

FARMERS PLAN PREPARATIONS FOR PLANTING

Extensive preparations for the potato planting season are being carried on by all growers of the Klamath basin at the present time, according to C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent.

Dipping and grading of potato seed is getting under way, planting machinery is being prepared, and growers are putting the final touches on their land in order that all may be in readiness for the planting season which will swing into action about May 1.

Some growers have already started to plant, but these are the exception, and heavy planting will not be underway for about two weeks, Henderson stated. However, there will be more plantings than usual between now and the first of the month, according to early predictions.

In dipping seed spuds two standard methods are in general use, these are the corrosive sublimate and hot formaldehyde treatments.

In the corrosive sublimate method where testing equipment is not available, the following method is being used according to official directions.

Dissolve 4 oz. corrosive sublimate in 2 quarts of hot water. Add to 30 gallons of water. Do not use metal containers. Add corrosive sublimate to dipping solution as follows—leave potatoes in solution 1 1/2 hours.

1st batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

2nd batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

3rd batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

4th batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

5th batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

6th batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

7th batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

8th batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

9th batch add 1 oz. corrosive sublimate.

10th batch add none.

Throw out solution and start over. Solution is poisonous. Waste in hole where there is no drainage to domestic water supply. Be careful in handling corrosive sublimate. 1 lb. corrosive sublimate dips about 45 sacks potatoes.

Hot Formaldehyde.

Prepare solution by adding 1 quart of formaldehyde to 30 gallons of water. Maintain temperature of 126 degrees F. Leave potatoes in solution for 3 minutes.



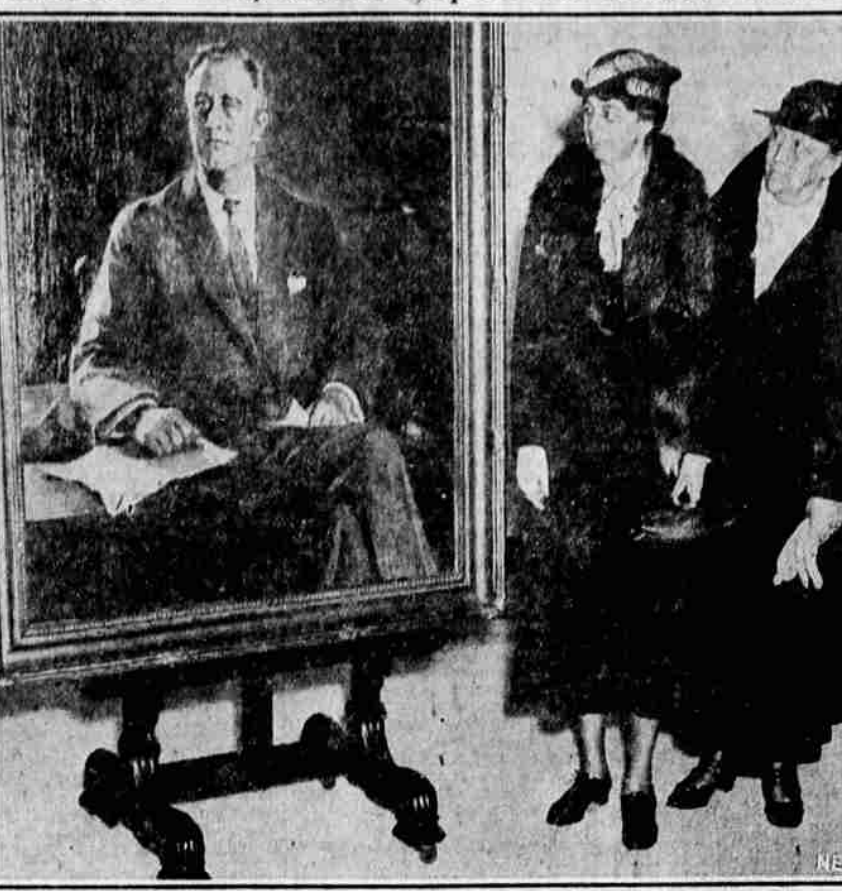

utes. Regular dipping machines are best, as it is difficult to maintain proper temperature with ordinary open kettles or other home-made heaters.

Keep solution up to volume by adding prepared solution made up at rate of 1 quart of formaldehyde per 30 gallons of water. With ordinary care 1 gallon of formaldehyde should dip about 200 sacks potatoes.

With either formula, potatoes should not be stored until they have had a chance to get reasonably dry. If put in bins loose, they should be spread out in a thin layer on top after each batch is completed.

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bids, Elzing explained to the board, but they would be required to submit their prices to each other, eliminating possibility of competitive bids, he added. He also stated these same companies are now selling to other states under the contract prices now in effect here.

Elzing declared he believed he could bring down the price if the board would authorize him to purchase gasoline outside the state and deliver it to the state highway department. This was ordered, and the purchasing department was requested to speed the action.

Governor Julius L. Meier declared he had been in communication for several weeks with Senator Charles McNary in an effort to reduce prices, and that he had promise of successful steps along a different line in cooperation with the federal government. He declared prices were much less in eastern cities. State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman, who has been in touch with the legal battle in the state of Washington on gasoline prices, said that based upon the complaint filed by the state of Washington, in which it stated \$24,000,000 was taken out of Oregon by the gasoline combine in excess of a reasonable profit, he estimated the gasoline companies were taking about \$15,000,000 out of Oregon.

P. J. Stadelman, secretary of state, approved the action of the board. He reported that gasoline prices in The Dalles and LaGrande were at least four cents less than in Portland or Salem.

State Education Budget Balanced

Dean. The remainder of the School of Fine Arts will be known as the School of Architecture and Allied Arts.

Four of the eight departments in the School of Engineering at Oregon State College were merged into two with C. A. Mackmore heading the department of civil engineering with which is combined that of highway engineering, and with S. H. Graf heading the department of mechanical engineering with which is combined

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the department of mechanicals and materials.

Unattached lower division and service work on each of the major campuses was combined for administrative purposes under a dean at each place, M. E. Smith at the College and O. F. Stafford at the University.

In recommending the approval of the budgets as finally balanced by the finance committee, E. C. Sammons, chairman of the committee, reported that only the foresight of the administration

and the board in holding some balances from the first half of the biennium to the second half prevented the budget being close to a half million dollars out of balance when submitted to the committee instead of \$43,000.

He paid a high tribute to the cooperation of the entire staff from the chancellor down, in carrying on the work of the institutions under the severe handicaps. He then warned the people of the state that the board is at the end of its financial rope and

that after the coming year there will be no possibility of maintaining even the present restricted higher educational program unless relief is provided.
