

EX-OFFICERS SEEK EARLY TRIAL DATE

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He said, however, that the police row was not hurting his campaign for the democratic nomination for governor, and that reports from over the state are encouraging.

Locally, there appeared to be considerable bewilderment over the police row. The issue in many minds apparently is whether Mahoney knew or sanctioned any transfer of funds to his campaign chest, if such a transfer was made. As to this, the mayor denied emphatically that he would think of permitting what he termed "such a ridiculous business."

Holman Will Run

"Under no consideration would I let such a thing happen if I knew anything about it. It is true I was warned of reports about the charity fund, but I was told emphatically by those I trusted that there was nothing to the rumors."

While the local gubernatorial candidate chose to let state politics go as they pleased for the time being, news came from Salem that on the republican governorship front Rufus Holman's figure was looming large.

Holman, state treasurer, was believed preparing to enter the race on the morning. Holman's announcement is expected to end the gubernatorial ambitions of Charles M. Thomas and to take W. E. Burke out of the race.

On the second district congressional front, Walter Pierce and Jay Upton appeared to be unopposed for the democratic and republican candidacies, respectively. Upton, incidentally, got a big boost in the early morning hours of March 27, when a Portland publication, which enumerated the things the candidate has done for veterans.

Locally, Ed Dunham's announcement for republican nomination for county commissioner was the only definite development, but W. C. V. Brown was expected to appear out in a day or two for the G. O. P. nomination for state representative.

William Ganong, circuit judge candidate, filed at Salem Wednesday. Judge Duncan is expected momentarily to issue his formal announcement of candidacy for re-election. He is making no secret of the fact he intends to run again.

Ex-convict at Bend Charged With Murder

BEND, March 28, (UP)—T. J. Baughn, an Oklahoma convict on parole from a life sentence for murder, was under arrest here today in connection with the slaying of Cecil Montgomery six weeks ago.

Montgomery was shot down on his doorstep in the early morning hours of February 17, when he stepped outside to talk to an unidentified man who knocked on the door and threatened to "shoot the whole bunch if the man I want is in there."

Baughn had previously been questioned and released several times.

Officers said Baughn is on parole from the Oklahoma state prison at McAlester, where he was sentenced to life imprisonment after being convicted of killing a young woman more than 20 years ago. He served nine years of the sentence and has been here for about 10 years.

Stock Exchange Measure Brings Leniency Plea

WASHINGTON, March 28, (UP)—The face of President Roosevelt's demand for a stock exchange control bill at least as strong as the pending Fletcher-Rayburn measure, Richard F. Whitney, president of the New York exchange renewed his fight today for more lenient treatment.

He concentrated testimony before the senate banking committee on the margin requirements of the bill, which Mr. Roosevelt emphasized yesterday as a vital point in his program for regulation with "teeth" to prevent excessive speculation.

Whitney challenged statements of some advocates of the bill that the stock market crash of 1929 caused the depression. He asserted that the crash was the first result of depression.

Bonanza Man Takes Irrigation Office

INSULL'S VESSEL PASSES ISTANBUL

ISTANBUL, March 28, (AP)—The S. S. Malotis, believed to be carrying Samuel Insull, Sr., passed the harbor of Istanbul at 5:45 p.m. today without stopping, and started toward the Black sea through the Bosphorus.

The Malotis signaled a Turkish police motorboat controlling Istanbul harbor that she was en route to Rumania with a cargo consisting of one passenger.

Jordan was convicted of the murder of F. T. Sullivan, dining car steward, who succumbed to injuries received June 3, 1932. He died October 15 of that year.

Confession High Point.

The opinion held, following quotation of much of the evidence introduced in the trial, that the "jury undoubtedly believed that his confession introduced in evidence was not obtained through duress, coercion, or promise of immunity." The defense attacked the manner in which the confession was obtained and introduced by the prosecution, as one of its main reasons for requesting a new trial.

The opinion states that "if his signed statement is true, the defendant deliberately and premeditatedly planned to rob Sullivan, and, in order to accomplish the same, struck him several times over the head with a piece of water pipe. As a result of this unlawful attack Sullivan died."

What difference does it make, so far as the essential elements of the crime are concerned, whether Sullivan was killed instantly or died several months later as a result of this unlawful assault?

"It has been established beyond a reasonable doubt that Jordan is guilty as charged. His confession of guilt rings true. The evidence strongly corroborates the recital of facts as made by the defendant in his confession. No member of this court has argued to the contrary."

"It is not contended by my brothers on the bench that Jordan was subjected to abuse and mistreatment. Yet error is urged as ground for reversal of the judgment. In a long line of decisions this court has adhered to the guiding principle that it is not error simply, but error legally excepted to that constitutes ground for reversal."

"Other assignments of error have been previously considered to our satisfaction in the opinion on original hearing and we see no need to restate the law applicable thereto."

The first affirming opinion was written by Justice Henry J. Bean.

STEEL CORPORATION ANNOUNCES BOOST

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, March 28, (AP)—The Republic Steel corporation, third largest in the industry, today added its name to the list of steel companies announcing 10 per cent wage increases for employees effective April 1.

Increases of 10 per cent also was announced today by Youngstown Sheet & Tube company, employing about 15,000 men in the Youngstown and Chicago districts, with about 22,000 employees in Youngstown, Chicago, Buffalo, Birmingham, Massillon and Canton, Ohio.

The Republic Steel corporation has 22,000 employees in ten plants in the East and South.

LORAIN, Ohio, March 28, (AP)—The National Tube company, a subsidiary of the United States Steel corporation, today announced a 10 per cent wage increase for the 7,000 employees in the Lorain plant, effective April 1.

FOUR KILLED, MANY INJURED AT ELECTION

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In motor cars and some witnesses reported seeing machine guns in their hands. Marauders flashed brass knuckles, pistols and black-jacks, reports said. More than a dozen men were seized by police, charged with election disturbances, and officers said 11 of them belong to the National Youth movement, an organization supporting the fusionists.

Former Senator James A. Reed, democrat, bounded out of retirement to become the spearhead of the assault against the fusionists. He charged that republicans, beaten in previous elections, were using the fusion movement as a mask to attain power.

Troops Asked

On hearing reports of widespread violence, Charles P. Woodbury, a republican leader and supporter of the fusionists, asked Governor Guy P. Jack to call out troops to "stop further murder and bloodshed." The governor conferred with election officials, and expressed confidence that available forces could prevent further disorder.

The Kansas City Star posted an offer of \$15,000 reward for information leading to the conviction of the sluggers of its reporter, Bowersock, who was assaulted along with Dr. Wells. Dr. Wells had charged during his campaign that politics crippled the general hospital. They were riding in a motor car when attacked. Bowersock said gunmen pushed him from the scene of the assault to the entrance of the Star building.

Sympathy Not Issue

Robinson said the issue presented a conflict of view "that cannot be accounted for solely on the ground of sympathy for or lack of sympathy for the veterans."

"It is not just, as some have attempted to do, to place the president in the attitude of not comprehending, or of failing to demonstrate a sense of justice or of patriotic recognition of the gallantry of those who have worn our uniform," he continued.
