National and Local Markets

BUTTER SUPPLY RUNNING SHORT IN NORTHWEST

PORTLAND, April 21. (AP)—Further advance of 1c lb. with the exception of firsts which rose 3/4c lb. during the week-end session of the produce exchange, reflected increasing strength through the trade with resulting shortage of output.

Decreasing make at California points was taking out practically every pound of surplus that can be spread in the Pacific northwest sector. In the home territory production continued to gain generally but dealers' floors were cleaned before night and orders were not completely filled.

The fact that all grades advanced in price is a reflection of the fact that the action of the state in putting its new grades into effect, has curtailed demand for the lowest grade which has previously been considered top grade by the unthinking buyers.

Egg Market Same.

Butterfat buying price advanced 1c pound along with butter.

Market for eggs was holding much the same as during the last few days. Little change in either buying or selling prices has been shown during the week. The demand for storage remained favorable.

Chicken prices were well held locally with shortage of market lines continued here and along the coast. Demand from the south was not being filled here as account of the short supply.

Indicating a somewhat better situation was the announcement of Swift & Co. of an advance of 1/4c lb. in the selling price on Cattle, which was reported as both triplets and loaf. Oregon Swine demand was reported above supply.

First Strawberries Show.

At the week-end there was a well held price in strawberries locally. California generally continued around \$1.25 crate for 24 while Oregon was \$2 for the best. Quality better all around.

Higher prices have been forced on asparagus as a result of the lial carload demand from the east which mid-Columbia shippers are making a desperate effort to fill.

First arrival of new white potatoes of the season was reported in from Shafter, Calif., somewhat earlier than usual.

The first of the 1934 crop of immediate Portland grown strawberries were offered during the week-end session of the East Side farmers' wholesale market. Initial supply of gold dollars was brought in from Milwaukee and were of extremely good quality, initially priced at \$2 crate for 24. California berries were firmer but again sold at \$1.25 crate.
