PRESBYTERY MEETS HERE WEDNESDAY

Beginning Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock a bilateral meeting of the Presbytery of Southwestern Oregon and the Presbytery of the same district, which comprises all of southern Oregon south of Eugene, is to be held in the First Presbyterian church. While certain of the sessions will be joint, each organization has its own program to be followed out for April 11 to 13.

On Wednesday evening Dr. D. T. Robertson of Marshfield, retiring moderator of the Presbytery, will preach the opening sermon and constitute the presbytery, when the new moderator for the coming year will be elected. On Thursday each organization will carry out its respective business program with the newly elected moderator in charge of the men's meeting and Mrs. T. M. Stott of Grants Pass in charge of the Presbyterian or women's gathering. At 11:30 a. m., a communion service with Rev. Knud Iverson, Sunday school missionary in charge.

Arrangements have been made with the ladies of the First Methodist church to have luncheon, served at noon and a banquet for all centering especially in the young people's service. It is hoped that Walter Duff, Jr., the evangelist, may be able to remain for this banquet. He is to appear before the Presbytery for license as an evangelist during the morning, leaving his campaign in Portland temporarily for that purpose.

Among the outside speakers will be Miss Donaldina Cameron, internationally known in connection with her work in China and in America in behalf of the suppression of the sale of Chinese girls and their importation into America for immoral purposes. She is a magnetic speaker and will be on the program Thursday evening at the popular meeting. Miss Maria Kere, representing the Presbyterian Women's Missionary Board and Miss I. A. Bates, president of the Oregon Synodical, will also participate in the program. The public is invited to any of these sessions.

The local congregation is hostess to this numerous gathering, which, for the first time, is meeting jointly.

BABY CHICKS COME VIA POST OFFICE

Although farmers in the valley made many complaints concerning the high cost of baby chicks last year, they have been buying them by the hundreds this spring.

The report comes from the Klamath Falls postoffice department. The exchange of mail by busy employees has failed to drown out the youthful chirps of these birds. The chicks come in flat boxes, 100 to each. Approximately 500 to 1,000 have been received each day. Like numbers have been sent out each morning to the farmers of the valley and surrounding territories. The chicks are of high breeding, many of them Plymouth Rocks and Rhode Island Reds.

BRIEFS FILED IN WESTBOUND RATE DISPUTE

Hearings have been concluded and opening briefs have been filed in the westbound meat rate case now pending before the Interstate Commerce Commission, a matter of considerable interest to the Klamath livestock industry.

Principal contentions of corn belt packers and affiliated meat packers in seeking rates that will permit drastic inroads upon the slaughtering and meat packing business of the Mountain-Pacific territory have been completed at the Portland office of the Northwestern Livestock Shippers' Traffic League and Farm Rate Council by Miss Mabel Irwin, secretary. These and some of the arguments advanced for maintaining status quo are set forth in the following statement just issued by the Northwestern League and Rate Council secretary.

"The purpose of this case, according to brief of the opening brief, is to reduce the number of live hogs and increase the volume of corn belt meat products that move west.

"To this the producers and packers of the Mountain-Pacific respond that any displacement of slaughtering or packing in the Mountain-Pacific territory would be injurious to the public interest, encourage dumping of corn belt surpluses, interfere with orderly marketing of livestock, and tend to destroy many independent slaughtering and packing businesses that now furnish competition both in the buying of livestock and the selling of meat products.

"It is also pointed out in opposition to the corn belt packers' complaint already control over 80 per cent of the meat packing and processing business that moves in interstate commerce, and that Chicago headquarters of the larger packers have been 'suppressing competition both in the purchase of livestock and in the selling of dressed meat.'

"The Farm Rate Council expresses opposition to monopolistic practices among packers everywhere, pointing out that freight rates which bottle up livestock favor monopoly.

"The corn belt packers contend that there is no justification for having the freight rates upon packing house products from the Missouri river to the west coast twice as high as the rates upon live animals when the commission has found that the rates to the east coast upon packing house products and upon livestock should be the same level.

"To this, the reply is that bringing meat food products from the corn belt into the Mountain-Pacific territory is like carrying coals to Newcastle, as a surplus of livestock is produced in this section and the volume of movement of meat food products should be small.

"Also it is pointed out that corn belt packing house products under present rates move freely and are found in butcher shops throughout the Mountain-Pacific territory.

"The corn belt packers also contend that the increased volume of movement would be profitable to the railroads and would more than offset the losses from the rate reductions.

"Corn belt interests also contend that their complaint would be satisfied if the livestock rates were raised for distances over 700 miles. Such an increase in the livestock rates, they claim, would be beneficial to the corn belt packers, Mountain-Pacific livestock producers, and the railroads.

"The reply to this is that increased rates for distances over 700 miles would be injurious to the livestock producers of this area who ship east and who ship into the growing markets of California, which are over 700 miles distant. Also it is contended that the increase of the long-haul livestock rates would tend to 'bottle-up' the livestock producer and force him to sell at lower prices throughout the country.

"The railroads in their briefs join the producers and packers of the Mountain-Pacific territory in opposing the reductions sought in the rates upon fresh meat and packing house products but look with favor upon the suggestion that the long-haul livestock rates be raised."

Hearings in this case were held at Chicago, Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles. The Farm Rate Council is being represented by Arthur M. Geary, Portland attorney. The next step is for Examiners Chester E. Stiles and Arthur S. Parker, who are in charge of the case, to make their recommendations to the Interstate Commerce Commission. Then will come the filing of concluding briefs and oral argument at Washington before the whole commission.

No decision is expected in the case before fall.
