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Virginia Calls for Tourists

FOR easterners to send tourist appeals to Oregon is something like "carrying coals to Newcastle." If Oregon travelers set out to know Oregon thoroughly they would (with a few exceptions) have plenty to occupy their spare time for several years. Yet Oregonians should be very much interested in the maps and pamphlets which are now being distributed here by the Virginia state commission on conservation and development. And it might even pay Oregon to have a few people study the Virginia setup at first hand.

Virginia is emphasizing not only scenic but historic appeals. With an excellent road map of Virginia highways, comes another folder which offers a key to the historic places which may be seen in Virginia. Virginia has worked out an elaborate system of historic markers. Virginia not only tells the tourist where to go but what to notice when he gets there.

The Virginia method calls attention to some important omissions in our Oregon plan. We have excellent highways and excellent road maps and bureaus for road information. We are doing a great deal to advertise our most spectacular scenic attractions. But we are doing very little to advertise their historic connections.

The settlement of Oregon was one of the great epics in American history. From the time of the first fur traders to the present Oregon has been the scene of much interesting history. True, the battles which have been fought in Oregon do not rank with the great battles which have been fought in Virginia. Oregon is still too young to have produced as many famous men as Virginia. Yet Oregon has not made as much as could be made of history which is even more filled with human interest than the history of Virginia.

Of those who drive the great highways of Central and Eastern Oregon, only a few are aware of the historic episodes of conquest and exploration. Except at Champoug and Oregon City, there has been little effort to commemorate the pioneers who took part in the events which transformed Oregon from a province of the Hudson's Bay Company into a state of the American union. Few of those who roam the marvelous new Coast highway are aware that it is rich in historic tales and legends.

At nearly every turn in Oregon, the journey of the traveler could be made more interesting by historical markers. Except for a few tablets placed by the D. A. R., little has been done. The Virginia plan is worth study and emulation.

The Inside Story From The Capital

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WASHINGTON, April 20.—The White House had its fingers crossed when it announced that it would take no part in the democratic congressional primaries.

What it meant was—openly. Louis Howe already has been designated privately to handle the primaries for the administration. He will be unable to take his scheduled vacation now for that reason.

Also, Mr. Farley's right hand man, Emil Hurja, has departed at last for the PWA (much to the relief of Interior Secretary Ickes), and is now installed in the democratic national committee, although no announcement of the switch has yet been made. Hurja specialized in the congressional end of the 1932 election for Mr. Farley. He knows every vote in every congressional district since the Civil war.

HELP

The president himself is not as shy on the subject as the announcements indicate. What happened at the White House during the recent visit of Texas boosters shows that.

Among the callers were Senator Tom Connally and his primary opponent, Representative Joe Bailey. One of the leading issues between them is their respective loyalty to the new deal. Bailey has strongly questioned Connally's record in that respect.

In front of a whole crowd from Texas, President Roosevelt reached out and shook Connally's hand warmly. The president even threw an arm over Connally's shoulder.

When it came Bailey's turn to shake hands, the witnesses observed that the same enthusiasm was lacking.

The Texas raised their eyebrows and looked at each other. Soon that story will be all over Texas, and yet no one ever will be able to accuse the White House of mixing in the Texas primary.

SIGNIFICANCE

There is more than that behind the Connally story. The truth seems to be that Mr. Connally boosted his stock 100 per cent at the White House when he voted to sustain the president's veto on veterans' allowances. The president feels very kindly toward those who stuck by him.

Mr. Connally is a veteran's man and always has been one. He is a Spanish-American war veteran, himself. His conversion was an outstanding event. The way he was treated was full notice to all democratic congressmen that the White House has a record of the veterans' veto vote, and, while the president is officially taking no part in the primaries, he can and will find ways to help his friends.

ALIBI

The Connally incident was so noticeable that Joe Bailey is supposed to have gone to the president and said he would withdraw if the administration was supporting Connally. He announced later he was not withdrawing, so he must have been assured that the White House is not supporting anyone.

However, Mr. Roosevelt has been in politics too long not to have realized the implications which would be drawn from his demeanor.

WISDOM

Appropos of the alternating pressure now being exerted on the president by conservatives and liberals, a high official of the White House tells this old fable.

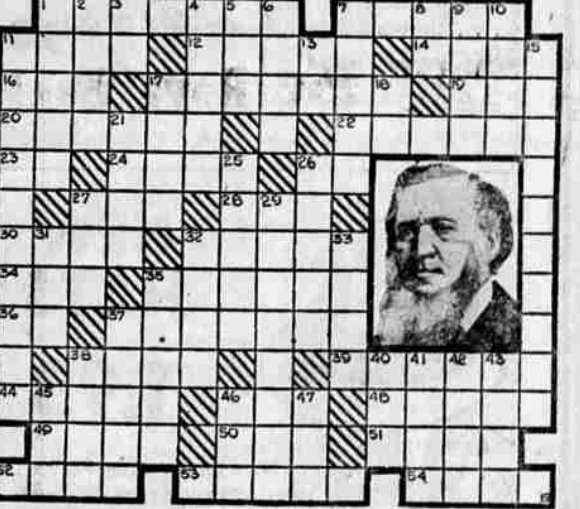
