S. F. SPUD PRICE SLIGHTLY LOWER

According to the shipping report, 664 carloads of potatoes were loaded in the United States Wednesday. Oregon shipped 88 cars, and Idaho 140. The report on Washington shipments was not complete. Maine reported 200 cars loaded yesterday.

The Fresno late market was reported slightly stronger, with No. 1 Green Mountains bringing \$1.50 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. shipping point.

Idaho markets were also slightly stronger. No. 1 Russets brought mostly 95c to \$1.05 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. cash track.

Demand was reported better on the Yuma market this morning. The market was about steady with a better feeling prevailing on good stock. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$1.50 to \$1.75 per ton, sacked, in carloads f.o.b. cash track.

At Chicago supplies of old potatoes were liberal and the market barely steady. No. 1 Idaho Russets sold at \$1.75 to \$1.85 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots overweight.

At San Francisco prices were slightly lower, and the market dull. No. 1 Klamath Gems sold to jobbers at \$1.25 to \$1.35 a hundred, sacked.

PORTLAND, March 29. (P)—Cuba butter price last 1c per lb. all around during the late session of the produce exchange. Increased production all through the Pacific slope territory appeared the cause. Butterfat buying price was reduced 2c per lb. Egg market situation was considered about steady for the day. No price changes were shown and more efforts were being made to eliminate unfair trade practices. Keen demand was suggested in the market for live chickens along the wholesale way. All prices were firmly held, and a shortage continued in heavy hens and in broilers.

Shocking of prices on Los Angeles strawberries to force instant demand was announced with 12s down to \$1.50.

Prices continued to be slashed in the dry onion market here with forced offerings by the country. Sales show an extreme of \$1.00 to retailers here for 1s and 2s and as low as 50c.

Market for country killed calves was slower, but the price was holding. Sales were still 10c to 10 1/2c on tops. Hogs were in good call, while spring lambs were holding nominally at 18c to 20c per lb.

Unusually good movement of specialties such as artichokes, hothouse tomatoes and hothouse cucumbers.

CHICAGO, Mar. 29. (UP)—The fifth game of the international 132 balliard championship contest brought together two previously undefeated players. Willie Hoppe, New York, and Eric Hagenlacher of Germany, which the German won by the overwhelming score of 400 to 113 in 14 innings.

Both players are former champions in the classic billiard game, but Hoppe was considered the favorite in tonight's contest.
