## WHEAT NATIONS STUDY STATUS OF WORLD MART

ROME, April 5 (AP)—With an American in the chair, the world wheat advisory commission met today to seek new ways and means of raising and stabilizing the prices of wheat.

John Van A. MacMurray, American minister to Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania, presided at the opening session. Two other American delegates, Dr. Mordecai Ezekiel, economic adviser to the secretary of agriculture, and Frederick E. Murphy, Minneapolis publisher, figured prominently.

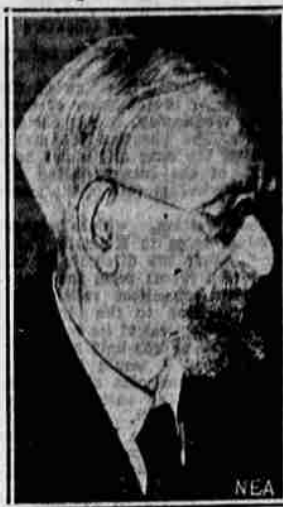
With the general idea in mind of reducing the world's supply and increasing the demand for wheat, the commission—consisting of delegates from the United States, Canada, Argentina, Australia, England, France, Germany, Russia, and seven other smaller nations—began consideration of the following proposals:

1. Set minimum prices for wheat exports;
  2. Discourage government financial assistance, which depresses export prices;
  3. Withdraw low qualities of wheat from human consumption by denaturing them and feeding to cattle and pigs;
  4. Increase consumption of wheat by decreasing the percentage of flour extracted;
  5. Permit future exports of denatured wheat as outside export quotas;
  6. Campaign to better the quality of bread;
  7. Cut wheat for hax and green fodder;
  8. Make wheat more easily available to countries which at present use little of it;
  9. Compensation in trade for wheat importing countries agreeing to reduce wheat acreage.
- The commission met this morning in the economic room of the International Institute of Agriculture, with 35 delegates present. After an afternoon recess, they planned another meeting this evening.

### L. A. BANKS CASE HEARD AT SALEM

SALEM, April 5 (AP)—Arguments in the appeal in the case of L. A. Banks, now serving a life term in the state penitentiary for the slaying of Officer George J. Prescott at Medford on March 16 of last year, were heard before the supreme court here today.

Seven alleged assignments of error were shown. These included admission in evidence at the trial of certain articles found at the Banks home following the murder, refusal of the trial judge to give certain instructions to the jury, denial of a new trial motion and failure of the trial court to direct a verdict in favor of the defendant.

Banks was tried in Lane

county under a change of venue with Judge G. F. Skipworth presiding. The prosecution was handled by Ralph E. Moody, assistant attorney general, while Frank Lonergan of Portland acted as chief counsel for the defendant assisted by Attorney Charles A. Hardy of Eugene.

### Residential Areas Lead in Accidents

SALEM, Ore., April 5 (UP)—The greatest number of fatal automobile accidents in Oregon last year took place in residential districts of cities, the secretary of state's office announced today.

Twenty-seven persons were killed in such sections. The Pacific highway was the scene of 24 fatal accidents. Others included rural roads 16, Columbia river highway 16, business sections of cities 2.

### Two Candidates Withdraw Names

SALEM, April 5 (AP)—Two candidates for state representative today withdrew their names from the list of filings. They were Merle G. Campbell, republican, and Gladys M. Everett, democrat, of Portland, who had both filed for nomination to the house from the Fifth district, Multnomah county.

One late filing which had not been previously published was that of Walter Toose, Portland, for state representative from the Fifth district.
