

W. E. MAHONEY ISSUES STAND FOR GOVERNOR

Mayor Willis E. Mahoney, democratic governorship aspirant, has issued his statement of platform and policies on which he will make his campaign.

Mahoney included in his platform for mayor here a promise to "give the city hall back to the people." In his governorship statement, he states he will return the state government to the service and benefit of the people.

The statement follows:

A lifelong democrat and standing squarely behind President Roosevelt, I ask your support in winning the democratic nomination for governor. As governor, I shall return the state government to the service and benefit of the people. Dominated by nobody, and independent of any allegiance to any group, I will fearlessly press the following reforms to make the state government advance the material prosperity and social happiness of Oregon:

1. Stand for:
 1. Bonneville power; federal government to control the switch at Bonneville dam; state to purchase power and issue self-liquidating certificates to build state transmission lines; state to sell power at cost to municipalities and power districts.
 2. State unemployment insurance.
 3. Liberalization of old-age pensions; revision of law to provide adequate relief for widows and orphans.
 4. State public works program.
 5. Immediate construction of deepsea locks at Bonneville dam.
 6. Repeal of Knox law and return of home rule to cities.
 7. Immediate liquidation of closed savings and loan institutions.
 8. No tax on homes under \$3000 valuation.
 9. Rehabilitation of disabled and other working people; make Lee-Hockman law operative immediately.
 10. Liberalization of workman compensation law.
 11. Consolidation and elimination of useless state departments; reduction of state taxes.
 12. Fifty per cent tax on incomes and inheritances in excess of \$50,000.
 13. Seventy-car train bill.
 14. Rate-making valuation of public utilities to be used as a basis of taxation.
 15. Redistribution of wealth.
- I am against:
 1. Domination of state by Portland Chamber of Commerce and the public utilities.
 2. Sales tax.
 3. Chain store domination.
 4. Guarantee to the people on our farms a sympathetic consideration. I am in complete accord with the grange program. The tax burden on farm property must be relieved.

It is the duty of the state government to show every consideration to the world war veterans, who have found it impossible to meet principal and interest payments on their loans during the period of depression. Our people are hungering for the primary function of government is to contribute to the happiness, comfort and welfare of men, women and children. They are demanding that our state government be returned to the people and that it no longer be the servant of selfish corporate wealth now in control.

I pledge to the people of Oregon a new deal calling for a clean sweep at Salem and embracing and recognizing every class and every section of the state.

HAKODATE, Northern Japan, Thursday, April 5, (UP)—A new

fire which for a time today menaced Hakodate, scene of a catastrophic fire last month, was controlled today before it reached American missions, the British consulate and other foreign buildings.

More than 70 buildings left undamaged by the earlier fire which cost more than 1000 lives, were leveled in the blaze today.
