found in the wrecked home, where Frank Flieder, his wife and four guests were battered and shot to death last Thursday night. Valuable diamond rings were missing after the crime.

Slayer Believed Hurt

One of the slayers was undoubtedly wounded in the battle, May said after examining blood stains, and determining that some of them came from a person other than the six victims. Medical attention would probably soon have been needed.

Therefore, on such a belief, Sheriff D. L. Blankenship called today for physicians in their offices here, at Seattle, and at other western Washington centers to report their unexplained wounds. Fingerprints found in the house, he said, would soon identify them.

Brother Gives Theory

Meanwhile, as the Seattle underworld was being investigated on reports that Fred Blacorn, a bartender and one of the victims, and both Mr. and Mrs. Flieder had had altercations with persons there, Jack Flieder, of Seattle, a brother, gave his theory of the affair.

The brother, co-proprietor of a beer parlor, has been at the scene of the crime aiding authorities.

Robbers, known to Flieder, came to their summer colony home last Thursday night, he said in reconstructing the deed, and ransacked the bell.

"When Frank went to the door, he recognized at least one of them and he knew that they were after his money. They forced their way in, and fired a shot to intimidate the rest."

One Breaks Bonds

A bullet had glanced off the kitchen stove, as it fired from near the doorway.

Then the members of the party were probably tied up, at pistol point, and their mouths taped, he said. At that point, Eugene Chenevert, a 225-pound man of great strength, became incensed and broke his bonds and started to fight. In the struggling, either he or another of the party was killed.

The robbers, knowing that everyone in the house knew their identity, then proceeded to slaughter the entire party, using hammers and knives brutally. Two of the victims were shot.

pear on Wednesday at 2 p. m. Shaw and Hayes will probably plead in the next two or three days.

Political aspects of the situation are believed affected by the probable deferment of the charity fund cases. Judge Duncan stated a few days ago he believed the matter should be disposed of as soon as possible in order to clear the political atmosphere, and it is believed Mayor W. E. Mahoney, whose governorship campaign fund allegedly received \$200 from the charity fund, was anxious that the whole matter be cleared up as soon as possible.

Trial Date Indefinite

Attorney Vandenberg indicated in court Tuesday morning he may move against the indictments in the cases of Shaw and Hayes. After the indictments were read, he said something to the court about preliminary action in the case but was cut short by Judge Duncan, who asked him if Monday would be a satisfactory day to begin the trial.

"I cannot possibly start this case Monday," said Vandenberg, who is also an attorney for Horace M. Manning, charged with first degree murder, whose trial starts a week from Monday.

"I thought the defendants wanted a speedy trial," said Judge Duncan.

"Mr. Shaw has told me he was willing that the case should follow ordinary procedure," answered Vandenberg.

"If you can't go to trial Monday, it will be some time before the case can be heard," said Judge Duncan.

Courtroom Filled

Blackmer, speaking for Cook, then asked the statutory time to plead, and the date for his plea was set.

Shaw, Cook and Hayes, who have been out on \$500 bond, came into court separately. Shaw stood against the railing with Vandenberg during the proceedings. Cook sat in the row of chairs just inside the bar, and Hayes stood by the window behind the court clerk's desk. The place was filled with spectators.

The arraignment of the three former policemen, who were dismissed by Mayor Mahoney just before the grand jury indicted them for alleged conversion of \$245 of the police charity fund, took only a few minutes.

TURKS REJECT FUGITIVE'S LAST APPEAL

pared to battle to the last ditch against both the arrest of the weeping Chicagoan, held today in the hospital room of the house of detention under what is called "house arrest," and his actual extradition.

Turkey considers the Insull case closed. After authorities had said Insull would be denied the right to appeal, the court of cassation made it final by definitely ruling against any new move.

It was not known what arrangements the American government was making to speed Insull's return. American Ambassador Robert P. Skinner has requested instructions from Washington concerning sending Insull to America.

Next Step Unclear

There were reports some American in Turkey might be deputized to act as a special police officer for take Insull back to Illinois for trial on larceny and fraud charges.

On the other hand, a possibility was seen that it might be necessary for Turkish officials to hold the weary traveler here for from 10 days to two weeks until American authorities arrive.

After Insull had been lodged in a little one-windowed cell, the American government was invited last night, in effect, to "come and get" him.

The national assembly of Turkey had removed the last apparent obstacle to extradition when it ratified an extradition treaty with the United States.

U. S. SENDS THANKS

WASHINGTON, April 3 (AP)—The state department today instructed Robert P. Skinner, American ambassador to Ankara, to convey to the Turkish government the American government's appreciation of Turkey's prompt action in arresting and extraditing Samuel Insull.

Turkish police have been requested to hold Insull until the necessary arrangements for his return to Chicago have been made.

Norton Affirmed in Court Case

Judge H. G. Norton was affirmed in a decision handed down by Justice Bailey of the supreme court Tuesday in the case of H. J. Winters, appellant, and Mary E. Winters, (deceased), plaintiff, vs. the Fall Lumber company and others.

The appeal was from Klamath county in a suit to quiet title. Judge Norton of Jackson county, presided on the Klamath bench during the absence of Judge W. M. Duncan.

Sletneff took off from Teller, Alaska, yesterday.

Sletneff is flying the second mercy plane of the Russian relief expedition. Accompanying him is Assistant Mechanic Bill Lavery.

PORTLAND, April 3 (AP)—Allen Griffin, 29, racing car driver and garage employee, suffered critical injuries which may cause his death when his automobile crashed through a guard rail on a curve on Canyon road before dawn today and rolled 200 feet down an embankment. The automobile, which belonged to a customer of the garage, was demolished. Police said it must have been traveling 60 miles an hour when Griffin lost control on the curve.

ern Utah at freezing and below last night, overcast skies were believed by fruit men to have prevented much damage to their crops.

Forecasts for temperatures from 29 to 30 degrees in the Salt Lake valley tonight, and apprehension was felt that fruit buds, in an advanced stage because of unseasonably warm weather in recent weeks, might be frozen.

The snowfall was hailed as a boon to pastures and crops, and was believed to have caused no damage to sheep and lambs.

THE DALLES, April 3 (AP)—A killing frost which had been predicted for this region, did not materialize last night, although a light frost was reported from some districts. Damage was nominal. The minimum temperature was 31 degrees at The Dalles, but was slightly lower in the orchards.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., April 3 (AP)—A survey of damage done by the freeze early today now disclosed that there will be some loss in pears, cherries and Gravenstein apples in orchards located in cold areas. Whether this damage will cut into what promised two weeks ago to be a bumper crop or whether it will provide a necessary thinning cannot be determined until after the set is completed.

While the temperature turned warmer later in the day, the skies remain clear and an east wind prevails causing growers to fear another frost tonight.
