DODGERS DOWN PHILLIES, 5-0

Surprising Flatbush Team Early Season Sensation of Loop.

When Casey Stengel, new manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, admitted this spring he intended to build for the future, the boys from Flatbush figured that was just one way of admitting the Dodgers had little to hope for in 1934. Early performances at Ebbets Field, however, look as if someone already had done a little building with the current season in mind.

Leonard Star Hurler

Emil Leonard, a knuckleball hurler who came up from York, Pa., late last season, and Len Koenecke, known as the "\$75,000 bust" when he failed to make good with the Glens a few years ago, got into the lineup almost by accident. But they did enough in one game Friday to justify their being kept around a while.

Leonard, named as a starting pitcher because Ray Egan failed to round into condition soon enough, shut out the Phillies with six hits to win his first start 5 to 0, gave only one walk and contributed a double to his own victory. Koenecke, posted in center field when Danny Taylor was injured rapped Ed Holley and Ted Kleinhaus for two homers and a pair of singles that accounted for four Dodger runs.

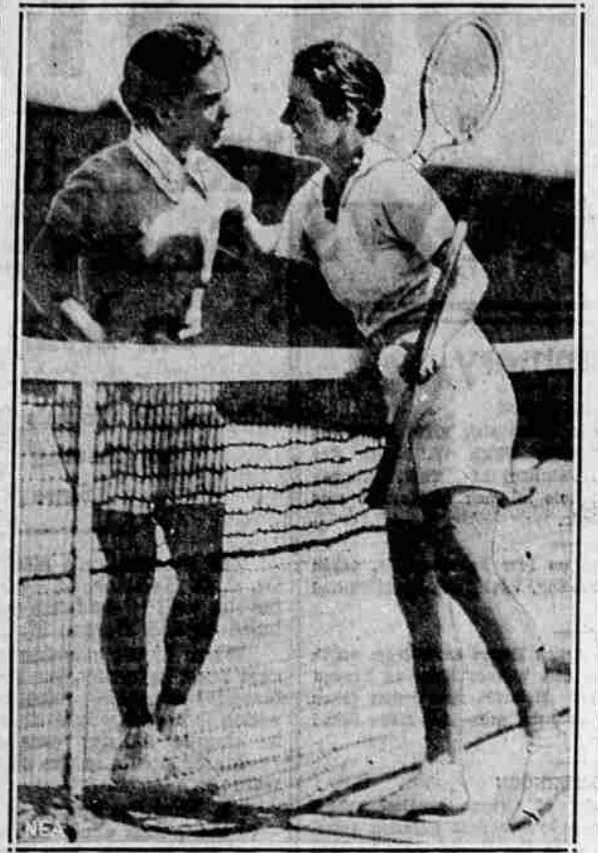
Giants Win Again

The New York Giants continued their unbroken string of triumphs in the only other National league game which survived Friday's chilly weather. Scoring in two big innings on a combination of hard and "heady" hitting, they trimmed the Braves 7 to 3 for their fourth straight victory. A homer by Mel Ott started them off on a three-run burst in the second, then after the Braves tied the count the count with the aid of a four-bagger by Marty McManus, they crossed up Pitcher Ben Cantwell with a couple of bunts and staged a four-run rally that won the game in the sixth.

Cleveland furnished the feature of the two-game American league program with a mound duel between Carl Fischer and Lloyd Brown which wound up abruptly in the eighth scoreless inning. After eight scoreless innings and Marvin Owen promptly unloaded them with a double, took third on the throw to the plate and squeezed home on Fischer's sacrifice. The Tiger southpaw granted only five hits.

Washington's mound staff again failed and the Athletics slugged out a 9 to 6 decision for the Senators' third straight defeat. The A's wound up with 15 hits against four fingers, plenty to win even though Washington collected 12.

INDIANS RISE FROM CELLAR

Victory Over Hollywood Boosts Seattle's Position.

The Seattle Indians were out of the cellar in the Pacific coast league today after winning their second straight game under their new manager, Walter (Dutch) Reuther. Fast games were the rule yesterday with every contest completed in less than two hours.

Herman Pillette, pitching his second shutout this season, held the Hollywood Stars to 5 scattered hits, all singles, as Seattle won, 5 to 0. Played in just one hour and 22 minutes, the encounter was the fastest on Friday's schedule, and the fastest so far this season in the coast league.

Reds Down Ducks

Los Angeles reached two Oakland pitchers for 14 hits to win, 6 to 4. The Oaks bunched four hits to score three runs and come within one tally of tying the score in the eighth inning. Catcher Gil Campbell of the Angels hit a home run. It was the fourteenth victory out of 15 starts for the Angels.

Led by Clarence Mitchell, veteran spitballer, the San Francisco Missions defeated Portland, 8 to 4, to remain in second place, three games behind Los Angeles. Mitchell set Portland down with 7 hits while his team mates found three Portland hurlers for 10 hits, including a home run by outfielder Tom Hafey.

The San Francisco Seals rose to third through their 8 to 2 victory over the Sacramento Senators Friday night. Sam Gibson allowed the Senators 7 well distributed singles. The Seals collected 12 off two Sacramento pitchers. Completed in an hour and 37 minutes, the game ranked next to the Seattle-Hollywood contest in speed.

MORE TEAMS ENTER MEET

Modoc Field Event Lists Nine Schools From Two States.

The entry list in the third annual Southern Oregon-Northern California track and field meet was increased Saturday by the announcement of six more competing teams.

Sam Ritchey, chairman of the 20-30 club track committee, now has a sheet of nine entry lists as the total thus far. Each day until the deadline for the May 12 event is expected to see applications for more teams in the two states.

Strong Teams Enter

The six most recent additions are Bend, Grants Pass, Fort Klamath, Chiloquin, Malin, Tulelake, Calif., and Gold Hill.

Lakeview and Butte Valley of Dorris were the first two to enter.

The list, virtually is ten, for the Klamath high school Pelicans undoubtedly will enter to defend the title won in 1932 and 1933.

Newman tossed Dern out of the ring and then, as Dern was climbing back through the ropes, kicked him in the stomach, knocking him unconscious. Kent called it a foul and awarded Dern the decision.

Newman, angered by the decision, socked Kent a couple of times so Kent threw him over the ropes on his head, knocking him unconscious also.

KRUSE BEATEN BY KANSAS MAN

Billy Edwards Captures Main Event Mat Bout Friday

Aggressive Billy Edwards, the butcherboy from Kansas City, defeated Bob Kruse, Oswego, in the main event wrestling match at the Legion hall last night.

The main event and its two preliminaries were witnessed by the Manning trial jury and a fair sized audience.

Edwards, kneeling and punching, took the lead with the first fall in 14 minutes and 45 seconds. It came with a series of headlocks that left Kruse groggy. The Oswego athlete was too weary from the fall to leave the ring for the rest period.

The match was squared when Kruse took the second fall in a brief 4 minutes and 47 seconds with a hammerlock. Edwards protested for a time against Referee Ray Frisbie, alleging that he had not conceded the fall.

Once more Edwards' headlocks brought him victory. He used this favorite weapon to take the third and deciding fall.

Don Wagner, the former Oregon State football player, drew with John Freeberg of Sweden in the 30 minute semi-windup. The lanky collegian held the upper hand but was unable to take a fall.

Paul Murdock of Oklahoma won the curtain-raiser by taking the single fall with a flying tackle in 21 minutes and 55 seconds. It was the outstanding match on Mack Lillard's program.

Both Murdock and his opponent, Walter Srols, wrestled cleanly and scientifically. There was not a single foul, hold or blow.

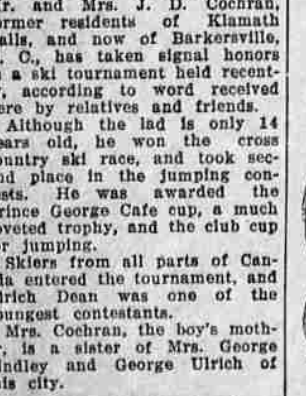

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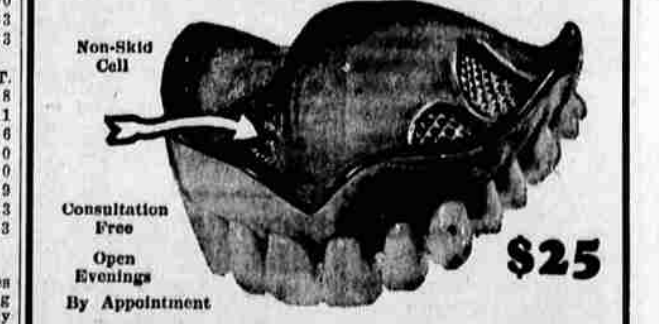
