

# Klamath Gains From Portland

Scroggin, Egelhoff Basketball Contributions From Commerce and Benson Tech. City Has Tough Time Getting Into Tournament Picture. Canadian Wrestler Wants Match With Bob Kruse.

Two Portland high schools, Benson Tech and Commerce, have watched the progress of the Klamath Falls Pelican basketball team with considerable envy. Neither Benson nor Commerce was able to find a place in the state tournament this year, and both lay the blame directly to this southern Oregon city.

Klamath Falls attracted the families of young Scroggin and Egelhoff. Their arrival here was something of a loss to the northern interscholastic league.

While Dwight French has developed players in the last few seasons just as outstanding as Egelhoff and Scroggin, their presence on their old high school combinations at Portland might have changed the tournament picture.

Scroggin was a star at Commerce and Egelhoff was a first string player at Benson. Their ability might have brought these two teams into first and second place at Portland had they been in the tournament. Had they still been in Portland, it might have meant, too, that the Pelicans would be witnesses instead of competitors at Salem.

The whole case is slightly hypothetical, but, in any event, Portland will be wanting its share of praise for the development of Klamath Falls basketball.

The praise, however, goes only to Dwight French. French increased the ability of these two players and blended them into an already powerful combination that included Nelo Giovanni, Johnny Pastors, Darrell Miller, Ed Wakeman and others.

The Portland schools maintain an arrogant attitude in high school athletics. For a number of years—ever since Prink Callison's series of great football teams at Medford—they have dominated the state gridiron.

But not so in basketball. It has been the teams from the many small cities of the state who have presented the most sensational basketball contests. The title has gone less to Portland and more to Astoria, Salem, Eugene, Medford and Bend.

Klamath hasn't had a show, but French's teams have been strengthened each season. The Pelicans will return with a championship eye of these days.

Jack Forsgren comes to Klamath Falls, Friday night, purely from choice. This husky Canadian is out to establish a reputation in Oregon for he wants a match with Bob Kruse, at present the ruling heavy in Portland. The match is in the making, according to Virgil Hamlin, Portland's promoter.

Kruse, who has appeared here several times, recently won from Ted Cox. That was regarded with some awe, for Cox had been knocking them right and left at the Portland auditorium.

Forsgren is a clean, scientific wrestler. His work should be a treat for the Legion hall crowd after the methods of King Kong.

### KLAMATH RATED AS DARK HORSE

Pelican Combination Gets Praise At Salem; Play Tonight.

The Klamath Falls Pelicans arrived at Salem Tuesday night, reared until this afternoon and then were prepared to take the court tonight against Silverton in the opening round of the state basketball championship tournament at Willamette University.

Rival coaches and players from all sections of the state surveyed the Pelican combination, and considered Dwight French's team one of the outstanding dark-horses of the entry lists. The Pelicans were big and impressive and their record better than many tournament rivals.

High Praise Given. "A darkhorse entry, rated among the leaders, will be the Klamath Falls combination. This outfit, big, tall and rangy, comes up from District No. 5 and has an enviable record. Klamath Falls won 13 or 19 games, beating Ashland three out of four and Medford twice in a row. Ashland will be at the tourney from District No. 15. Carl Egelhoff, ex-Benson, and Howard Scroggin, ex-Commerce, are star members of the Pelican crew."

La Grande, Eugene Next. This was the description of the Klamath team printed in one of the northern state papers Wednesday morning.

Silverton has been accorded as much advance praise as the Pelicans, and this game is expected to be the outstanding one of the first round. The teams clash at 7:30 o'clock tonight.

Should the Pelicans win tonight, they will play either Eugene or La Grande on Thursday. But if the team loses, it will immediately go down into the first round of the consolation. There again the Thursday opponent will be either Eugene or La Grande.

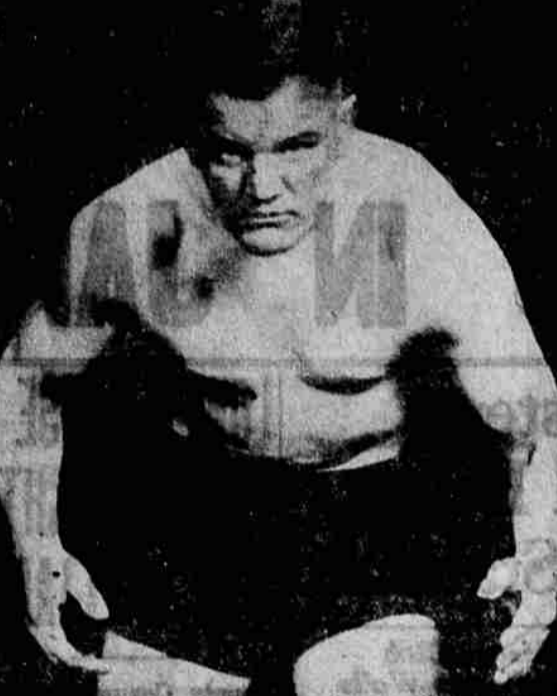
## Southern Bruins Defeat Trojans

## Max Baer Opens Training Grind for Title Bout

SACRAMENTO, Calif., March 21. (UP)—Max Baer, whose challenge to Primo Carnera for the heavyweight title will be decided in Madison Square Garden on June 14, today started official training under the eyes of Manager Ansell Hoffman, back from New York.

Baer opened his drive to overcome the effects of film work, night clubs and court suits by gymnasium work in North Sacramento, golf, roadwork and setting up exercises at Hoffman's Roseville ranch. In a few days Hoffman will take the Livermore larruper to Frank Glavin's resort at Lake Tahoe for two weeks of hiking, boat riding and general conditioning.

Then they will go to Southern California, where Baer will work under the warm sun.

The Eastern camp probably will be in the Catalina mountains, where Max Schmeling trained. "No more Atlantic City," said Hoffman. "There are too many attractions there."

One problem remained to annoy Hoffman and Baer. J. H. Lorimer's contract as co-manager was upheld in the courts recently, and has seven years to run. Lorimer reportedly is willing to relinquish his "piece" of Baer for \$50,000. Otherwise, he assertedly is ready to tie up the Carnera fight until he receives an accounting for past profits from the fighter's activities.

## Former Yale Track Star Found Dead

FORT WORTH, Tex., March 21. (UP)—Officers here tonight investigated circumstances surrounding the death of W. F. Potter, 43, identified as a former track star at Yale university.

Potter's body was found today at the foot of a tree near a poor residential settlement north of here. A broken rope was tied around the neck. A part of the rope dangled from the tree. Officers said Potter had been dead a week.

Justice of the Peace Walter Pritchard withheld a verdict pending further investigation.

William Ryan of Fort Worth identified the body. He said Potter was his classmate at Yale and was graduated in 1914. He was one of Ell's fleetest hurdlers in his day, Ryan said.

## American League Trails National in Spring Games

NEW YORK, March 21. (AP)—If it weren't for the New York Yankees, the American league wouldn't even be a close second to the National in early returns from the annual "grapefruit league" competition.

Twelve inter-league contests have been played so far and the American leaguers trail by a margin of only two games, seven to five. The Yankee picking on the Boston Braves, have won four of their five victories. The other was chalked up to the credit of the Philadelphia Athletics who were beaten in five other bouts with National league outfits.

Setting the inter-league pace for John Heydler's loop are the world champion New York Giants and the Chicago Cubs. The Cubs have a perfect record against the American league with two successive triumphs over their city rivals, the White Sox, while the Giants have won four and lost one. The Brooklyn Dodgers earned the seventh National league victory, handing the A's one of their setbacks.

The Yankees, Boston Red Sox and Washington Senators also have escaped defeat so far. Joe McCarthy's Fuelers have won four in a row, all from the Braves. The Red Sox defeated the Detroit Tigers in the only game they have played so far. Washington hasn't even begun its exhibition schedule.

Washington's high-powered scoring threat, Bobby (Goose) Galer, will lead the Husky basketball in next year's campaign. He is a junior, of Seattle.

Without promising that he would score 176 points again next year, equalling the record he set the past season, Galer was elected to the captaincy at the annual banquet last night. He said this year's winning spirit "should carry over to 1935."

Capt. Harold Lee was voted the winner of the first "Edmundson medal" for having been the biggest inspiration to this year's team.

More than 300 followers of the team which battled through the coast championship two weeks ago over Southern California, attended the event. The fathers of varsity players were special guests.

Cosen Hec Edmundson was roundly applauded; all members of the squad were given honorary water fobs; and mayor-elect Charles L. Smith, a former Washington quarterback, spoke.

### Frank Frisch May Offer Challenge to N. Y. Giants

BRADENTON, Fla., March 21. (AP)—The Dean boys of Oklahoma have done their best this spring to relieve Frank Frisch of worry about how far his pitching staff will carry the St. Louis Cardinals in this year's National league pennant race.

Frisch has some pretty fair flingers on his staff otherwise, including Wild Bill Halahan, Jesse Haines, Tex Carleton, Bill Walker and the obnoxious Burlingh Grimes, but the brothers Dean, Dizzy and Paul, have separately and collectively expressed an on-fire willingness to shoulder the main burden. Twenty victories apiece is the minimum they have set for 1934. In fact, Paul, the family's freshman who won 22 for Columbus last year, assured Branch Rickey he would turn in 25 triumphs just to prove he has more stuff than his brother.

Even if Paul only does half as well as he predicts, the Cardinals will be that much better fortified to challenge the Giants and seek their tenth pennant in nine years.

Outside of their mound staff, the Cardinals have a number of star players but it is a question whether they have the right balance and enough batting punch. The trade of Jimmy Wilson to the Phillies for big Virgil Davis, who hit .349 last year, increases the batting power but Wilson's skillful backstopping will be missed.

Several new combinations have been tried and recruits tested, but the infield seems certain to start the season with Jim Collins at first, Manager Frisch in the key spot, Leo Durocher, baseball's premier "jockey" at short and the scrappy Pepper Martin on third. The Cardinals who lost a great shortstop—when Charley Gohbert filled a leg with buckshot, earnestly sought Dick Bartell of the Phillies, and still have hopes of adding strength to the infield. Burgess Whitehead, Columbus recruit, and "Pat" Crawford will be reserves.

Martin Leads Hitters. Martin made the switch from the outfield to third base last season so successfully that baseball men consider him the defensive superior now of the great Pie Traynor, in addition to which Pepper's batting, base-running and aggressiveness mean much to the club's pennant chances.

Martin led all the Cardinals' regulars at bat last season with .316.

Lewis, fighting in the welterweight class, scored a decision over Leonard Bennett, of Seattle and Detroit, in six rounds. Baby Tiger Flowers, San Francisco negro, won over Roy Oakley, Portland lightweight; Frank Walulis, Roslyn heavyweight, knocked out Claude Davis, Bellingham in the second of a four-round bout, and Johnny Foster, Vancouver, B. C., welterweight, beat Cecil Jordan, Oakland negro in four.

## Kentucky Boxer Continues Long Winning Streak

SEATTLE, March 21. (AP)—Pacific northwest lightweight boxers haven't been able to do anything about it yet, and they won't at the rate they are going. About two months ago Cecil Payne came to Seattle from Louisville, Ky., to test out Henry Woods, Yakima negro flash, and since then northwest battlers have fallen in their efforts to send him back home.

Payne last night knocked out Ernie Cavelli, Walla Walla and Portland lightweight in the second round of a scheduled 10-round bout, to score his fourth victory in Seattle. He previously whipped Woods twice, and Al Lewis, Seattle, negro, once.
