

Mike Makes Football Pay

Mikulak Succeeds in Turning Grid Reputation to Profit. Ex-Oregon Player Features as Wrestling Referee. Orville Bailey Coaching at Reedsport High.

Mike Mikulak, late of the University of Oregon football team, has become quite a promoter in the business of capitalizing on reputation. Mike appears to be doing very well for himself before the public memory of his football career is smothered by the rise of new heroes.

Mikulak, the "Iron Mike" of the coast conference, developed into a businessman last winter when he organized a basketball team composed of football stars. The boys averaged about \$25 apiece each week—over and above expenses. This, indeed, was a tidy income for young men still enrolled in the university.

When the basketball season drifted by, Mike became a wrestling referee. Now he is starting as the third man in the ring for Herb Owen, Portland promoter who formerly made matches in Klamath Falls.

Mike travels with the Owen wrestlers through the Willamette valley district and touches Portland, Salem, Eugene and Corvallis.

At Corvallis, Mike isn't very popular for a few of the good citizens in the college town still recall his devastating work against the Beaver line.

It so happens that Corvallis has its own contribution to the wrestling profession—Don Wagner, former Beaver line-man and a member of the "Iron Men." Wagner, instead of turning to refereeing, took up the competitive end of the business and has been successful in northwest matches.

Mikulak was scheduled to referee the Wagner-Norbeck match at Corvallis earlier this week, but he failed to arrive. Corvallis, naturally, attributed it to Mike's reluctance to get into the same ring with a Beaver.

Football followers occasionally come to wonder what happens to all the stars of a few years ago. They do drift away and often are never heard of again.

Orville Bailey, Oregon end for two years under Dr. Spears and one with Prink Callison, is coaching at Reedsport high school over on the coast.

Bailey sent his team to the Southern Oregon Normal school tournament at Ashland last month. He had had successful outings both in football and basketball.

BOXING ANGLERS READY FOR FIRST DAY

Oregon Fishing Season Opens On Thursday, April 5.

Anglers of Klamath county were preparing this week to test the possibilities of the region's numerous streams and lakes Thursday, the first day of the season.

The fishing season this year will open earlier than in the past through a recent order of the Oregon game commission. A comparatively dry winter bringing the prospects of the best fishing early in the year rather than late was given as the reason for the shift in dates.

Sportmen familiar with conditions in the Klamath country declare the angling season of 1934 should be an outstanding one.

The following is a synopsis of waters in Klamath county affected by game commission regulations:

Reports from Vic Palmer, who made a special trip through fishing points in the northern part of the county in the Service unusually good fishing conditions and good fishing goods company Scout Car Friday, describe, with most roads open to easy travel.

The Scout Car got in eleven and a half miles to the snow line on the Diamond lake road from The Dalles-Klamath Falls highway. A rock crusher is in, and work is to start on the road in about 90 days, Palmer said, but it will be impossible for cars to get in before that time.

Creek Is Boggy  
The Marsh creek road is boggy, but passable. Marsh creek is low, and lots of large fish were seen in the creek.

The road to Odell and Crescent lakes is in excellent condition. Trout are feeding on flies in both lakes, Palmer reported. The road to Elk lake is also open to the south end of the lake, and in good condition.

Trout are rising to flies on the Little Deschutes. The road to Crane Prairie, below Sheep Bridge on the Deschutes and the road to Pringle Falls are in good condition. Trout are rising to flies there.

Paulina Road Open  
Fishing on South Twin Lakes will be good on Trout Oreno, Andy Reeker and Bucktail Caddis, Palmer said. The road is in good driving condition.

The road is open to Paulina lake, and in very good condition to within a mile of the lake, where the grade is soft but passable. The fish are feeding about 10 feet offshore on black gnats.

Ray Reed, at Paulina, suggests using trout oreno, Andy Reeker, redhead bass, plugs, bucktail caddis, and black gnats.

The north fork of the Sprague is low and the water clear, with the roads in good condition.

Crooked Creek, a tributary of Wood river, closed to angling within the boundaries of the state game commission hatchery property.

Fawn lake, open season for angling May 27, to September 30. Klamath river for a distance of 4,000 feet below and 2,000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek open season for angling June 15 to November 15, both dates inclusive.

Letter lake, Hazel lake and the Three Rosary lakes open season for angling May 27 to September 15, both dates inclusive.

Lake of the Woods, open season for angling for trout May 1 to November 30, both dates inclusive. Bag limit for trout shall be 10 pounds and 1 fish, but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day, and 20 pounds and 1 fish, but not to exceed 30 fish in any 7 consecutive days.

Link river, beginning at the California Oregon Power company's dam on Link river to a point 200 feet below said dam, closed to angling.

Miller lake, formerly known as Fish lake, open season for angling for trout April 5 to September 15, both dates inclusive. Bag limit for trout shall be 10 pounds and 1 fish, but not to exceed 15 fish in any one day, and 20 pounds and 1 fish, but not to exceed 30 fish in any 7 consecutive days.

Odell lake and Crescent lake, open season for angling April 5 to September 15, both dates inclusive.

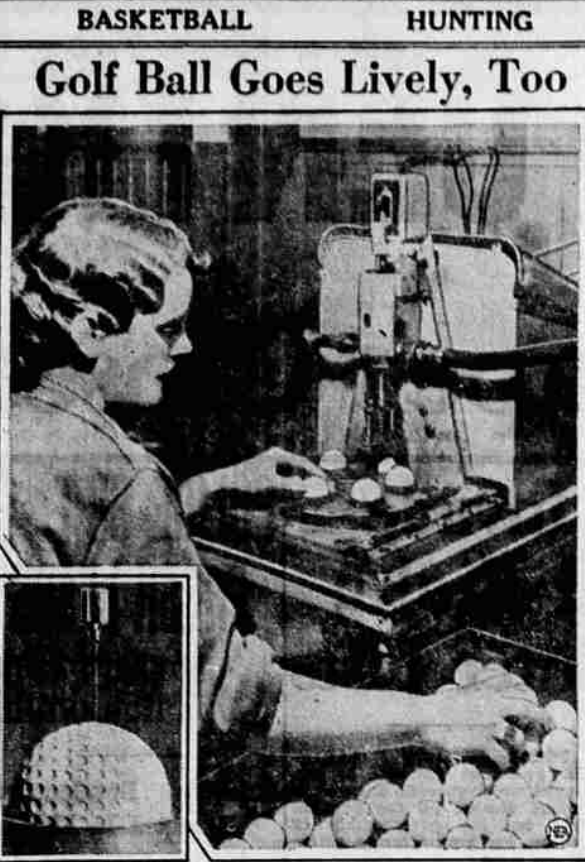
Odell creek from Odell lake to a point one-half mile down stream, closed to angling. Open season for angling in that part of Odell creek other than herein above described April 5 to September 15, both dates inclusive.

Odell lake lying east of a line drawn across said lake from the mouth of Resort creek to Chinquapin point closed to angling. Spencer creek closed to angling.

Seven Mile creek, open season for angling from April 5 to September 30, both dates inclusive. Except as otherwise herein specifically provided for, the bag limit for trout on all inland lakes and their tributaries shall be 15 pounds and 1 fish, but not to exceed 25 fish in any one day, and 30 pounds and 1 fish, but not to exceed 50 fish in any 7 consecutive days.

Two Cellar Teams May Bid for Major League Pennants

NEW YORK, April 3 (AP)—Boston's Red Sox and the Philadelphia Phillies finished last year's major league pennant races as runners-up for the cellar berths, but they're due to be far apart by the end of the fast approaching season. The Red Sox probably will improve their standing three pegs. The Phillies probably will slide to the cellar.

Between season activities bring these conclusions. For the Red Sox it was a matter of much money spent; for the Phillies much money taken in.

Young Thomas Yawkey has poured a fraction of his millions into the Red Sox. He turned loose Eddie Collins, a shrewd baseball man. Collins immediately hired Bucky Harris, former Detroit manager, to handle the club, and went on to make some important purchases.

No. 1 buy was Lefty Grove, American league pitching king. No. 2 was Rube Walberg. They were obtained from Connie Mack's Philadelphia Athletics. These two men will be the foundation of a promising pitching department which includes Fred Ostermueller, a rookie from Rochester, and Bob Weiland. All are left handed, and the chief relief pitcher, Herb Pennock, also is a southpaw.

Yawkey, Collins and Harris will have to gamble on their infield. Eddie Morgan will start at first; Max Bishop, at second; Bill Cissell, at short, and Bucky Walters from San Francisco, at third. Rick Ferrell will catch. Julius Solters, batting king of the International league last year, will be a regular in the outfield. Carl Reynolds is another regular in the field. Roy Johnson and Dusty Cooke are available.

Summed up, the Red Sox will start the drive with a creditable outfield, a formidable pitching and catching staff, and an infield which has performed capably in the grapefruit league.

The Phillies were in desperate financial straits when the 1933 season ended and immediately sold their outstanding player, Chuck Klein, to the Chicago Cubs. In return the Phillies got three players and \$100,000. Catcher Virgil Davis went to the Cards in exchange for Jimmy Wilson who will manage the club.

The infield is half rookie. Irvingie Jeffries will be at second and Marty Hopkins at third. They were brought up from St. Paul. Don Hurst is a holdover at first, and Dick Bartell at short.

Chick Fullis at left, Ethan Allen at center and Wes Schulmerich at right, is probable outfield lineup. Henry Gans, a Hawaiian a .337 hitter brought east from Portland, will be given occasional turns in the field.

The Phillies have no pitching ace. Six moundmen are holdovers: Phil Collins, Jim Elliott, Roy Hansen, Ed Holley, Cy Moore and Frank Pearce. There are four rookie pitchers: Ted Kleinhaus, Reggie Grabowski, Curt Davis from San Francisco, and George Darrow from Galveston.

Runyan Victor in Golf Tourney

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va., April 3. (AP)—Paul Runyan, White Plains, N. Y., professional, smashed what is believed a world's record to win the second annual \$1500 Cavalier open golf tournament with four consecutive cards under 70.

Runyan turned in 69, 65, 66 and 67 for a total of 270 on the 72 holes. He won the same tournament last year with a total of 280. Par for the course is 272.

Harry Cooper, Chicago, finished second with 278, while Ky Laffoon, Denver, trailed him by one stroke.

COAST PENNANT CHASE BEGINS

"Play Ball!" Echoes Through Parks of Four Cities.

The Pacific coast league's 1934 season got under way today in a pennant chase that promised revived interest on the part of the fans and the prospects of a red hot baseball battle during the 26-week campaign.

The eight clubs of the class AA circuit, first in the country to open, paired off in four California cities, as has been the custom for many years.

Ducks Play Angels  
Opening series brought together Portland at Los Angeles; Seattle at San Francisco; Hollywood at Oakland and the Missions at Sacramento.

After several lean years that saw some clubs chalk up financial reverses and others how close to the border line, directors of the league participated in opening ceremonies for the 32nd annual season with new found optimism.

All signs indicated the baseball depression is definitely on the retreat. Capacity or near capacity attendances were the rule. Larger week day crowds than in 1933 were forecast, for the start of this season Earl McNeely, owner of the Sacramento club, reported more than 50 boxes sold for the season as compared to less than half that number a year ago.

Proxy to Attend  
In Los Angeles a gala opening was arranged, with three brass bands and the league president, Hyland Baggerly, in attendance. San Francisco's mayor, Angelo Rossi, and his arm to pitch the first ball in his home town. Ty Cobb, one of baseball's immortals, had the role of honorary leadoff batter at Oakland.

Every team presented new player faces, some in wholesale numbers. Los Angeles, 1933 pennant winner, was picked by many as the team to beat for the championship again this year. Hollywood, San Francisco's Seals and the San Francisco Missions, were backed by many experts.

Beavers Underdogs  
Portland, runner-up last year, found less favor at the start of this season because of the sale of many players who were mainstays in 1933. Sacramento, Seattle and Oakland, likewise opened the pennant drive with teams of questionable strength.

Two new managers made their appearances with Charles "Gabby" Street, former St. Louis Cardinals' pilot, leading the Missions and Walter McCredie, back in the saddle at Portland, a position he held with that club many years ago.

After one season of "two bit" baseball, the directors boosted the admission prices for 1934. Bleachers were raised to 40 cents and grandstand seats from 60 cents to 75 cents.

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INJURY JINX HITS MAJORS

Dodgers Lose Services of Young Pitcher; Veterans Ill.

OLANDO, Fla., April 3. (UP)—The illness and injury jinx, which has been working overtime among major league clubs this spring, struck the Brooklyn Dodgers when young Linus Frey, promising infielder, was hit on the head by a pitched ball during the batting practice preceding a game with the Athletics.

Dick Leslie Munna, a fast ball specialist from St. Paul, threw the ball. It hit Frey just above the right temple. He fell and was still unconscious when carried into the ambulance which took him to Orange hospital.

Hospital List Heavy  
Physicians said he suffered a moderate brain concussion. Dr. Frank Gray, after examining X-ray plates, announced that no skull fracture was indicated. Frey was resting comfortably and he will remain in the hospital under close observation for several days.

Manager Casey Stengel said he will not use him in the lineup until after the championship season starts, even if he is discharged in a few days.

Not in years have so many injuries and illnesses affected important players during training. Rabbit Maranville of the Braves broke his leg; Dick Bartell of the Phillies was spiked seriously; Mickey Cochrane, player-manager of the Tigers, is in a hospital with a stomach ailment, and Lefty Grove of the Boston Red Sox has a mysterious malady in his arm preventing proper training.

Dodgers in Bad Luck  
If Frey's injury is serious, it is doubly unfortunate for the Dodgers. Manager Casey Stengel is convinced that Frey is capable of playing second base. In case he has to trade off Tony Cuccinello or other infield material to the Braves or Phillies for a pitcher, preferably a left hander.

The Dodgers must obtain at least one more capable starting pitcher. Injuries to Maranville and Bartell have put the Braves and Phillies in a mood to acquire a capable infielder. If Frey is forced out of the game lengthily it may interfere with a Brooklyn deal, although Stengel has other trading material besides Cuccinello. Tony is the man the other clubs want, however.

Detroit Manager Still in Hospital

LAKEHURST, Pa., April 3. (AP)—Mickey Cochrane, catcher-manager of the Detroit Tigers, does not have appendicitis, but will be kept under observation for another 48 hours, physicians announced today.

Ice packs are still being applied to Cochrane's abdomen, and his diet will be restricted while observations are continued. Cochrane was stricken with a severe cramp on Saturday. At first he was believed suffering with appendicitis.

LOS ANGELES, April 3. (AP)—Arlene Campbell, holdout pitcher, came to terms with the Hollywood Stars and signed his contract for the coming season. Campbell won 22 games for the Stars last year.
