British Golf Champion Loses Good Standing

LONDON, April 27 (U.P.)—Enid Wilson's entry in the British women's golf championship was refused by the Ladies Golfing Union today. The unprecedented action, barring the present titleholder, stunned followers of the sport.

Refusal came as a result of A. L. G. U. ruling which prohibits players from writing for newspapers unless they are journalists by profession. This rule, recently passed, was later held in abeyance for one year. Meantime Miss Wilson wrote the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, the final authority on the sport in Great Britain, asking her status.

Two Leading Coast Hurlers Suffer First Losses of Year

J. Millard Campbell of Los Angeles and Leroy Herrmann of San Francisco, until Thursday ace hurlers of the Coast League for this season, had a defeat apiece charged against them today after winning their first five 1934 appearances.

They went down together, Campbell before the 11-hit attack of Sacramento's Senators at Los Angeles and Herrmann before an Oakland uprising at San Francisco.

The Solons landed on Campbell for two runs in the first inning and four more in the third and tallied once each in the seventh and eighth to win handily, 8-3. Campbell went the route but never had a chance after those first three innings. Three Angel errors helped the Capital City men to two scores.

The Oaks chased Herrmann to the showers in the sixth with a slug bee that netted five runs and led to the first Oakland win of the series, 8-4. Hal Hald was strong all the way for Oakland and seldom in trouble. Ray

French, veteran shortstop traded to the Oaks last week by Sacramento, proved his liking to an Acon uniform by cracking out a double and pair of singles.

Beaten 4-3 in the first game of a doubleheader at Seattle, the Mission came back to take the nightcap, 8-2. In the opener Pitcher Lloyd Osborne, on orders from Manager Gabby Street, passed Mike Hunt of Seattle in the ninth inning to get at Fred Berger. Berger responded by doubling and driving in the winning Indian run.

While his mates, led by Oscar Eckhardt, with a four-bagger and three singles, pounded three Seattle tossers for 13 bingles in the second game, Clarence Mitchell stopped the Indians with eight hits.

Bunching five runs in the first inning and adding another in the sixth, Hollywood took the series opener from Portland, 6-5. Four Beaver errors gave the Stars two unearned runs. Joe Sullivan was blasted from the Hollywood box in the fifth when Portland scored all five of its runs but gained credit for the victory.

CHICAGO CUBS DROP 1ST GAME

Cincinnati Reds Break Into Winning Streak of Leaders.

With the first failure of a Cub starting pitcher to go the route, Chicago's seven-game winning streak that opened the National League season in sensational style has come to an end. And, oddly enough the only flinger who has pitched consistent ball for the Phillies wound up that club's seven-game string of defeats at the same time.

Needs Do Trick.

The Cubs met their Waterloo Thursday facing the Cincinnati Reds, a former "Jinx" which had been thoroughly dissipated by five beatings so far this season. Charley Root ran into a streak of wildness in the second and had to give way to Bud Tinning but even then it took a ninth inning homer by sunny Jim Bottomley with one on to earn Cincinnati a 5-4 victory. Previously Chuck Klein had walked his fourth homer to help Chicago take the lead.

Fidgety Phil Collins, who had held the New York Giants to four

hits in his first start, came right back at them with a five-hitter to pitch the Phils to their first triumph, 9-2. Ethan Allen's homer in the sixth spelled the winning run.

Dodgers Defeated.

Pitching also dominated the other two National League games as the Boston Braves turned back Brooklyn 2-0 in a duel between Old Tom Zachary and Young Emil Leonard in which each allowed six hits and Bill Hallahan's six-hit fling aided the St. Louis Cardinals in a 10-1 triumph over Pittsburgh. Spud Davis' homer in the seventh with two on ended a flinging argument between Hallahan and Ralph Birkofer.

A big shakeup at Washington, which brought a 10-7 victory over the Boston Red Sox, furnished the high spot of the American League's three-game program. Manager Joe Cronin benched Ossie Bluege, Buddy Myer and Johnny Stone in favor of Cecil Travis, Bob Boken and Sheriff Dave Harris, and came up with a combination that scored eight runs in the first two innings and pounded four flingers for 15 hits.

Y. Sorrell's expert five-hit hurling and some timely hitting by Hank Greenberg gave Detroit's Tigers a 3-1 triumph over the White Sox and sent them back into first place. A pair of rookies, Joe Cascarella and Frank Hayes led the Athletics to a 3-1 victory over the Yankees. Cascarella pitched three-hit ball after relieving Roy Mahafay in the fifth while Hayes banged in the winning tally with a double in the ninth.

The Cleveland-St. Louis encounter was rained out.

FOUR HEAVIES CLASH TONIGHT
