KLAMATH MARCHES IN SALEM PARADE

SALEM, April 21. (AP)—A convention parade, headed by Colonel Carl Abrams as marshal, opened today's program of the State Christian Endeavor convention here.

The parade started at 11 o'clock from the Willamette university gymnasium and continuing through the downtown streets with the following delegations marching in order: Tillamook, Grande Ronde, Myrtle, Klamath-Lake, Yamhill, Mt. Hood, Polk, Douglas, Willwood, Lane, Central, Clackamas, Columbia, Crater Lake, Portland, Washington, Willamette and Marion. The parade ended at the state capitol grounds where the marchers assembled for a group picture.

The annual young people's oratorical contest, with Miss Rosa Bates presiding, will feature the afternoon's program. Later in the day denominational meetings will be held followed by three departmentalized banquets at 5:30. Dr. Dan A. Pollock, president of the International Society of Christian Endeavor, was scheduled to arrive here early this afternoon from New York. He will deliver his first address tonight on "Comrades of the Cross," and will speak twice more during the Sunday sessions.

Anyone desiring to enter commercial flower displays, garden furniture, implements or ornaments is cordially invited to do so, according to the committees in charge.

Committees will arrange any flowers for purely display purposes, but those who wish to display blooms for artistic arrangement must arrange their own exhibits.

Prices have been announced as follows: for tulips, three to six blooms for quality, cash prize of \$2.00; artistic exhibit of tulips in any number, \$2.00; three prizes of \$2.00 each for the three outstanding entries of artistic merit, this class embraces any combination of flowers, or arrangements of any kind of flowers; a reward of merit for sweepstakes exhibit will be a ribbon.

Chiloquin won the cup the first year that it was offered by Mr. Hall. To hold it permanently a school must win it three consecutive times.

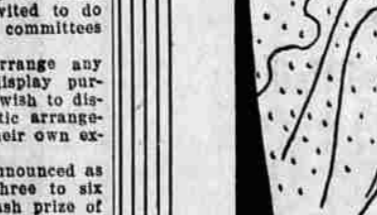

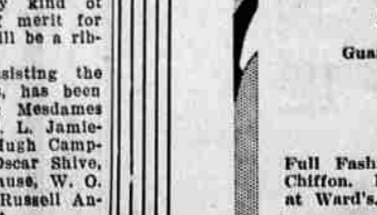

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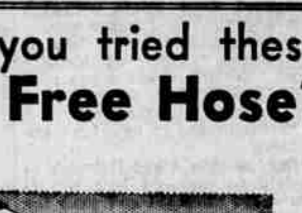
