NEW DEMANDS NOTED TODAY IN EGG TRADE

PORTLAND, March 31, (AP)—Demand for eggs to go into coolers was increasing while supplies were not adequate to take care of the needs.
Advance of 1/4 to 1 cent a dozen in the buying price suggested in spots for eggs to go into storage and for those that have even better quality than usual, a further premium was offered.

While some of the retailers were still quoting so-called extra eggs below the established buying price, the wholesalers, however, with extra medium to the case, 1/4 cent above the named quotation was being offered.

Only the fact that country shippers refused to overload the market during the week-end, kept the price on spring lambs at recent figures. Yearlings and old ewes were inclined easier.

NEW YORK, March 31, (AP)—Stocks pointed slowly upward in today's brief session. The principal activity was in a handful of specialties and it was reported that professionals were busy in a few low-priced issues. Most of the old-time leaders improved, but they were relatively dull. The close was firm. Transfers approximated 700,000 shares.

Many operators extended yesterday's holiday and little public participation was apparent. At the same time brokerage house sentiment still was of the inflationary type and offering, except in some of the utilities, were scarce.

Grains furnished no special inspiration for equities. Wheat, corn, oats and other cereals were slightly lower at mid-day. Most of the other future markets were closed.

Bonds, especially secondary rail liens, displayed improving tendencies. U. S. government securities were mildly mixed.

Changes in foreign currency rates were negligible. Foreign exchange trading in the principal European centers was suspended for the Easter holidays.

There was a last-minute buying rush which put a number of stocks up 1 to around 3 points. There was a demand for steel and metal equities. U. S. Smelters got up more than 4, Bethlehem Steel 3, U. S. Steel nearly 2, Allied Chemical 3 and American Locomotive 2.

OREGON'S POTATO LOADINGS HIT 20

Six hundred forty-eight cars of potatoes were shipped in the United States Friday. Oregon loaded 20 cars, Washington 26 and Idaho 130. Maine shipped 247 cars.

The market at Fresno, Calif. was dull with No. 1 Green Mountains quoted at \$1.55 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. shipping point.

The Idaho markets were dull to slightly weaker. No. 1 Russets brought mostly 95 cents to \$1.00 a hundred, sacked, in carloads f. o. b. cash track.

At Yakima and nearby points, the market was about steady. No. 1 Russets brought mostly \$1.75 to \$1.77 1/2 a hundred, sacked, track sales track.

On the terminal market at Chicago supplies of old potatoes were liberal and the market about steady. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought mostly \$1.75 to \$1.77 1/2 a hundred, sacked, track sales track.

At San Francisco demand and trading were light and the market about steady. No. 1 Klamath Gems brought \$1.25 to \$1.30 a hundred, sacked, street sales. One car of Deschutes Gems sold at \$1.25 a hundred, sacked.
