# National and Local Markets

## DEALERS VOICE COMPLAINTS ON PORTLAND MATT

PORTLAND, March 22 (AP)—Local egg prices were still somewhat apart with suggestions of as many grades of "extras" as there were prices. Loud complaints of wholesale, retailers and producers have resulted with everyone dissatisfied.

Further increase in the local butter surplus was shown with reports suggesting undersales being made of surplus from Washington as a result of the operation of the code there. Butter-fat price was steady.

With a complete famine of broiler stuff, the market for chickens was generally steady with the continued exception of light weight hens which were in surplus from western Washington.

There was a real famine of cauliflower here with only nominal local or Roseburg offerings. No. 1 was nominally quoted at \$1.25 crate but scarcely available.

In all lines of country killed meats there was a fairly steady tone for the day with the possible exception of spring lambs. These were in limited offerings but even more nominal demand.

Acute shortage of small new potatoes was shown here. Florida stock available was generally of large size but Hawaiian was of most desirable size.

First Canby grown asparagus of the season arrived from the W. H. Thompson place, and was sold at 12c lb. California stock was steady.

Tomato market was showing a wide price spread with much undergrade stuff.

Potato trade was very sluggish everywhere. Little demand for seed.

Some fairly good cranberries were offering with a limited sale.

## OREGON POTATO LOADINGS NINE

There were 887 carloads of potatoes shipped Wednesday. Oregon loaded 9, Washington 12 and Idaho 121. Maine shipped 244 cars and Minnesota 241.

At Presque Isle, Maine, the market was slightly weaker on Thursday morning, with No. 1 Green Mountains bringing mostly \$1.45 a hundred, sacked in carloads, f.o.b. shipping point.

Idaho markets were dull and unsettled. Offerings were rather light and demand and trading were light. No. 1 Russets were quoted at 90c to 95c a hundred, sacked, in carloads, f.o.b. cash track.

At Yakima demand was poor, and sales were too few to establish reliable quotations.

The terminal market at Chicago was dull. Supplies of old stock were heavy and demand and trading slow. No. 1 Idaho Russets were quoted at \$1.70 to \$1.77 a hundred, sacked, track sales, carlot outright.

At San Francisco supplies of old potatoes were moderate and the market weak. No. 1 Klamath Gems sold at \$1.25 to \$1.30 a hundred, sacked, and No. 1 Washington Russets at \$1.18.

**Gram Will Outline Self Help Projects**

SALEM, Ore., March 22, (AP)—The state rehabilitation and self help commission today instructed C. H. Gram, state labor commissioner and chairman of the commission, to prepare a concrete program of self help projects for presentation to state relief committees.

Gram in turn will look to county relief committees for cooperation in assembling data on available county and state-owned lands for suitable garden tracts.
