

Klamath Overcomes Jinx

Tournament. Four Contests Lost. Miller Listed Second Among High Men for First Day. Egelhoff Wins Credit.

The tournament jinx following the Klamath Pelicans through two seasons of championship competition was cut off Wednesday with that cheerful 21 to 25 victory over Silverton. Thus, the Pelicans, now in their third consecutive tournament, have managed to bring in their first Salem victory.

Neal Galloway, cowboy forward from Pendleton high school, was high point man of the opening round. Galloway's 19 points, however, were insufficient to save his team from falling before Salem. This Eastern Oregon athlete scored seven field goals and five free throws.

Darrell Miller, lanky center developed by Dwight French, tied with Don Stitt of La Grande for second scoring honors Wednesday. Each of these youngsters dropped in 16 points. All came from field goals.

Wintermute of Salem followed with 14.
Other high scorers for the first day out of the 133 players were: Canessa, Astoria, 13 points each; Mosier, The Dalles; Sarpola, Astoria; Pook and Morris, Coquille; Hess of Ashland with 12 points each, and Carl Egelhoff of Klamath Falls with 11 points.

CLOSE BATTLES STIR TOURNEY

Eight Teams Defeated in First Round of State Championships.

SALEM, March 22. (AP)—Hairbreadth margins sent four of the eight successful basketball teams into the championship flight at the 15th annual state tournament which opened here yesterday, while the other four had less trouble disposing of their competitors. Eight teams were thus eliminated from any of the first four places, but still remain in the consolation series.

Franklin high of Portland closed the first day's session by a single point margin over McMinnville, 15 to 14. Salem had less trouble with Pendleton, 32 to 26, but little Dean Galloway scored 19 points for Eastern Oregon to take the high honors for the day. Eugene was forced to two overtime periods to win 32 to 30 from La Grande, and Astoria, then when Danner, Eugene center, tossed a long one with but seconds to go.

Silverton put up a good battle against Klamath Falls, the latter playing without a single substitution, then when Danner, Eugene center, tossed a long one with but seconds to go.

Franklin Has Trouble
And in that contest, Franklin, who had held its slight lead throughout the entire second half, both Portland high school teams appeared tired as the result of their hard intercity schedule, and neither one appeared to elicit and no promotion was made to enter the finals, either in the championship nor the consolation.

Franklin scored but one field goal in the last half, while McMinnville came within one point of tying the score.

Franklin's lead started out fast against Salem, then dropped back after the first few minutes but held the lead at half time 13 to 10, under the leadership of little Dean Galloway, fast-breaking forward, the Eastern Oregon delegation was always a threat until the final moments when Salem finally succeeded in finding the basket. The host team had plenty of shots, but could not connect until late in the game.

No Substitutions Made
Klamath Falls earned the title of "Iron-Men" in the first round, the only team which did not run in any substitutions during the entire contest in which they had a battle to defeat Silverton.

Scott, forward for Silverton, led his unit in a fast game. He is the only member of the all-state team of last year back in the tournament this season.

Klamath Pelicans led at the quarter, but dropped behind Silverton 17 to 13 at the half time. A tie at 12 all ended the third period, while in the final eight minutes the Southerners forged ahead to win 21 to 25. Miller, Klamath center was high scorer for the game with eight field goals.

The thrill of the day came just before the afternoon contests ended when Eugene and La Grande fought two three-minute overtimes and the game ended 22 to 20. It was a fast game with both squads tied time after time, and the lead changing constantly. The Easterners led at the first quarter 8 to 6, but at

INDIANS SEEK HITTING POWER

Cleveland Expects Better Luck in Moving to Old Park.

NEW ORLEANS, March 22. (AP)—The Cleveland Indians are pinning high hopes for working up the baseball ladder by returning this year to the old League park where a ball can be hit over the fence and count as a home run.

They have had enough of the Municipal stadium in Cleveland where a ball hit far enough to clear any fence in the league has fallen into the glove of an outfielder for a simple out. This is blamed for the slump in batting averages rather than the hitting ability of the players.

Farrell A. Holdout
But the Indians have their troubles like all the rest and Walter Johnson, who took the manager's helm from Roger Peckinpaugh, is working by day and napping by night to smooth them over.

One of his most serious worries is hold-out Wesley Ferrell, who until last year had won twenty or more games a year in four seasons for the Indians. The Indians had counted on him to return to form and produce the spark on the mound but it now appears that he plans to stay at home unless his contract is revised upward.

Johnson is shaping his team with Ferrell out and is banking on the new southpaw, Lloyd Brown, obtained from the Boston Red Sox in the Cissell deal.

Southpaws Promising
The coaches also are working hard on Lefty Lee, up from Toledo, and if these two southpaws come through, the absence of Ferrell would not be felt so strongly.

From the pitchers' box, Johnson's worries turn to second base, where he is striving to turn a third baseman into a second baseman. The trouble is that Odell Hale, who was switched from third to second, does not like to play second base and hopes that another candidate will appear.

Knickerbocker is being groomed behind Hale and probably will share the second spot with him.

Outside of these things and Harley Boss, the strong first baseman being ill, the situation in the Indian camp is satisfactory to the management.
