

CHEVROLET HAS NEW MODEL FOR LOW PRICE CAR

Chevrolet today announced "the world's lowest price six-cylinder car" with the introduction of the new improved 1934 standard six models, supplementing the Master Chevrolet models previously presented.

Two closed and two open car models comprise the new improved standard line. They are the sport roadster, \$499; phaeton, \$529; coupe, \$510, and

two-door sedan, \$520. The new cars, says the Chevrolet Motor company's announcement, thus list under any other six on the market, and \$45 to \$95 under corresponding models of the Master Chevrolets.

The new cars are replete with major improvements designed to achieve better performance, riding qualities, comfort and appearance. Both chassis and body have been completely redesigned, in keeping with the latest advances in engineering and styling.

Roadability, and especially stability, have been enhanced through the adoption of a wider chassis frame and more widely spaced leaf springs front and rear, in conjunction with a longer front axle and increased tread of the front wheels. These chassis improvements have permitted the use of big, roomy bodies having maximum width and ample leg room.

In the power plant, smooth-

ness, economy and flexibility have been improved through a thorough revision of the inlet and exhaust systems, with higher compression, and a refined valve and tappet mechanism, including a redesigned camshaft.

The new models share with the Master series such appearance features as sleek, flowing lines, deep fenders hugging the tires, long hood with horizontal louvers, and steeply inclined radiator grille. Numerous interior refinements similarly enhance the style and finish of the passenger compartments.

Smartly Styled

The exterior has been generally redesigned to add to style and utility. Deep front fenders, extending far over the tires, conceal unsightly chassis parts, with only a shallow "valley" remaining between fenders and hood. Front fenders are formed to extend to the center of the car under the radiator, eliminating the separate radiator splash guard. Fender skirts have been given sharp, graceful contours, making them appear to fit closely to the tires. Edges of the fenders have been turned in flanges, for extra stiffness.

The re-styled front-end ensemble includes new designs for the hood and radiator grille. The hood is unusually long, and has three horizontal louvers. Front fenders, radiator and head lamps are supported as a unit on a stabilized mounting of improved design, insulated from the frame by a single centrally located rubber cushion. Running boards blend smoothly into the fenders, and are finished with a long rubber mat, extending farther toward the rear.

A most pleasing appearance has been gained in the instrument panel. It is wide at the center, the lower edge sweeping upward toward the ends in a graceful curve. The instrument group is enclosed in an embossed elliptical bezel, flanked by depressed panels. The steering wheel is 17 inches in diameter.

Closed car models are equipped with Fisher no-draft ventilation, and with a reversed cow ventilation, opening toward the rear, similar to the arrangement of the Master models.

Among the special structural features of the newly styled closed bodies are increased strength resulting from a new design of cow braces and the bolted roof rail structure; and numerous improvements in the doors, which are equipped with an adjustable diagonal brace, shorter and sturdier hinges, improved door-latch and striker plates, and new half-round lock bolts. Other improvements have been effected in the windshield sealing, the door locks, and the stream-lined outside door handles. The closed cars are wired for radio.

Over 300 Future Farmers of America, from all corners of the state will gather at the Oregon State college, Corvallis, April 26 to 28 for their sixth annual three-day convention, according to Earl R. Cooley, state supervisor of agricultural education. A delegation of farm boys from Henry, Bonanza, Malin and Merrill will attend this meeting. The principal feature of the convention will be the visit of the national chief of the Future Farmers of America, Bobby Jones, 17, of Radnor, Ohio. He heads a group of 80,000 young farm boys enrolled in Smith-Hughes agriculture courses in 2,500 high schools. Bobby is making a tour of the Hawaiian Islands and three western states in the interest of F. F. A. work.

While at the convention the Future Farmers will transact their annual business meeting, select 15 outstanding boys in the state for the degree of State Farmer, and honor the F. F. A. Keystone chapters. The four winners in the district public speaking contest will compete for state honors. The college students are sponsoring a statewide agricultural leaders banquet in honor of the Future Farmers of America. Agricultural leaders from all agricultural organizations in the state have been invited to attend. G. W. Peavy, president of the Oregon State college, will be the principal speaker.

On the last day of the convention individual and team demonstration contests will be featured. Future Farmers will compete in various contests such as grafting, budding, egg grading, dairy cow evaluation, form accounting, grain judging, and weed identification. Future Farmer demonstration teams will compete in contests such as seed corn selection, potato grading, saw filing, electric wiring, tool sharpening, and various other types of contests. Radio broadcasts and athletic events of various kinds will play an important part in the three-day program.

CITY COUNCIL ALLOWS HEALTH OFFICER CLAIM

Dr. A. A. Soule, city health officer, was allowed his claim for 15 months salary at the rate of \$62.50 a month when the city council met in regular adjourned session Tuesday morning. The motion granting Soule's claims was made by Councilman Thomas and seconded by J. D. Van Camp.

The amount of the salary was the minimum set by a city ordinance determining the health officer's remuneration, providing no stipulated amount is decided upon at the time the officer is appointed, according to a ruling by City Attorney A. L. Leavitt.

Soule was retained by the council at a future salary of \$50 a month, until such time as a new ordinance is drawn up allowing for payment of the health officer upon a fee basis. The city will pay the health officer's claims to Jennie Lang, of Dorris, to whom he made an assignment.

Soule's expense accounts presented to the council along with his salary claims were disallowed.

The city treasurer and police judge were authorized by the council to borrow the sum of \$15,000 from the general fund to be credited to the street, fire and light and water funds as follows: Street fund, \$3,400; fire fund, \$2,000; light and water fund, \$9,600.

The city treasurer will now be able to call all outstanding bonded warrants in these three funds up to and including April 1, 1934, thus stopping the 6 per cent interest being drawn on the warrants from time of protest. The general fund will be left with a cash balance adequate to carry it through the year, according to the city treasurer.

The council voted to assume the required assessment for compensation insurance for all workers hired on SERA projects allowed to the city.

It was voted in addition to allow compensation at once to all workers hired in the field and clerical service in the Moore park and city cemetery projects. The necessary amount for this purpose will be drawn from the incidental fund of the city.

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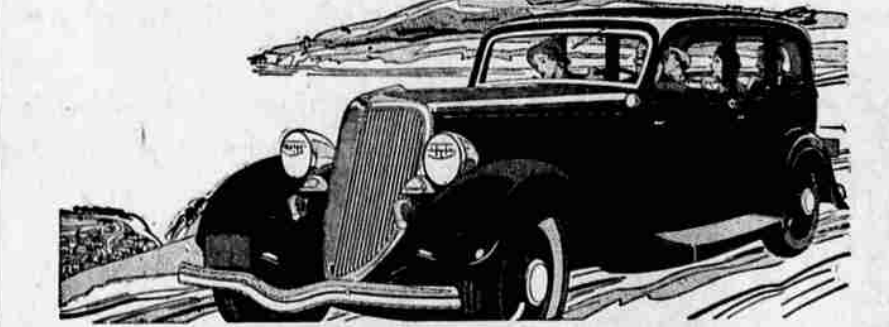
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
