National and Local Markets BUTTER MARKET SEES BULLISH TRADE TUESDAY

PORTLAND, April 17, (AP)—Advance in the price on most scores of butter during the late session of the produce exchange was not a surprise, inasmuch as it has been apparent for some days that the previous sharp declines in the quotations along the coast were entirely too heavy.

Increased consumption created bullish instead of bearish conditions in the trade, resulting in a daily clearing of farmers' floors here, while in California, where the main bearishness has been expressed, storage and fresh consumption demand caused the market to advance.

Egg Market Good
The advance in butterfat was a matter of record only, inasmuch as the trade in general had been paying on the basis of 17c for "A" grade, even though 18c was considered the basis of the code. This showed that irrespective of codes or other artificial means, supply and demand make the market.

Market for eggs continued of rather good character generally, with practically no price changes for the day. Storage demand was absorbing most of the quality offerings, with a call for more.

Market for poultry reflected a firm tone locally, with no change.
