between Charley Hansen, Seattle Dane, and Ted Cox, mountainous wrestler from Lodi, Calif.

Cox, dubbed the "King Kong" of the sport, will be closely pressed as a drawing card by the three other athletes on the Mack Lillard program. He will compete for honors against his main event rival, Hansen, the victor over Al Karasick; Leslie Wolfe, the young hook-scorer specialist from Texas; and Leslie Grimes, rugged New Zealander.

Grimes and Wolfe, equal in size, clash in the second of the two main events. Their one-hour match will precede the Cox-Hansen event. Wolfe has been a ruling favorite here all season, and Grimes has been undefeated

in his two matches against Bob Stone of Chicago and Jack Kogut of Montreal.

King Kong's appearance has been wanted by Legion hall spectators for several weeks. To find a suitable opponent for the big fellow from California, Lillard scheduled an elimination contest between Karasick and Hansen.

Hansen's one-fall victory brought the Russian's first loss in the Legion hall in nearly a year, and boosted the Dane to the top position.

King Kong's record at Portland will give him the edge against the Seattle heavyweight, but the advantage is not so pronounced as to predict a winner. Lillard has forecast one of the largest audiences of the year.

Sport Loses Another Leader

in Death of Fielder Jones

PORTLAND, Ore., March 14. (AP)—Baseball has lost another great leader—Fielder Jones, who saved the game the immortal "hitless wonders," the Chicago White Sox of 1908.

The man who led a team of feeble hitters to an American league championship and followed with a world series triumph over the Chicago Cubs, died last night from heart disease.

Great Hurlers Developed
The name Fielder was not connected with the game. His full name was Fielder Allison Jones. It was as manager and outfielder of the White Sox—they were called the white stockings then—that he became an immortal.

His 1906 team boasted great pitchers but not a real hitter. Jones manipulated his pitching staff of Big Ed Walsh, Doc White, Nick Altrock, "Piano Mover" Smith, Roy Patterson, and "Yip" Owen to gain the utmost in effectiveness—and invented his own way of getting runs without hits.

A White Sox "rally" under Jones was a "base on balls, a stolen base, a sacrifice and a long fly."

The 1906 victory was a tre-

Young Owner-Manager

Preparing For Strong

Coast Showing.

(Editor's Note: This is the seventh of a series of stories on Pacific coast league teams being carried by The United Press.)

Earl McNeely, who in true Horatio Alger style rose to be owner, president and manager of the Sacramento club of the Pacific coast league, speeded up the training schedule at the Senators camp in Sacramento today in preparation for a series of inter-squad games.

About this time, 12 years ago, McNeely, then a fangling youngster, and a real home product, received a tryout with the club he now owns. His ability to assimilate baseball earned him a diploma to the major leagues.

Youngest AA Owner
After nearly a decade of playing in baseball's fastest company, Lou Moorring, then owner of the Senators, paved McNeely to come and take over the managerial reins of the club.

Early this year, Moorring found himself in financial difficulties. The Senators went on the block. McNeely, like a character in an Alger novel, had saved his money. He bought the club. Now, at the ripe old age of 35, McNeely is probably the youngest owner of a Class AA ball club in the country.

McNeely has made a few changes in the lineup of the club that wound up fourth last season—his first as manager.

Several propositions have been received for the services of Stanley (Frenchy) Bordagary but McNeely has been reluctant to dispense with the sensational young outfielder.

Outfield in Doubt
The latest proposition was received from the Chicago White Sox. However, McNeely countered with an offer to trade Henry Steinbaker, another good outfielder to the Sox for a pair of pitchers. McNeely was still awaiting word tonight as to the major league club's reaction.

If Bordagary or Steinbaker should go it would leave a serious hole in the Senator outfield. The other two members of the fly chasing group are Jerry Donovan, formerly of the Seals, and Carl Lehman. Both are good ball players but don't approach the class of Steinbaker and Bordagary.

Lee Power is the latest addition to the Senator infield. Alec Kampouris, under the eyes of several major league scouts, will hold down second base with Powers at first. The veteran Ray French, a capable infielder, will be back on the job at shortstop and Harry White, former Cleveland star, will round out the quartet at third base.

Catchers Big Need

McNeely is on the hunt for a good catcher, since Larry Woodall went to the Seals. The only experienced catcher left on the roster is the youthful Kettle Wirtz.

The club owner would like to add another pair of hurlers to his mound staff and that's the only reason he'll talk business when it comes to trading Steinbaker and Bordagary. At the present outlook, McNeely will build his mound staff around Louis Vinel, Tom Flynn, Beryl Horne and Larry Gillick.

Canzoneri Wins

From Arizmendi

LOS ANGELES, March 14. (AP)—Tony Canzoneri, clever craftsman of the ring, added the name of Alberto Arizmendi to his long string of victims today.

The New York Italian decisively outpointed the bouncing Mexican lightweight here last night in a 10-round bout before 11,500 fans—the Olympic auditorium's largest fight crowd in better than three years.

Canzoneri started cautiously, but finished strong, sweeping Arizmendi before a barrage of left hooks and right crosses in the tenth after piling up a commanding lead through the bout. The Associated Press card gave the former lightweight champion seven rounds and Arizmendi three. The New Yorker weighed 131 pounds and Arizmendi 126.

BROWNS RALLY

WITH HORNSBY

St. Louis Americans May

Become Threat For

Pennant.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., March 14. (AP)—Other methods having failed for five years to lift them out of the second division, the St. Louis Browns have drawn their manager and much of their inspiration from the National league in preparation for an upward thrust this season in the American league.

With absolutely nothing to lose and everything to gain with a club that finished a bad last in 1933, Rogers Hornsby, in what may be his last big league round-up, has tackled the job of reconstruction and reestablishment with characteristic vigor.

New Spirit Noted

Stranger things have happened than that the Browns suddenly should manifest primeval tendencies and become a factor in the American league race. They have already responded to Hornsby's aggressive leadership sufficiently to convince such natives as Colonel Dan Howley, one-time manager of the club, that they will not be a push-over for anybody this year.

"No shirkers can last under Hornsby," comments Colonel Dan. The trio of factors upon which depend chiefly the Browns' hopes of holding themselves out of the depth are: First, the development of at least two or three minor league pitching stars into effective regulars; second, the ability of Alan Cochrane Strange, the good-looking Hollywood recruit, to make the grade at shortstop; and, finally, the attempt of Hornsby himself to hold down third base at least on a part-time basis, and contribute his batting power to the team's much-needed attack.

Hornsby Well-Liked

Hornsby is the most interesting individual in camp. Fans who haven't been giving the Browns a tumble in recent years now go out to the park to see and shake hands with the former king of National league hitters. The Rajah plays first and third base in practice, coaches the pitchers with the aid of Grover Hartley, personally instructs all the batters and rattles the fences himself to show how it can be done.

You ought to know the Browns

MAYBE you don't know the Browns. They're a little family of four. There's Jim Brown, who sells life insurance, and Betty Brown—who was a Jones before she married Jim. And there are the two Brown children: Jim, Jr., and Griselda.
