

# American Seeks Davis Cup

United States Team Confident of Winning Famous Trophy. Change in Policy May Influence Team. Albia Will be Eliminated.

There won't be any prostrate players of American Davis Cup teams found on the courts of Wimbledon when the Yankees finish their grind for the classic in July. Neither will there be loud yammering alibis blaring at over-training, dissension in the ranks, and inability on clay courts.

The reason, gentle reader, will be that the Yankees will win the Davis Cup and there won't be anything to holler about.

You'll probably recall "Elly" Vines' collapse in his singles match with Fred Perry, English star, at St. Paul, Tenn. The climax of the defeat of the American stars, the only bright spot of which was George Lott and Johnny Van Ryn coming through in the doubles.

Albia was immediately forthcoming from Bernson S. Prentice, and the boys themselves. A storm of protest arose over the method of pre-cup training, and Walter Merrill Hall, new president of the U. S. Lawn Tennis association, had to come out with a statement that the tennis fathers were entirely satisfied with the conduct of the players and that there would be no change in policy.

It can be pointed out here that there was a change in policy—one which will have a great influence on our cup team.

This was the selection of R. Norris Williams as captain of the 1934 squad, and the release of Prentice from that post.

Under Williams there will be no dissension or over-training. He is a former Davis Cup player himself, and once ranked as ruler of the netters.

He has inaugurated a series of spring workouts, scheduled to start early next month, and these are intended to get the players in shape and to judge their merits. His methods are altogether different from those of Prentice, who had none of Williams' experience.

Five players have been selected for this season—and their selection reflects the good judgment of Williams. These stars are Frank Shields, Les Stofen, George Lott, Sidney Wood, and Wilmer Allison. Johnny Van Ryn was invited to take part, but he announced that business interfered.

It is possible that Cliff Suter, ranking No. 4 player in the United States, also may be included in this list, for, a short time ago, the New Orleans comet revealed that the tennis body would threaten to secede if Wood were selected for cup play instead of himself.

To avoid squabbles, Williams will no doubt take this matter into consideration.

The question of clay courts will provoke no alibis this year—because the cup matches won't be played on clay. Wimbledon's fields are grass, and it is on this type of court that the Americans, especially Shields and Stofen, excel.

Fred Perry and Bunny Austin, England's mainstays, on the other hand, are more at home on the clay, and no less an authority than Jean Borotra has remarked that this fact will handicap the Brits and leave an opening for the Yankees to gallop through to victory.

At present, Shields and Stofen appear to be Uncle Sam's best bets in the singles matches. Both play terrific service games, and are strong forehand attackers.

Both, on the other hand, are weak on their backhands—and it is on this type of play that the Americans, especially Shields and Stofen, excel.

Les, the only green player on the team, has all the makings of one of the mightiest racket wielders ever turned out in this country, and he and Shields may succeed in seeking Perry and Austin where Vines and Allison failed last year.

The doubles combination will be taken care of by Lott, than whom there is none whomever in doubles circles, and either Allison, Wood, or Suter. Of course, if the series is a tight affair, there is a possibility that Stofen, who won the national doubles with Lott last year, will serve double duty, and in addition to hectic singles sessions against Perry and Austin, serve on the duo with the cleft-chinned guy from Chicago.

If, through some unforeseen circumstance, all this is voided by the slim possibility that the U. S. squad doesn't reach the finals—then skip it!

It took just six games for Chuck Klein, the Cubs' \$125,000 outfielder, to inject a new spirit into the Chicago club and prove that he's going to pay big dividends with his mighty mace.

The Cubs came home leading the National League after five straight victories on the road—an unprecedented feat for a club that hitherto was woefully weak away from home.

Brilliantly pitched games marked the Cubs' whirlwind start, but the real story behind the team's early success is best told by the pitchers themselves.

Guy Bush, the swarthy south-oar with the long black sideburns, sums up the Cubs' phenomenal start as follows:

"That man Klein makes all the difference in the world in this ball club. Last year a pitcher had to bear down on every ball he pitched because he knew if the other club got a two or three run lead he was beat. We had nobody with punch who might break up a ball game any time he came to bat.

"Say, now with Klein around a pitcher can ease up a bit, and if he's behind he doesn't have to give up hope because Chuck is apt to belt one and break up the ball game."

WASHINGTON, April 25. (AP)—Benefit payments for reduction of wheat acreage in three Pacific northwest states of Washington, Oregon and Idaho totaled \$5,000,341.33 from the date of organization of the AAA to March 31, 1934, a report from the agricultural department showed today.

Washington's portion of the total was \$2,916,921.24, Idaho's was \$2,284,524.82 and Oregon's \$1,789,895.27.

### Hurlers Fail for Senators

Washington Takes Another Beating From Rising Red Sox.

Among the numerous perplexing problems which have arisen to plague major league managers is the big one which faces Washington's Joe Cronin—what's wrong with the Senators' pitching?

Last season it was largely the hurling of the senatorial "Big Four," Alvin Crowder, Earl Whitehill, Monte Weaver and Walter Stewart, which carried the Nats to the American league championship. So far this season, ten different Senators pitchers have made a total of 23 appearances in eight games and the standing of the clubs shows Washington in seventh place with three victories and five defeats. Only one, Al Thomas, has remained on the job for nine innings.

Red Sox Victors.

Stewart made his second unsuccessful start of the season Tuesday as the Senators opened their home season and took a 5 to 9 trouncing from the Red Sox. With 25,000 fans, including President Roosevelt, looking on, the slender southpaw pitched four shutout innings. Then a rainstorm held up the game for an hour and when it was resumed Manager Cronin decided to turn the hill over to Jack Russell.

The Sox belted him out in one inning, scoring three runs, and eluded Crowder for two more before Bob Burke finished up. Johnny Welch, meanwhile, limited the champions to five hits.

Tigers Keep Pace.

While Oral Hildebrand hurled four-hit ball, the Cleveland Indians clouted four St. Louis flingers for 19 hits, including a pair of homers by Hal Trosky, and won 15 to 2. Detroit's Tigers subdued the White Sox 7 to 3 in another slugfest.

Forty thousand fans turned out to see Charley Ruffing of the New York Yankees and John Marcum of the Philadelphia Athletics hook up in a great pitching duel which Ruffing won when Frank Crosetti belted a four-run homer in the sixth for the only run of the game. Each twirler allowed only four hits.

The Chicago Cubs won their sixth straight National league victory, a 3-2 decision from the Cincinnati Reds, scoring all their runs off Darryl Vance in the first inning. Right on the Cubs' heels came the world champion Giants with an 11-7 triumph over the Phillies, gained largely by a pair of home runs apiece by Pitches Hal Schumacher and Mel Ott. A homer by Freddy Lindstrom with two on in the ninth gave Pittsburgh a 5-4 decision over the St. Louis Cardinals.

The Boston Braves found a near relative in Walter Beck, his Brooklyn right hander, and won their first home game 5 to 3.

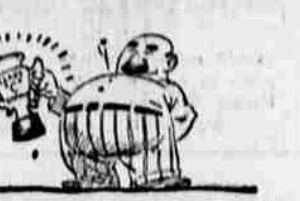
