

PROTESTS MADE AGAINST MILK PLAN IN NORTH

Chambers of commerce, organized and independent dairymen, county agents and city officials throughout the state are uniting rapidly in a campaign of protest to Mayor Joseph K. Carson of Portland for the efforts now being made by that city in its effort to hinder and break down the fluid milk price stabilization program of the Oregon milk control board in Portland, according to Benj. H. Davies of the Dairy Cooperative association who was in the city Monday.

Protests calling attention to the improved financial condition of Oregon's \$350,000,000 dairy industry as a result of the work of the board and pointing to the fact that as the dairyman receives more for his produce all other industry in the state benefits, have poured into Carson's office since the united dairy and commercial interests of Oregon started the backfire of opposition four weeks ago. The same mails, declares Davies, have brought letters of praise and encouragement in large numbers to the office of E. G. Harlan, chairman of the milk control board, in Portland. Protesting dairymen and their business men supporters of the cities contend largely that cut-rate retail stores who, before the board came into being, used the dairyman's produce as a loss-leader to lure the purchaser-

consumer into the store to make additional purchases, are hiding behind the skirts of official Portland in their attacks on the milk board. The stabilization of prices following the board's creation has robbed them of this particular bait, it is asserted. Portland, with nearly 60,000 consumer families, uses about 60 per cent of the fluid milk produced in Oregon, it is pointed out.

PASTOR ACCEPTS SUMMER DUTIES

Rev. Leonard B. Sigle of the First Baptist church, has received word that Rev. R. E. Mrs. Sigle expects to pursue some special courses in music and subjects related to church leadership. On this trip they will visit the parents of Mr. Sigle who live in Oklahoma. Rev. Sigle will return to Klamath Falls in July and take up his work again as pastor of the First Baptist church and editor of the Pacific Coast Baptist.

LIKELY LUMBER FIRM WILL OPEN

LIKELY, Calif., April 16.—The Likely Lumber company of this place, operated by Harry and Keith Edgerton, will commence logging operations at their sawmill plant west of here about May 1, with a force of over 30 men.

The plant has been closed for the past two years, but Edgerton Bros. intend to manufacture at least three million feet of ponderosa pine lumber this season, cutting at the rate of one million feet per month. The firm will cut their own stumpage this season, but formerly operated on government land.

Crater Lodge to Open Up May 13

R. W. Price, manager of the Crater Lake National Park company, announced Monday that the lodge and cafeteria at the rim would be open to the public Sunday, May 13, the earliest opening in the history of the park.

Official opening of the park is scheduled June 2 and 3, the earliest official opening date on record.

Snow is melting rapidly in the park, with little left at government camp, and only four feet at the rim, according to Price. Two CCC camps have recently been moved into the park, one at Anna Springs and the other at Moss creek. The Anna Springs camp was the one formerly located at government camp which has now moved to the new location.

All park activities are getting off to a good start, according to Price, and a most successful season is anticipated.

MOVE UNDERWAY FOR BOY SCOUT ORGANIZATION

Complete reorganization of the Boy Scouts of America in this community has taken on definite proportions during the past two weeks. Under the leadership of interested individuals and groups, plans are in process which will bring the organization into full operation soon. No salaried officials are contemplated at present, but a full corps of volunteer leaders are being enlisted to carry forward the program.

A preliminary committee has been set up which has in charge the responsibility of getting the organization underway. Rev. T. Davis Preston is chairman of this committee. Rev. Fred Hornshuh of the Klamath Temple and Chaplain John B. Coan of the Methodist church are also members of the committee. It was through the efforts and leadership of Mr. Coan that the Crater Lake Council was originally organized about ten years ago. He served as its first Scout Commissioner when the Medford and Klamath program of scouting was instituted. He brings eighteen years of experience into the local organization.

Acting Executive Named

Two large troops have been enrolled since the first of April and are actively underway. They are under the sponsorship of the Community Congregational and the First Methodist churches. The Ministerial association at its meeting Monday gave hearty official support to the movement and indicated that the churches would be made sponsoring agents for the troops in order to insure permanency and leadership.

George M. Petersen, recently from Eugene, a trained and experienced Scout leader has been named acting executive for the community. He will serve in a non-salaried capacity. He came up from the scouting ranks as a boy and is experienced in all the official positions of the local organization. He is assisting in troop and committee organization. He is the new district representative of the Capital Insurance company of Denver.

Another recent arrival in the city with a long record of scout leadership and who is already actively participating in the program here is Murdith Parkin, a new radio specialist from Michigan. He is employed with the Service Electric company. Mr. Parkin is a trained and capable leader in scoutcraft. He will be placed in charge of a training school for scout masters and troop leaders. La Ley was the speaker in the First Methodist church Sunday evening and before the Laymen's Monday club at noon Monday. He received also much encouragement from the men of the latter group. He is looking for a suitable place where services can be held for his people.

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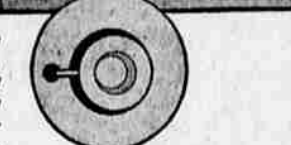
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
