

JAPS AWAIT U. S. POLICY IN FAR EAST

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essential feature of the statement in which the world was warned not to meddle with internal Chinese affairs.

Such a retraction, it was believed, would be likely to evoke a storm of protests within Japan.

It was learned that the instructions sent by Sir John Simon, British foreign secretary, were received in the British embassy this morning, but by late afternoon the ambassador had not yet visited the foreign office. The cabinet today discussed the China policy, the ministers asking Hirota to explain to them the world-wide hostile reaction to the April 17 statement.

LONDON, April 24 (AP)—Ambassador Robert W. Bingham of the United States conferred tonight with the Chinese minister to London in regard to Japan's new declaration of policy in the far east.

The interview with Bingham was requested by the Chinese diplomat and it was stated in American quarters that Bingham's activity was simply that of a listener.

Furthermore, the ambassador had nothing to say for publication following the conference.

It was indicated that the Chinese minister desired to explain the Chinese viewpoint already expressed by officials of the Nanking government.

American quarters stressed that no proposals are being made on behalf of the American government and that there have been no communications received here from Washington of that nature.

GENEVA, April 24 (AP)—League of Nations circles were dazed today by Japan's warning to the world that she will oppose foreign aid to China "under whatever guise" which she deems may disturb the peace in eastern Asia.

The warning, issued yesterday in a prepared statement by the Tokyo government through Consul General Yuchiro Yokoyama, was regarded as far from reassuring in the present situation in the far east.

League representatives say Japan is reaching out to the Asiatic peoples and seeking to incite in them Japanese ideas and leadership.

Japan was pictured here as defying the League of Nations in the league's home where she was publicly criticized for her aggression in the Manchurian campaign.

The doctrine of "Asia for Asiatics" under the leadership of Japan, acting in close collaboration with other Asiatic powers" was unannounced in the statement and Yokoyama gave the impression here that Japan is sure of herself in carrying out that doctrine.

Bank of Boston. He is a descendant of Thomas Jefferson, and a Harvard graduate in the class of 1915.
