Forestry Force Studies Logging Permit Measure

SALEM, Ore., April 12, (UP)—How to prevent such a disastrous fire as that which reduced thousands of acres of timber in the Tillamook district last summer to a shambles of smoking, charred ruins will be discussed at a conference here April 16.

Lynn Cronmiller, state forester, called the meeting, which will be attended by all district wardens and supervisors in western Oregon; federal forest supervisors; representatives of the Portland regional forestry office and representatives from forest experiment stations.

Chief topic of the meeting will be administration of the logging permit act of the last legislature. "The logging act was one of the most far-reaching pieces of legislation ever passed in any state," Cronmiller said today. "It is superficially designed to reduce to the minimum destructive fires started and spread in many instances by logging operations."

Hitler Regime, Clergy Conflict

DANZIG, April 12, (UP)—Sharp conflict between the Hitlerite regime and Catholic clergy was evinced today and may jeopardize the conclusion of the concordat between the free city of Danzig and the Holy Sea.

The conflict resulted when Nazis complained that the clergy were still supporting the Central (Catholic) party and opposing the Hitlerite youth movement. The Hitlerite newspaper Vorposten, published a manifesto charging that the clergy were preparing a

rupture between the church and state similar to the church conflict during the Bismarck era in the last century.

Americans Still Missing in China

SHANGHAI, April 12, (UP)—A two day search with airplanes and boats tonight had failed to locate a missing China aviation corporation plane which carried three Americans and a Japanese possibly to their deaths in a stormy sea between Shanghai and Canton.

It was learned only today that the plane also carried Ivan Carlson of Conna, Texas, radio superintendent of the China Aviation corporation. Robert Gast, veteran flier of Louisville, Kentucky, was pilot and James Finck of Miami, Fla., was navigator. Ube Mura chartered the plane.
