BIEBER, Calif. March 17. —
Clinton J. Fulcher of Lookout made public announcement Friday that he will be a candidate for election this year as assemblyman from the huge Second district, comprising Modoc, Lassen, Plumas, Sierra, Trinity, Shasta and Siskiyou counties.

The district has been without representation in the assembly since Assemblyman Albert F. Ross was appointed superior judge of Shasta county by Governor Rolph last May.

Fulcher received about two-thirds of the total vote cast for assemblyman in the 1922 primary election, the democrats drafting him as their nominee although he had declared himself a republican candidate. He was narrowly defeated by Ross for the republican nomination and made no further campaign for
