

Taber May Enter U. S. C.

Pelican Fullback Expected to Enroll with Trojans Next Autumn. Has Prospects to Becoming Outstanding Player. Baer Wants to be "Fighting Champion." Peak Discovers Basketball Talent.

The Webfoots and the Beavers probably will lose a young fullback from Klamath county. Norman Taber, it is reported quite reliably, has selected the University of Southern California as his alma mater in the Pacific Coast conference. Taber, apparently undaunted by the vast excellence of material at the Trojan school and the hearty competition for varsity jobs, plans to register at U. S. C. next fall.

Taber, of course, is like all other graduating high school students—he is untired in real athletic competition. It is a matter of speculation whether he will star in college in the same brilliant manner as in high school.

He is, however, as well-equipped as any high school athlete. He has size and power and football courage. These qualifications, plus natural athletic ability, may be the foundations for the development of an outstanding college fullback.

Oregon and Oregon State, two schools actually coming out of football obscurity and really getting some where in the conference standings, will regret seeing Taber move out of the state into California. If the former Pelican backfield man's prospects are developed, it certainly won't be an incident to further the hopes of either Prink Callison at Oregon or Lon Stiner at Oregon State.

Max Baer, the only capable heavyweight challenger, turns out very similar to all aspiring champions.

Max is going to be a "fight-in" champion.

That is the intention of most fighters, but the realization of only a few. It sounds well enough as a publicity feature, but, if carried out, it's not the best way to guard the title and the income going with it.

Joe Peak, instructor of physical education in the city schools, has gone a long way to assure the Klamath Pelicans of future basketball success. Peak developed the city grade school league, and has discovered some youngsters who undoubtedly will become valuable material when they enroll at the high school.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 28. (AP)—Johnny Higgins of Salem and young Harry Wills of Longview hit each other with everything but the corner posts as they battled to a six-round draw at the Labor Temple last night. The near-capacity crowd that welcomed Tex Salkeld as Portland matchmaker howled frenziedly as one fighter and then the other dominated the picture with merciless blows.

Higgins, 140, scored two knockdowns, but was gory and battered as Wills, 155, at the end.

It was a bad night for Seattle fighters. Elmer "Buss" Brown all but knocked out Eddie Guano, 125, Seattle, in a six-round bout and Bobbie Phillips, 125, Portland, leveled Paddy Gray, 121, Seattle, in the second of a scheduled four-round opener. Frankie Gallucci, 121, Portland, outpointed Chris Angel, 119, Seattle.

The hard punching of sturdy Eddie Spina, 129, brought him a four-round decision over Joe Calder, 125. Both are of Portland.

BAER OFFERS OLD PROMISES

Challenger Expects to Become "Fighting Champion."

RENO, Nev., March 28. (AP)—If Max Baer wins the world's heavyweight title from Primo Carnera in New York June 14, he will take on all comers for the championship, he said today.

Max, confident he will win, visited here today from his training camp at Al Tahoe on Lake Tahoe to relieve the "boredom" of the quiet surroundings. His first thought upon arrival was to go to a motion picture show.

To Go on Fighting
"I'm going to win," he declared, "and I'm not going to fool around after I win, like Carnera. I'm going to keep on fighting."

"I can lick Carnera. When I sparred with him in the movies I could feel Carnera's punches all the way through. He'll be easy. I also dreamed I was going to win."

"I'm happy to have the chance to fight Carnera," he added, "and I know I'm going to have a good time doing it."

However, if he loses, Max said he is ready to "accept plenty of offers" to return to motion pictures.

Works Before Cameras
"I have plenty of chances to go into the movies regardless of whether I win or lose," he commented.

Max, dressed in a heavy overcoat, bedroom slippers and a snow cap, was accompanied here by his 255-pound brother, Buddy, Manager Anell Hoffman and other members of the camp.

He said he felt fine, and that he would be in top form for the fight. He worked out earlier in the day for sound cameras, posing as a wood chopper, snow shoveler and oarsman. His brother also took turns in tossing him about.

Foot Infected
The curly-haired former butcher boy reported his sun tan—an issue which threatened to disrupt the camp—is progressing in good shape. Clouds obscured the sun at Al Tahoe most of the day, influencing him in his decision to come to Reno. He drove here in a fast automobile, sometimes reaching a speed of 80 miles an hour.

Cheerful at the chance of seeing some bright lights after three days at the quiet camp, Baer planned to remain overnight, explaining in a pleased manner that storms would threaten a return trip at night.

A minor operation for an ingrowing toenail was performed during his visit.

Rogers Talks "Cold Turkey" to Young Baseball Greats

LOS ANGELES, March 28. (AP)—Will Rogers, who admits he doesn't know any more about "baseball" than the umpires, broke bread with and talked "cold turkey" to players of three major league teams and several coast league clubs last night.

The comedian posted several old time stars who were present, on a pedestal for the present generation represented by the Chicago Cubs and White Sox, the Pittsburgh Pirates and members of the Hollywood, Los Angeles, Portland and Seattle clubs of the Pacific coast league to look at.

"Look at Hans Wagner," beamed Rogers. "Stand up Sam Crawford!" he shouted. The old American league star stood up.

"You kids, you were looking at ball players there," He spoke directly to the group of more than a hundred baseball players.

"That was a generation of great baseball players. They were baseball players first of all, and if they had time off while playing baseball they were gentle-

men, but they didn't let being gentlemen interfere with their playing."

Rogers admitted he wasn't much of a "sporting man."

"Why, I don't know any more about baseball than the umpires. In fact, my only bid to sporting fame is the fact that I had the first rubber-tired buggy in Rogers county, Oklahoma."

What was to have been a musical contest between Lew Fonseca, manager of the White Sox, and Charles Grimm, manager of the Chicago Cubs, went to the American league boss by default.

Fonseca gave a masterful rendition of "Slumber On My Little Gipsy Sweetheart," but Grimm couldn't find a banjo, his favorite instrument.

A moment later when Jimmy Sykes, third baseman of the White Sox was called upon for a few words he said:

"Tonight was the first time all spring that Fonseca hasn't sung the blues."

NATIONAL LOOP LEADS IN WINS

American League Clubs Fall to Rear For Spring Games.

NEW YORK, March 28. (AP)—National league clubs steadily are pulling away from their American league rivals in the annual "Grape Fruit league" competition in the South and Far West.

Three Win Twenty
Thirty-two games have been played so far, and the National, led by the Chicago Cubs, Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Giants, have won 10 of them. Of the 12 decisions that have gone to the American league's credit, the New York Giants and St. Louis Browns have accounted for seven. Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics, like the Browns, have won three engagements from teams in John Heydler's loop, but likewise had dropped eight.

The Cubs and Pirates, all square in their private spring duel with two victories apiece, have picked on the Chicago White Sox, only American league team training in the Far West, to the extent of five triumphs and no defeats. The Cubs have whipped their home-town rivals three times in a row while the Pirates are credited with two victories over Lew Fonseca's men. The world champion Giants, although they've gotten no better than an even break in 16 exhibition games so far, have outpointed American league teams by a margin of six victories to four.

Yanks Take Four
In the American league, only the Yankees, with four decisions over the Boston Braves in six starts, and the Browns, who won the odd game in a five-game series with the Giants, have gained better than an even split in their inter-league engagements. The St. Louis Cardinals, Cincinnati Reds and Brooklyn Dodgers, as well as the Cubs, Pirates and Giants, all have given more than they have received in their tussles with the American leaguers.

It is expected the 75-yard dash between "Bullet Bob" Kiesel, Bear sprinter, and Frank Plumb of Washington, will be a feature of Friday night's meet.

LONDON, March 28. (AP)—The two runners who last year put on the greatest mile race in history will meet again this summer, the United Press learned definitely today.

Jack Lovelock, fleet New Zealander, who thrilled track fans by beating the powerful striding Bill Bonhron of Princeton in the new record time of 5:07.6, has responded properly to treatment following an operation on the leg, and will oppose "Bonny" in the annual Oxford-Cambridge vs. Princeton-Cornell track meet here July 31.

It was also learned definitely that Lovelock, despite some rumors to the contrary, will not go to the United States for any race, and specifically not for a three cornered contest with Bonhron and Glenn Cunningham of Kansas, indoor mile record holder.
