National and Local Markets

BUTTER PRICE UNCHANGED ON PRODUCE MART
BUTTER PRICE—36 MKTS.—PORTLAND, April 13. (AP)—Butter market atmosphere is expected to clear up with a formal start of the storage movement here at the opening of the coming week. Prices were unchanged overnight on the open market. Butterfat was unchanged for the day. Trading tone for eggs was strengthening here with receipts decreasing in spots and demand to go into cooler, somewhat greater. Local market was still affected by undergrades. So limited were late receipts that the bulk of demand for hens was naturally firm with a tendency to creep higher. Turkey demand was fair. There was a real shortage of asparagus here although a slight increase of local offerings was suggested. Prices were firmer but generally rule at former heights. There was a further gain of strength and even of buying price for onions at the source with a southern demand and little unold stock at Oregon sources. Purchases were reported to 60c central net to grower. With record supplies of potatoes still being held in storage here and with decreasing demand owing to an increase in the call for new growth, the market was presenting an acute problem to all interests. Excellent hook and line catches of Willamette river salmon were reported with a liberal supply available for the market at 23c. This was the same price ruling for Northern Kings. Halibut market was firm at 17c for medium and 15c for chicken. Trade was well supplied with fresh crabs again. Sweet potatoes moving around \$1.50 per 40-lb. lug. Tomato market was active. Supplies of quality stuff were liberal at late prices. Dressed meats were steady all around and at late prices. Cabbage is firm for old crop. Greater demand for rhubarb and prices firmer.

LAST REPORTS COME FROM IDAHO

Eight hundred fifty-two carloads of potatoes were loaded Thursday. Twenty-three were from Oregon, 23 from Washington and 147 from Idaho. Maine shipped 200 cars. Today's is the last f. o. b. report on Idaho markets. At Idaho Falls demand showed some improvement. Trading was good and the market steady. No. 1 Russets ranged from 7 1/2 to 8 1/4 cents a hundred, sacked, with most of the sales on a basis of 80 cents a hundred in carloads f. o. b. cash track. The Yakima market was about steady. No. 1 Russets were quoted at \$15 to \$16 a ton in carloads f. o. b. cash track. At San Francisco the market was weak with prices unchanged. The terminal market at Chicago was about steady. Supplies of old potatoes were liberal but demand and trading were slow. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$1.60 to \$1.70 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outright.
