

MYSTERY AUTOS PROMISE CHASE

A wild goose chase that state policemen say "had its possibilities, just the same" brought two of the officers from Merrill to Klamath Falls Monday night in hot pursuit of two large automobiles bearing Illinois licenses.

About 11 o'clock the state police received a call from the sheriff at Alturas, stating two suspicious looking automobiles—large sedans with Illinois licenses—had passed through that place toward Klamath Falls.

Two officers from here drove immediately to the southern end of the county and waited. A large car came up the road, and apparently when the driver saw the officers, he turned around and hot-footed it toward California.

While following this machine, the officers met the two Illinois sedans. They left off the first chase, and started following the foreign cars.

The two sedans moved leisurely toward Klamath Falls and once or twice almost stopped. The police finally stepped out ahead of them, and the two cars followed them closely into Klamath Falls.

At Sixth and Klamath, the officers noticed that the cars turned off on Klamath avenue. The police machine quickly circled the block, came up behind, and gave the strangers the siren just outside the county jail.

One officer proceeded somewhat cautiously to the side of one of the sedans. There brief questioning revealed the drivers were two Klamath Falls men who had purchased the cars at Chicago to save freight charges and had driven them west. They live a few doors away from the county jail.

HEALTH OFFICERS BUSY FOR QUARTER

Fifteen child clinics were held in Klamath county under the auspices of the health unit during the quarter ending March 31, according to a report sent to the state board of health early in April. At these clinics there was a total attendance of 724.

Nine health lectures and talks were given during the quarter with an attendance of 496. Thirty-three general sanitary inspections were carried on by the unit, 18 investigations held and two nuisances abated.

The public health nurse made 132 nursing calls, 43 pre-school visits, 38 infant visits, and 82 school child visits.

One school inspection was held, and 121 children examined for defects. Twenty-six were treated for defects. In the work among county dependents, the health unit made 38 visits to the county home, 174 home visits, 22 to the county jail, 61 hospital visits, performed 12 operations, and treated 333 patients. A total of 164 investigations of county dependents was reported, 20 prisoners examined and two lunacy examinations held.

Office conference during the three month period to end 1934. One hundred cases of epidemiology were reported, and segregated as follows: scarlet fever, 31; chickenpox, 38; measles, 14; pneumonia, 6; German measles, 3; social diseases, 8. Diphtheria immunizations given by the health unit numbered 705, and smallpox vaccinations, 175 during the period.
