

### MAN INSTANTLY KILLED THURSDAY

A truck heavily loaded with baled hay brought instant death to Kessie Hall about 30, shortly after 6 o'clock last night when he slipped in attempting to jump from the slow moving vehicle and fell under the rear wheels. He received a crushed skull.

The accident occurred at the corner of Market street and Oak street. Preston Feris of Stewart addition, driver of the truck from which Hall jumped, was exonerated of blame.

Hall, riding between the truck cab and the load of hay with his brother-in-law, Oscar McWilliams, became excited when the load of hay shifted forward as brakes were applied at the street intersection. Fearing the hay would tumble down and hit him against the cab, he jumped, according to McWilliams.

A small child of Feris' and John Fink, also of Stewart addition were riding in the front seat. Feris said he did not know that Hall had jumped from the truck until McWilliams notified him.

Hall is a resident of Stewart addition and is survived by his wife and three children.

Hall and McWilliams had gone out to work with the hay baling crew at the Gooding farm at Pine Grove. They had caught a ride back into town with Feris.

Dr. George Adler, county coroner, was called to the scene and declared the death accidental.
