CIVIC LEADERS BOOST SPORTS

Athletic Program Presented to School Officials.

A program of expanding the physical education facilities of the Klamath Falls school system in view of strengthening the athletic teams of the high school was presented Tuesday night by a group of business men. The organization, known as the Businessmen's Athletic Committee, drew its membership from all service clubs in the city.

A general athletic and physical educational outline was laid before the members of the two school boards, officials of the high school and grade schools, and members of the coaching staffs. The meeting, an enthusiastic one, was held at the high school and was attended by more than a score of athletic-minded citizens.

Further Work Planned.

The committee, headed by H. P. Bosworth and F. B. Watters, will meet with J. Percy Wells, superintendent of city schools, and Paul T. Jackson, principal of Klamath Union high school, to discuss in detail the suggested program. No action was taken last night, but the movement to bring all students into some phase of athletics appeared sufficiently strong to assure it of permanent influence.

The plan, in brief, would coordinate the physical education system of the grade schools and the high schools. It would give students in the grammar schools fundamental training in football, track, baseball and basketball to prepare them for major competition in high school.

Baseball Record Traced. The method already has been at work in basketball and much responsibility for Klamath Falls' record at the state tournament was traced to the fact that the young men had received training under J. W. Peak, physical education director, in the grade schools. It will be the purpose of the committee to extend the program to other sports insofar as it is advisable.

Beyond the competitive athletic interest and the desire to give Klamath Falls successful interscholastic teams, the benefit of athletic training was generally pointed out as complementary to scholastic standards, morale and citizenship as well as a method of building strong bodies.

Suggestions Outlined. The committee made the following proposals for school district number one:

1. To establish a physical education department for both boys and girls in each of the schools in school district No. 1. This should be under the direction of a general supervisor. It is the request of the committee that steps be taken to include such a department in the 1984-1985 school year program. The records maintained by this department would become available to a similar department to be established in Klamath Union High School District No. 2.

In so far as organized athletics are concerned, it is the suggestion of the committee that a uniform system be adopted so that the training received in the grade schools will correspond with the training in effect in the high school.

2. To have the board select one male instructor for each of the grade schools, as soon as convenient. In addition to the academic work, part of this instructor's duties would be to supervise the physical education and organized athletics within that school. The instructor will be compensated for his work by the district. It is the suggestion of the committee that consideration be given to this matter as soon as a vacancy occurs on the staff of each of the schools.

3. To take such steps as are necessary to improve the playground facilities in each of the schools, in order to reduce the element of accident to a minimum.

4. To provide funds in future budgets to perpetuate this work and to maintain adequate and satisfactory equipment at all times.

This committee will cooperate in the following manner:

1. We will arrange for voluntary instruction in organized athletics to cover the students in the seventh and eighth grades during the coming school year and thereafter until a permanent arrangement is effected by the school board.

2. This committee will furnish as much equipment as possible in order to start this program and will assist from time to time in replacement or additions, although we feel that a functionally sound equipment is a function of the cooperation of parents and the school district.

3. The committee as a whole will popularize the program in order to arouse widespread interest among the townspeople.

4. We will furnish prizes or awards in order to stimulate interest among the students.

Plan for District 2. For district number two these suggestions were offered:

1. To establish an adequate physical education department

amongst both boys and girls. The work of this department should be a continuation of that established within the grade schools.

2. To assign the coaches of the various sports to this department in so far as possible. We feel that the best system would be to require only work within the physical education department of the high school athletic coaches. These coaches would supervise the work in their particular branches in the grade schools.

3. To take such steps as are necessary to improve the available facilities, in order to reduce the element of accident. One point which already has been discussed is the present condition of the track. It has been reported that there are soft and hard spots, holes and ridges, and that as the result of this general condition one ankle recently was badly sprained. A detailed study should be made of the general conditions which prevail and steps taken to correct any defects noted.

4. To encourage pride and interest on the part of the student body in the maintenance and development of the present facilities. We feel that to a large extent this is a proper function and obligation of the student body and that such participation should be voluntary. In appreciation of the facilities offered.

5. To provide sufficient funds in future budgets to perpetuate this work and to maintain an adequate supply of equipment at all times.

The committee will assist in this work in the following manner:

1. To arouse general interest in the necessity of this program in order to justify the expenditure.
2. To popularize the program of the athletic department of Klamath Union high school amongst the citizens of Klamath Falls and Klamath county.

3. To offer various awards from time to time in order to stimulate interest amongst the students.

4. To assist at the present time in securing needed equipment for organized athletics.

5. To aid in the sale of sponsor tickets.

Track and Baseball Committees. Track and baseball committees were named to offer their services to the schools in preparing for the season. The work will include improvements on Modoc field to make it best suitable for normal competition.

The program was received sympathetically by members of the two boards. Among the citizens broadly discussing the proposals were Dwight French, director of athletics at the high school; Paul T. Jackson, principal; A. M. Collier, member of the city school board; C. A. Dunn, Dr. Dean Osburn, Leslie Avritt, high school coach; J. W. Peak, physical education director in city schools; Lynn Roycroft, J. Percy Wells, school superintendent, and others.

The San Francisco Seals slipped down into second place in the Pacific Coast league today, leaving Los Angeles in possession of first place.

Roy Henshaw, passing out only seven scattered hits, hurled the Angels to an 8 to 0 victory yesterday over their home town rivals, the Hollywood Stars, who have the dubious distinction of being the only team blanked so far this season in league play. Young Jimmy Rego of Oakland shut out Hollywood last Saturday. Frank Shellenback, who established a new Coast league record for individual pitching by winning his 32nd game in his first start this season, was driven from the mound in the third inning when the Angels collected three runs. Gene Dillard, Los Angeles third baseman, hit a home run.

Ducks Down Sacs. Another San Francisco team, the Missions, took the measure of the Seals, 7 to 4. Gabby Street, Missions manager, was waved back to the bench in the third inning when he "wanted to know why" Umpire Bill Guthrie reversed his decision on a called strike. Joe Di Maggio, who last year set up a new league record for consecutive hits, banged out a triple and a single for his eighth straight game of safe hitting. "The Great" Walter Mails, who was knocked from the box in his first appearance this season, scored two strikeouts when he pitched the last inning as the fourth Seals hurler.

The Seattle Indians contented themselves with winning their game from Oakland, 6 to 4, and left to the Oaks the honor of piling up the most hits. The Acores amassed 14 bingles. Seattle gathered only nine but made them count. Shortstop Chuck Ellsworth of the tribe lifted the second pitched ball of the game for a home run.

The Portland Beavers lit into their former teammate, Lou Koupal, for nine of their 10 hits to defeat the Sacramento Senators, 4 to 2. Outfielder Tony Borja hit a homer for the Senators.

KLAMATH TEAMS ENTER LEAGUE

Pelicans, Shaw-Bertram Win Position in Strong Circuit.

The Southern Oregon baseball league, one of the outstanding youth organizations in the state last season, was reorganized at Medford Tuesday night. Membership was reduced to the four most powerful teams in the district.

Klamath Falls will place two teams in the field. The Klamath Pelicans, contender for the pennant last season, will again be one of the favored teams to win the title.

Shaw-Bertram Enters. Shaw-Bertram, claimant of the 1933 independent title in Klamath county, will be the second representative from this city.

The Medford Rogues and the Grants Pass Cavemen will complete the circuit.

The season will open on Sunday, April 22.

Klamath Teams Clash. The Pelicans will meet Shaw-Bertram in the opener here and the Medford Rogues will tackle the Cavemen at Grants Pass.

At the Medford meeting Al Hagon was elected president of the league and Billy Hulen, secretary.

Ken Williams, former major league star, will manage the Cavemen; Hal Haight will head the Rogues; Red Saunders the Pelicans and L. R. Wirtz, Shaw-Bertram.

A weekly schedule will be announced shortly. All clubs have organized strong lineups and have received pledges of support in their respective cities. The season is expected to be one of the most successful in the history of southern Oregon baseball.

The two heavyweights, both well over 200 pounds, clash in one of the one-hour double main events. Cox, rough and brutal, stood out as a slight favorite by reason of his recent victory over Al Karasick of Portland. Mack Lillard, Klamath promoter, was confident, however, the New Englander with the Harvard accent was sufficiently strong and sufficiently clever to hold an outstanding chance of upsetting the California bruiser.

Billy Edwards, Kansas City veteran, held the pre-match edge over Marvin Wessenberg, young athlete from the College of the Puget Sound at Tacoma. Wessenberg, a former football star in the Northwest Conference, was expected to make things difficult for the butcher boy.

Special interest was being given the matches by Klamath spectators. Cox has aroused considerable dislike and many will be eager to see him defeated.
