Restoration of Colonial Buildings Topic Of D. A. R. Evening

The restoration and rehabilitation of old Colonial homes and buildings in Virginia proved an engrossing subject Monday evening, when Don Fisher of the Klamath Union High school faculty addressed the members of Eulalia chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, at the home of Mrs. Burge Mason.

Mrs. Rachel A. Good was chairman in charge of the program hour, and Mrs. Robert Sloan acted as assisting hostess.

Fisher told of the work of restoring Colonial homes in Yorktown, Va., a project for which John D. Rockefeller has already contributed \$1,000,000, and will donate a like sum for the continuation of the work in the future.

Yorktown will be made a national shrine as have Williamsburg and Fredricksburg, where like restorations have been made.

Fisher told of visits to Wakefield, the birthplace of Washington; to Mt. Vernon; Monticello, the home of Jefferson and to Stratford, the home of the Lee family.

All of these historic landmarks are being maintained as shrines by public and private funds.

The speaker told of the simple and interesting system of marking spots of historic interest in the southern state.

WASHINGTON, April 21, (AP)—President Roosevelt and senate silver advocates canvassed the monetary question at a White House conference today but further conferences will be required to reach a final decision on new legislation to aid the metal.

The silver advocates left the White House smiling and apparently in a good mood, but they offered no comment.

Stephen T. Early, a secretary to the President, announced: "There was a thorough discussion of the whole world monetary question, including both gold and silver. There will be further conferences."
