

CARLE ABRAMS SEEKS KLAMATH VOTES ON VISIT

"In the light of highly optimistic developments, since the announcement of my candidacy, I have reason to believe that my chances for the Republican nomination are improving every day," said Carle Abrams, Republican candidate for Secretary of State in the May primaries, upon his arrival at Klamath Falls today. Mr. Abrams was in the city for a few hours, shaking hands with old friends and well-wishers and meeting new supporters. Mr. Abrams left for Ashland in pursuit of his campaign, which will extend to the southernmost parts of the state and back through the Rogue, Umpqua and Willamette valleys.
