National and Local Markets

CHEESE TREND CONTINUES TO GO DOWNWARD

PORTLAND, April 16. (AP)—Downward trend of cheese value was continued during the week. In all leading domestic markets reduced price limits were shown. In general the market suggested a general trend toward the low values of the season with very liberal increases in manufacture of most points.

Increased consumptive demands was suggested in the survey with weather conditions generally favorable for this purpose. Make in the Pacific Northwest sector is gradually working toward the flush period.

With the new butter code in effect, the trade for the week's opening marked time. There appeared a generally steady tone with no changes in either butter or butterfat values.

More eggs are urgently needed by cash buyers as well as other interests with increasing call for storage needs as well as the decreasing supply available.

Demand for chickens remained good and especially so for hens, although there was a better call for medium and heavier than for light sorts even though the latter were moving as fast as they arrive.

Even though a small sale continued for dressed turkeys, the season for sale may be considered definitely over except for a small call here and there. Lack of quality was the main drawback.

There was a rather liberal supply of strawberries arriving from the south and the chief desire is to create a good movement with price second consideration.

First carload of new California potatoes has arrived for the season, but Texas stock was being pushed in an effort to clean up. Shaded prices have been the result.

First offerings of Florida celery was shown during the day with crates around \$4 while California stock of slightly smaller crates was quoted around \$3.15. Asparagus was down a notch or so in price. More coming.

Bananas were showing a fractional cut to move.

More lettuce and lower prices for the day.

Local cabbage was all but off the market. Californian steady. Green peppers were lower with a force movement.

California peas were better firm around \$4.50 sack for best. Tomatoes were considered about steady for Florida and Mexico.

GRAIN ENCOUNTERS SEVERE REVERSALS

CHICAGO, April 16. (AP)—Severe downturns of all grain prices today formed a vivid contrast with conditions a year ago, when quotations started upward on account of inflation talk.

General liquidation prevailed in grains today, and prices went downhill rapidly following announcement by Speaker Rainey that President Roosevelt was opposed to silver legislation at present. The direct opposite as to the course of prices was the case at this time last year, when one of the biggest bull movements in the history of the grain trade carried wheat up about 45 cents to \$1.25 1-5 a bushel.

Just before trading ended, all grains broke the fall limit allowed in any single day, or came within a fraction of the limit.

Wheat collapsed 5 cents, corn 4 cents and oats 3 cents a bushel. This was the first time in many weeks that the limit on one day's fluctuations in the grain markets have been effective.

Wheat closed excited, 4 1/4-4 1/2 cents a bushel under Saturday's finish, May 80-80 1/2, corn 4 1/4-4 1/2 down, oats 2 1/4-2 1/2 off, and provisions showing a setback of 5 to 15 cents.

OREGON LOADINGS 27 FOR WEEKEND

Nine hundred and seventy cars of potatoes were shipped in the United States over the week end. Oregon loaded 27 cars, Washington 25 and Idaho 222. Maine shipped 213 cars. Florida shipped 106 cars of new potatoes.

On the Chicago terminal market, supplies of old potatoes were liberal. Demand and trading were rather slow and the market barely steady. No. 1 Idaho Russets brought \$1.05 a hundred, sacked, truck sales carload weight. No. 2 Idaho Russets, the San Francisco market included the equivalent of 4 cars from Oregon. Supplies were light, demand and trading were slow and the market dull. There was but little change in prices, but very few sales were reported.

Shippers to jobbers at mostly \$1.15 a hundred, sacked.
