

Track Records May Fall

Physical Conditions Improved for Modoc Field Event. Four Southpaws on Pelican Hurling Staff. Lillard Gets the Limit. Five Pitchers Lead Coast Averages.

Every record established through the two years of competition in the Southern Oregon-Northern California Track and Field meet faces probable displacement when the youthful athletes of two states gather on Modoc field.

The 20-30 club of Klamath Falls, the sponsoring organization of this major spring track event, and all the contributing groups in the adjacent Oregon and California territories have succeeded in improving physical conditions for the meet. Much of the proposed work for Modoc field still is to be completed, but there is every assurance that both the track and the field will be admirably suited for record breaking exhibitions.

First place winners of 1932, the first year of the event, automatically became the record holders. Last year the majority of these original marks were wiped out by new performers. This year again will witness greater distances in the field and faster times on the track.

No one, of course, can regulate the weather—something particularly unfavorable in the past. This season, however, the date of the meet has been moved to the middle of May—the twelfth—and every promise of the weatherman is in favor of sunshine.

The newly formed Businessmen's Athletic commission will assist the sponsors in reconditioning Modoc field. The pits will be deepened and lengthened, an inside pole will be constructed, the track will be smoothed and hardened and the many chuck-holes will be removed from the field.

This third annual Southern Oregon-Northern California Track and Field meet promises to be the best.

Dwight French, Klamath high school baseball coach, looks forward to an extremely "eccentric" baseball season. French surveyed his squad of Pelicans this other day and discovered there were four southpaw hurlers seeking regular positions.

Mack Lillard, Klamath Falls wrestling promoter, admits quite frankly he isn't the world's most adroit angler. Lillard walked into a sporting goods store recently and ordered the clerk to "outfit him with everything he would need on a fishing trip." The clerk did a very thorough and expensive job.

But no matter, Lillard returned from Fish Lake in Jackson county last Sunday evening with a limit catch. Five pitchers with two victories each top the list in the hurling standings of the Pacific Coast league baseball race, unofficial averages showed.

Le Roy Herrmann, former Los Angeles moundman, now with San Francisco, had the most impressive mark with 11 strikeouts in his two triumphs. The other double winners for the first week of play and games of Tuesday of this week, were J. Millard Campbell, Los Angeles, Tom Flynn, veteran Sacramento southpaw, Hollis Thurston, Mission club, and Larry Gillick, Oakland.

OPENER MOVED DOWN TO MALIN

Pelican Baseball Team Set for First Game of Season.

Dwight French, Pelican baseball coach, announced Thursday morning that Klamath's opening game of the season with Malin Friday afternoon would be played on the south county city's diamond instead of Modoc field.

Original plans for the Pelicans to present their team first to Klamath Falls baseball followers were abandoned when Roland Parks, Malin coach, announced his team would be unable to make the trip. The second game with Malin, however, will be played here.

Team Well-Balanced.
The Pelicans, breaking into baseball for the first time in several years, appeared reasonably strong for the opening battle. The large squad is well balanced in hitting and fielding strength, and French is confident of a successful season.

Leon Deering, a right-hander, or Clarence Howie, a southpaw, will receive the pitching assignment. Howie was with the American Legion Junior baseball team along with a number of regulars on the Pelican squad.

Infielders Named.
Either Julius Saunders or Glenn Stiles will be named as catcher. The selection probably will depend upon the starting pitcher.
Roy Fuller, first base. Jimmy Fuller, second; Ed Wakeman, shortstop, and Carl Egelhoff, third, will form the infield strength.

Johnny Pastega, hard-hitting youngster from the Lebanon team, will start right field with Gerald Muselman in center and Horace Hodge in left.
It is recalled that the last high school baseball team was an outstanding one. This year's team, apparently, will have to step to equal the record of the past.

The Malin game will start at 2:00 o'clock.

The hard-hitting Los Angeles Angels found themselves in front of the field by two full games in the Pacific Coast league today after the first night game in the league this season had brought the San Francisco Seals to their second straight setback.

The Angels took their second straight game from the Hollywood Stars, 11 to 7, in a free hitting affair yesterday. Jack Hille, Hollywood rookie, held the Angels to one hit in the last three innings after they had landed on Archie Campbell and Jack Quinn for 13 bingles and their 11 runs. Louie Garland, young relief pitcher, stepped in to save the game with two strikeouts after the Stars had found Art McDougal for four runs in the sixth inning. Frank Demaree, Angel outfielder, hit a home run to increase his season's total to five.

Missions on Spruce
A crowd officially estimated at 5,000 saw the San Francisco Missions go on a scoring spree to defeat the Seals, 10 to 5, in the first night contest. Both starting pitchers, James Zinn of the Seals and Clarence Mitchell of the Missions, were driven from the mound. A four-run rally in the sixth inning brought the Missions victory after the Seals had tied the score at 5-5.

Holding the Portland Beavers to three singles, Manuel Salvo hurled the Sacramento Senators to a 10 to 0 victory. The game was on fairly even terms until the eighth inning, when the Senators pounded out nine hits to score 8 runs. Second baseman Alex Kampouris hit a homer and a single in the same inning to bring in four runs. Portland used three pitchers.

A ninth inning home run by Leroy Anton, first baseman, brought Oakland a 6 to 5 win over the Seattle Indians. The score had remained deadlocked after Seattle had tied it in the seventh inning with three runs, driving Ray Kremer from the mound. Anton was the first batter up in the ninth.

REGATTA DATE SET JUNE 17

Upper Klamath Lake Event Changed to Avoid Conflicts.

The date of the Upper Klamath lake regatta under the sponsorship of the junior chamber of commerce will be held Sunday, June 17, according to announcements made Thursday by the organization's officers.

The change was made from June 10 to avoid conflict with the annual Rose Festival at Portland.

Big Event Outlined
The chamber this year will concentrate its efforts in making the regatta one of the outstanding water sports events in the Northwest. For that reason official plans to direct the official opening of Crater Lake National park have been abandoned. The group considered its schedule would be too full if it attempted to sponsor both events.

Formal invitation blanks for the Upper Klamath lake regatta will be sent out this season by the National Outboard Motor association. Drivers in all parts of Oregon, Washington and California will be invited to compete, and it is expected a record entry list will be filled with the committee in charge.

Sailboat Race a Feature
The sailboat race again will be one of the outstanding features of the regatta. Owners of boats in this district already have had their craft on the lake for trial spins.

Roland Watt, who took first place with his boat last season, will again be entered. Dr. A. O. Roenicke is expected to have a new ship ready by June 7. Inis Roberts and Nelson Reed too, will be back in the competition.

There will be a number of novelty stunts and surf board exhibitions. It is possible, too, a canoe race may be placed on the program.
