National and Local Markets

EGG SUPPLIES DECREASING ON PORTLAND MARKET

PORTLAND, April 20, (AP)—Strength was continued in the market for butter with a general cleanup of dealers' floor stock suggested locally. All along the coast steady to firmer and even higher prices were ruling for butter. In California the weather has continued against production, while in the Pacific Northwest conditions are ideal.

San Francisco market has continued the strongest of the coast trade recently, as a result of lack of normal offerings.

Butterfat was held at the late advance here.

Market for eggs continued of rather good character with decreasing supplies and a demand in excess of offerings of quality goods. No change was suggested in the price for the day.

Chicken Demand Good

Demand for chickens was holding well, and prices were generally upheld for the day. Broilers alone indicated some easiness, and this was reflected mostly in small stuff.

Better quality and excellent weather were combinations that tend to uphold the price on good strawberries here for the day, even with liberal offerings. Little local stock was arriving.

Two carloads of asparagus were being loaded at mid-Columbia points today for shipment to Chicago. Sales was reported at \$2.25 pruned f.o.b. cars, while the local market was as low as \$1.75. From one to more points.

Market for country killed meats was without general change for the day. Good lambs were selling well at the recently lower price and quantity vealers were steady.

Regular offerings of green peas from The Dalles was due in Portland during the coming week, with suggestion of quick following by some of the Columbia slough growers. California stock was held firm at the moment.

New potatoes were weak for Texan and Florida. Steady for California Garnets.

Green beans were generally weaker and lower, down to \$2.00 for hampers.

PRICE OF WHEAT SHOWS ADVANCES

CHICAGO, April 20, (AP)—With a conference scheduled for tomorrow between President Roosevelt and senate advocates of silver legislation, wheat prices showed advances during late transactions today.

Renewed reports were current among grain traders that the congressional enactment of silver measures would result. The bills proposed were generally regarded as of an inflationary character.

Wheat closed unsettled, 1/4c higher compared with yesterday's finish. May 75 1/2c, corn 1 1/2c advance, oats 1 1/4c up, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to a rise of 12 cents.

OLD SPUD MARKET SUPPLY IS LIGHT

Seven hundred and sixty-eight carloads of potatoes were loaded yesterday. Oregon supplied 18, Washington 21 and Idaho 163. Maine shipped 236 cars. At San Francisco supplies of the old potatoes were light and the old tubers at \$1.00 to \$1.10 a hundred, sacked.

The Chicago market was about steady on old potatoes, with demand and trading rather slow. No. 1 Idaho Russets were quoted at \$1.50 to \$1.55 a hundred, sacked, track sales carlots outweight.

Portland Livestock
